War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

GERMAN TERRITORY CAPTURED.
LONDON, Feb. 23. Andrew Bonar Law announced in the Commons to-day that 750,000 square miles of German territory in Africa have been captured.

LORD CECIL WAR TRADE MINISTER.
LONDON, Feb. 23. In the Commons to-day, the Premier officially announced the appointment of Lord Cecil as War Trade Minister.

RESTRICTIONS ON IMPORTATION OF FRUIT.
LONDON, Feb. 23. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, was asked in the Commons to-day what restrictions he proposed to place on importation of fruit, and when they would take effect. He said that he would not make any definite statement, except that any restriction imposed would not apply to fruit from British Dominions, Colonies or Dependencies.

SMITH REPEATS HIS STATEMENT.
LONDON, Feb. 23. Asquith concluded his address as follows, his words evoking applause from every corner of the House: "I have stated in clear, direct, explicit and emphatic language what are the terms which we are prepared to make peace. I will repeat them. They are familiar to our Allies and well known to the German Chancellor. What I said on November 9th, 1914, I repeat now: 'We shall never sheath the sword, which we have not lightly drawn, until Belgium, and, I will add, Serbia, recover in full measure all, and more than they have sacrificed, until France is adequately secured against aggression; until the rights of the small nations of Europe are based upon an unassailable foundation; until the military domination of Prussia is wholly and finally destroyed.'"

"What is there wanting, in clearness and directness in that, I ask Mr. Trevelyan and the German Chancellor? How can I make it fuller and more intelligible? How can I do more to convince him and all our Allies that not until peace, based upon these foundations, is within the grasp of attainment, and not until

then, shall we, or any of our Allies, abate by one jot our prosecution of the war."

PEACE DISCUSSED.

LONDON, Feb. 23. Philip Snowden, Socialist, took advantage of the discussion of the Government's Consolidated Fund Bill in the Commons to-day, to raise a question as to the conditions under which it would be possible to bring the war to an end, with the object for which the Allies were fighting realized. He contended that prolongation of the war could be justified only by a reasonable expectation that through its continuance the Allies should be in a position to dictate such terms as to secure future European peace. He thought that few men who took an intelligent and dispassionate view of the situation, and the lessons it had taught, would say that there was any reasonable ground for hope of a decisive and crushing military victory for either of the contending parties. If Britain was determined to continue in expectation of crushing Germany he declared, her people ought to be convinced that it was the best method for establishing the international relations of the European Powers. He, however, believed that the continued attempt to crush Germany would be the worst basis for the establishment of a just and lasting settlement. The speaker declared that all nations, especially Germany, were being driven to accept the evidence of this war, of the futility of militarism, and that the time was ripe for making a movement in the direction of peace. In particular, Snowden maintained that German Socialists were solidly in favor of peace, now that it had been proven that Germany was invulnerable from external attack. The Premier said he would not like it to go forth to the world that Snowden and Trevelyan were spokesmen for any substantial body of public opinion. He even doubted whether they spoke for their own constituencies. Certainly, he declared, they did not speak for Democratic opinion. The Premier welcomed Snowden's admission that the conditions of peace should be such as to secure permanent attainment of national aims. There is absolute unity in the country, he continued. The Premier declared that Snowden's statement on the military situation was a matter of opinion. The real gist of Snowden's speech, added the Premier, was his contention that a genuine desire for peace existed in Germany. As evidence, there was the report of the debate in the Reichstag and the Chancellor's speech in which he said he would welcome approaches from any quarter, but did not say he was prepared to make approaches himself. The Premier referred in biting terms to the Chancellor's statement that Germany was not the enemy of small nations, and characterized the statement as colossal and shameless audacity, after her treatment of Belgium and Serbia.

WAR NEWS.

HEAVY FIGHTING.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, Feb. 23. The Paris bulletin of 2 p.m. announces heavy fighting going on between Brabant and Herbebois, a 15 kilometre front. The French have evacuated Haumont-village. A desperate struggle is raging.

FOOD RIOTS IN GERMANY.

LONDON, Feb. 23. The Rotterdam correspondent of the Daily Mail says that he has reliable information to the effect that rioting is increasing in Germany. He telegraphs that protest meetings, especially of women, continue to be held notwithstanding severe police measures. The most serious riot, which has so far taken place in Germany, occurred on the evening of Feb. 19 in Bergedorf, a suburb of Hamburg, where a women's meeting was held in front of the burgo-master's house, in protest against the butter and fat regulations. It developed into a big street demonstration, the people shouting "down with the government." Police, summoned from Hamburg, drove the screaming and struggling women into their homes after a street battle. A despatch from Zurich reports serious food protests and riots in Hanover.

GERMAN BANKS IN DIFFICULTIES.

LONDON, Feb. 23. A despatch from the Daily Express correspondent in Geneva says: "A banker just returned here after spending several months in Germany, tells me that the principal banks in the chief towns of the Rhine and also in Munich and Dresden, are in serious financial difficulties, and some big crashes may be expected within the next three months. The losses involved will be at least £180,000,000, the banker added, and if the war continued another nine months, Germany would be ruined financially."

AUSTRIA ASKS FOR INFORMATION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. Austria has asked the United States for additional information on her protest against the attack by an Austrian submarine on the American tanker Petrolite, several weeks ago. Such information as this Government has will be furnished promptly.

GERMANY STILL PLAYING WITH WASHINGTON.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23. A News Agency despatch from Washington, published here this afternoon, says: "The appearance of President Wilson before Congress in the next few days to announce his desire to break off diplomatic relations with Germany, was foreseen by this afternoon, by high administration officials. This action is certain to follow, said one of the officials, if intimations coming from German sources are correct. Those intimations are that the German Foreign Office is sending instructions to Ambassador Bernstorff to delay for further delay in terminating the Lusitania dispute and for long discussion on technicalities over the armed merchantmen decree, scheduled to go into effect on March 1st."

AUSTRIA AND MONTENEGRO.

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 23. A despatch from Budapest, quotes the Pester Lloyd as stating that the Austrian Government has decided to treat Montenegro as a conquered country, instead of one which has surrendered, if after the lapse of a few days King Nicholas persists in ignoring all inquiries addressed to him by the Austrian Government.

STEAMER TENNYSON BADLY DAMAGED.

RIO JANEIRO, Feb. 23. Excitement has been raised in Brazil through the putting into port at Maranhao, badly damaged, as the result of an explosion believed by some to have been caused through an infernal machine in her bunkers, while bound from Rio de la Plata for New York. Three men of the crew, an American, an Englishman and a Hollander were killed by explosion.

BRITISH STEAMER DAMAGED.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23. A News Agency despatch from Queenstown, Ireland, to-day says that the British freight steamer Strathclyde, 4,417 tons, was towed into Queenstown to-day, badly damaged. No one was allowed on board, but it was rumored that a bomb explosion had occurred on board. She was built in 1906 and was owned in Glasgow. Her skipper is Capt. Watt. The shipping register shows that the vessel left Philadelphia for Manchester on Jan. 19th.

BRITISH STEAMER PUTS IN FOR REPAIRS.

LONDON, Feb. 23. A despatch received from Santa Cruz, Canary Islands, says that the British steamer Westburn put in there for repairs, flying the German flag, with a prize crew of seven men and one officer. The officer is believed to belong to the German raider Moeve. In addition to her own crew there are 206 prisoners on the Westburn which were taken from various British vessels. The Westburn left Liverpool on Jan. 21st for Buenos Aires. She was a vessel of 3,500 tons, built in 1899, owned by J. Westall, of Sunderland. The prisoners on board came from the British steamers Flomenco, Horace, Cian McTavish and Cambridge.

CAPT. CROSS AND CREW.

On their return to St. John's from Russia, Capt. Cross and crew, late of the Bellaventure, are supposed to be on their way from Christiania to New York. The crews of the Adventure and Bonaventure are still in Russian territory.

Up to noon yesterday at the C. L. B. Armoury the men were engaged at various indoor drilling exercises and were given leave during the afternoon, it being a public half holiday. At 9 o'clock this morning the men resumed drill.

Assistant Curate Coming.

Rev. Clarence A. Moulton, who has been appointed Assistant Curate of St. Thomas's Church during the absence of the Rev. A. Clayton, Curate of St. Thomas's Church by His Lordship Bishop Jones, will likely arrive in the city to-morrow night. Mr. Clayton leaves by to-day's express for England where he will join as Chaplain for the front.

Laid to Rest.

All that was mortal of the late Jos. O'Brien, of Outer Cove, was laid to rest yesterday afternoon at Torbay. The funeral was largely attended, the procession comprising people from Torbay, Outer Cove, Middle Cove, Logy Bay and Flatrock and other adjacent places. For weeks deceased had been President of the Torbay Total Abstinence Society. The prayers for the dead were read by Rt. Rev. Mons. St. John.

Trout Scarce.

Though there is a scarcity of trout locally this winter, large quantities of them were brought to town yesterday from different suburban settlements and readily disposed of. The fish in nearly all cases were very small and 20 cents a dozen was got for them.

Section Foreman's House Blown Down.

In the big gale of some two weeks ago a section foreman's house near Killy's Brook was thrown over, and only that the section man was over the line at the time he would certainly have been injured if not killed. It was on this part of the railway that several cars were blown from the track some four years ago.

G. F. Recruits Show Splendid Physique.

The twenty-seven young men, comprising the Grand Falls advance contingent, whose excellent physique has won flattering comment for them and who had already gone through a medical examination at the inland town under two physicians, were re-examined by Dr. Burton yesterday and the previous night. All passed creditably and were pronounced physically fit, only a few recruits not being up to the required weight. The Grand Falls 27 are a strapping bunch with a fine soldiery appearance.

To His Grace.

The Right Rev. Mons. McDermott sent a cablegram of felicitation to His Grace yesterday apropos of His Grace's anniversary, to which His Grace replied, thanking the good Monsignor and the people of St. John's in general. The Archbishop is still at New York, but expects to leave for the south about Monday next.



Household Notes.

Too much linen will cause linen to crack in the folds.
When ironing linen, move the iron with the threads, never diagonally.
Serve a light suet polypoly with beef.

A lump of loaf sugar put into a quart of olive oil will prevent its getting rancid.
If washing powders are used in the washing of linen, it will go to pieces in no time.
Linen should be kept in a dry, cool place. Heat causes the threads to become brittle.
To sweeten gooseberries or cranberries with less sugar, put a small pinch of baking soda in while cooking.

No Premature Peace.

It is heartening to read the firm words of Premier Asquith in reference to premature peace. The body of men who are trying to start a peace propaganda in Great Britain are those who were notorious in opposing every means of preparation to meet war adversity before the days of war and who professed the utmost confidence in Germany's good intentions. Since the war began they have hampered the volunteering under the Kitchener and Derby schemes and opposed bitterly the compulsory bill, and have been most intent on frustrating the efforts of Lloyd George in speeding up the output of munitions. There was a delicate irony in Premier Asquith associating Mr. Trevelyan with the German Chancellor in his query as to whether he had not been clear and direct enough. The Premier repeated his statement of November 9th, 1914, with the addition of an inclusion of Serbia. Here it is:

"We shall never sheath the sword, which we have not lightly drawn, until Belgium, and I will add, Serbia, recover in full measure all, and more, than they have sacrificed; until France is adequately secured against aggression; until the rights of the small nations of Europe are based upon an unassailable foundation; until the military domination of Prussia is wholly and finally destroyed."

The repetition of the original statement makes the matter clear enough. France has been equally firm in Russia is quite as emphatic. This is a fight to a finish. The object is to make it impossible for Germany to renew the war for many generations to come, if ever. Britain is the most interested party in such a policy, because it is plain enough to those who read the signs of the times, that Germany's main intention now is to get peace and prepare for a conflict in Europe next time but with Britain alone. It is far better to cripple her now and put her in such a position that she cannot make war again in the Twentieth Century.

The Salvation Army and the Great War.

Last night Lieut.-Colonel Otway delivered an interesting and instructive lecture on "The Salvation Army and the Great War." Long before the time announced for the lecture the Livingstone Street Hall was filled to its utmost capacity.

At 8 o'clock the service commenced with singing the old familiar hymn "Rock of Ages," which was illustrated with highly colored pictures, after which Mrs. (Col.) Otway offered prayer. Then the lecturer stated that the object of the lecture was not to again rehearse the well known cause of this great and terrible conflict, but to show in particular a little of the work of the Salvation Army in connection therewith.

The speaker continued, as stated, it is not my object to speak of the cause, yet we do well to continually remind ourselves that this is unique in the history of the world for several reasons, viz.—

1. The continent contains twenty millions of well equipped troops.
2. There are eleven nations involved in the fearful crisis.
3. The cause—the broken treaty.
4. The Colonel also referred to Bernhardi's writings, especially the phrase Germany's world-power or downfall, and stated no doubt it would be the latter.

The first views shown on the canvas were that of their Majesties, President Poincare, King Albert, King Victor Emmanuel, Lord Kitchener and Sir John French, also a glimpse of the Army work for Naval and Military men in normal times of war. The Naval and Military League has for its object the linking together of all Salvationists in Naval and Military forces throughout the world, enrolling them as Leaguers and organizing them for aggressive Christian work among their fellows. The Army has fifteen homes for soldiers and sailors at the chief Naval and Military bases of the world. They provide safe and clean lodgings, wholesome, well cooked food, and in addition to the moral and spiritual influence exercised by contact with the Officers, meetings are held.

Lord Fisher, the Creator of the Present British Navy.

Some months ago Lord Fisher, instructed by His Majesty the King, visited local committees in England in connection with the Prince of Wales Fund to see how things were being done, to cheer up the wives of soldiers and sailors.

Judgement in Goat Case.

Mr. Hutchings, J. P., gave his decision to-day in the cases of the S. P. C. A. against City Impounder Dysart and the three men, Ring, Hackett and Simms. The four were charged with cruelty to animals—slaughtering goats in the presence of others. The Impounder was fined \$4 or 14 days and costs and his associates \$2 or 7 days each and costs.

New York Style.

By GEORGE FITCH
Author of "At Good Old Slivash"

New York is known as the Empire State, because of the vast numbers of money kings, railroad kings, steel kings, theatre kings and miscellaneous potentates which it harbors. It is a medium-sized, quaintly-designed state, containing 47,000 square miles and over 6,000,000 people, something over 5,000,000 of whom are jammed down in the toe of the state in a municipal sardine box known as Greater New York.

New York State is the greatest of American commonwealths, partly because it had an early start, and partly because it has always believed in advertising. It contains more people, more factories, more money, more millionaires, more society, more newspapers, more actors, more shipping and more politics than any other state. It is 400 miles long and 300 miles tall on the map and is divided into two parts by the New York Central Railroad and the Erie canal. It was discovered in 1609 by Hendrick Hudson, who, however, made the great mistake of sailing away without picking up a few public service franchises cheap and made nothing from his find. It was first settled about 1614 and in the last 100 years has grown so rapidly that Congress has had to be enlarged ten times to take care of its ever-increasing horde of representatives.

The state of New York itself is commonly supposed to be only a sort of back yard for the city of New York, but this is only because the city does all of the talking. The back yard contains over 4,000,000 people, and when they are having a political campaign it is impossible to hear anything else in the country. New York always votes for the successful presidential candidate for the same reason that a fat boy always sits on the lower end of a tector totter.

New York State contains three mountain ranges, the Catskills, the Adirondacks and lower Broadway. It

contains the Hudson River, which is a broad, magnificent stream superbly decorated with mountain sides, ice houses and brick barges. It has a half interest in Niagara Falls and Lake Champlain and Andrew Carnegie. It also contains one of the two living experiments, but has been unable to harness him as successfully as it has Niagara Falls.

New York State produces more butter and eggs, milk, dividends, magazines, battleships, clothing and newspaper stories than any other state. It was originally infested with Indians, but they have all been rooted out except the Tammany tribe, which, however, has done more damage than all the others put together. It is generally confined in Manhattan, but during the Indian outbreak four years ago it captured the rest of the state. It does its deadly work by building up instead of burning down, and we may soon expect to see million-dollar town pumps in Oswego and a \$5,000,000 city hall in Cohoes.

GREAT BATTLE IN VERDUN REGION—DESPERATE FIGHTING.

LONDON, Tuesday.—The troops belonging to seven German army corps, under Crown Prince Frederick William, are engaged in a 26 mile front, north of Verdun, in a desperate effort to drive back the French defending forces, probably with the capture of the great French city in view. There has been very heavy fighting for a considerable period in this district, and the French war zone, but within the few days the attacks of the Germans have taken additional strength, and the battle line has been extended. It now reaches from Malancourt on the west to Etain on the east with Verdun in the centre. Only a few miles southward the Germans claim to have made important advances and to have taken several towns. The extent of this is admitted by the War Office, which describes the situation as one of increasing intensity. German preparations were extensively interrupted by a heavy shelling of the French war zone, but the French were called into action and responded in kind by a heavy shelling of the Germans. While at first the French were unable to resist the onslaughts of the attacking forces, much of the front, according to Paris communications, the attacks were well sustained and very heavy losses inflicted on the Germans.

PRO-GERMANS EMBARRASS IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, Tuesday.—The agitation in Congress in connection with European belligerents, which grew to such proportions yesterday, that the Democratic Foreign Affairs Committee voted to canvass the sentiments of the Senate in favour of some such measure, also was openly expressed at the end of the day, when the President's agitation were such as had been seen in Congress for some time past. It came that President Wilson's attitude was unalterably opposed to any suggestion by Congress. He would not be embarrassed thereby in the negotiations with Germany, was a wide-spread suggestion. The situation has reached a point at which the President would soon lay the matter before Congress. Secretary Lansing in some way decided upon a course of Government. In a communication Senator Stone he said that the President had been fixed without any intention of State, but that Germany might signify her intention to abandon the war, which would be a great advantage to the United States.
