STAIN'S TRADE LOOKING UP. LONDON, Dec. 31. Great Britain is closing the year with her foreign trade larger in amount, both as to imports and exports than for the year 1922. The exports in eleven months of 1922 exceeded the imports in the same period for 1922 by \$30,000,000 and exports were more than \$55,000,000 value.

REVOLUTIONISTS PROTEST. WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. The Huerta Revolutionists in Mexico today filed with the State Department a formal protest against the plan of the United States to sell material to General Obregon. Obregon Government is, however, the only forces in Mexico recognized by the United States, and there is no indication that any will be taken of the protest.

MANY EXPRESS SYMPATHY. PARIS, Jan. 1. Herr Von Hoersch, German Charge d'Affaires in Paris, called at the French Foreign Office yesterday to express Germany's deep sympathy in loss of the dirigible Dixmude.

WILL SEARCH FOR AIRSHIP. PARIS, Dec. 31. As soon as the pilot of the Coast Sicily abates the French authorities will institute diving operations around the spot where the body of the dirigible Dixmude's commander was picked up in an effort to determine beyond doubt whether airship with her fifty men went down in that vicinity or if the commander's body alone fell from the ship there.

LATEST DIFFICULTY FACING LABOR MINISTRY. LONDON, Jan. 1. Assuming that a Labor Government will be in power next March the Budget statement must be sent to Parliament, it is generally believed that the greatest difficulty for the new ministry, inexperienced in the art of governing, will be connected with the nation's finances. There have been statements from the Baldwin Government in the last Budget were unduly optimistic concerning the coming year's trade, and that there is likely to be a large deficit in the next Budget. Returns issued to-night are to bear out these fears, for they show in the first nine months of the fiscal year a decrease of more than fifty-two million pounds sterling in the nation's revenue as compared with the same period last year. The nation has suffered no irreparable loss. The material destruction caused during the fighting with the Republicans will necessitate restriction of national expenditure, but the bill can be met without mortgaging the future.

BIG GUN DEVELOPMENT. WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. United States Army ordnance experts have developed what they believe to be the heaviest and most powerful gun of its type in the world. The weapon is of fourteen inch, fifty calibre type, and is a post war development. It is capable of hurling an armor piercing projectile of fifteen hundred pounds, twenty-three miles.

NOTED PRIZE FIGHTER DIES. MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 1. Billy Miske, of St. Paul, heavyweight, who was only knocked out once in over one hundred fights, and that time by Jack Dempsey, died today after a week's illness, with Bright's disease. He was twenty-nine.

THIEF GETS QUICK DESPATCH. AVENZANNO, Italy, Jan. 1. Francesco Tomel, last night met death at the hands of infuriated townspeople after he had been caught stealing from the Church here, relics of martyred Saints, patrons of Avanzanno. He was badly beaten, trampled upon, then saturated with gasoline and burned alive.

STEAMER GROUNDS ON SABLE I. HALIFAX, Jan. 1. The Swedish steamer Chrialholm, three thousand tons, en route to Stockholm, ran ashore on Sable Island today and floated off again a few hours later, according to meagre reports from the island by radio. The freighter sent out wireless calls to the life saving station soon after striking, asking for assistance, but later countermanded the request and said she was proceeding apparently undamaged.

BIG FREIGHTER SHORE. LONDON, Jan. 1. The Hamburg-American Line freighter Minnesota, the largest freighter afloat, twenty thousand, six hundred tons, gross, was reported this morning ashore in Jade Bay, off Wilhelmshaven, and assistance has been sent to her. The Minnesota was built for trans-Pacific service, but was used as a transport during the war after which she was tied up until last November, when she was sold to the German Merchant Marine.

NEVA OVERFLOWS. MOSCOW, Dec. 31. Reports from Petrograd say part of the city is submerged under the waters of the Neva, which have flooded the banks, despite the severe weather, and many factories have been inundated.

GERMANS IN RUHR MORE OPTIMISTIC. ESSEN, Jan. 1. The end of the year 1923 finds the industrial population in a stage of transition from the languid pessimism of passive resistance to a sort of stolid optimism over the possibility of better times. More factories are in operation now, but there are still nearly two millions of workers unemployed in an area comprising five million persons. Within the past month there has been a marked change of attitude in the relations between the French and Belgian occupation personnel and the population generally, and this is regarded as of

as much importance as the material progress in production thus far made.

GETTING AFTER INDIVIDUALS. SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Jan. 1. The Government of President Obregon has taken steps against Senators and Deputies who are making propaganda in favor of the revolutionary movement, headed by De La Huerta. A Senator and Deputy have been made prisoners, the first in Tampico, and the second in San Angel, on charges of rebellion.

SOME HONORS. LONDON, Dec. 31. Baron Inchausti, one of Great Britain's noted merchants, is made a Viscount in the list of New Year's honors, made public to-night. Sir Chas. John Darling, recently retired as Judge of the King's Bench division of the High Court of Justice, is among the new Barons.

BELEGGED DESTROYED BY FIRE. PALERMO, Italy, Dec. 31. Bits of charred wreckage, swept in by the sea at Scaccia and along the coast near Palermo, have been examined by experts, and the conclusion has been reached that the French dirigible Dixmude was destroyed by fire following an explosion.

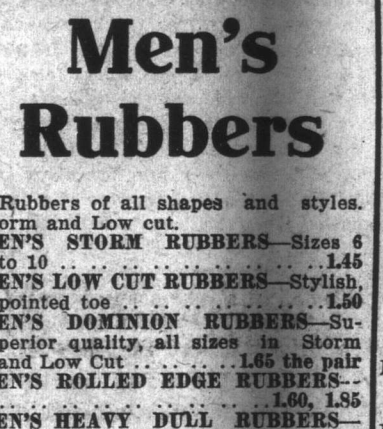

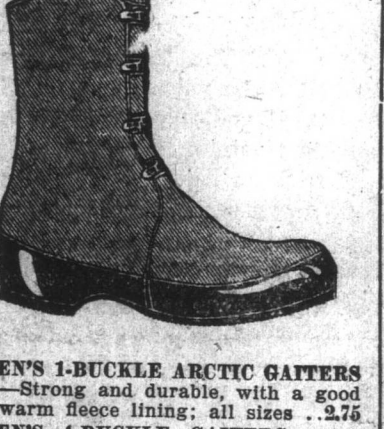

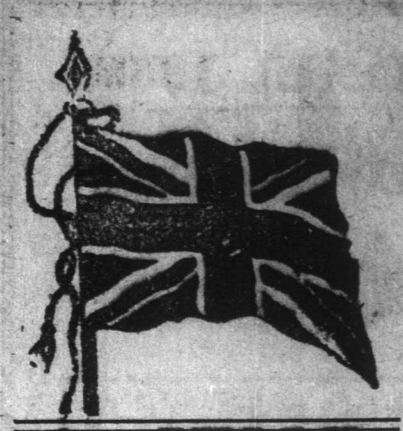

THE RAILROAD ISSUES.

(Halifax Chronicle.)
NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Such standard dividend payers as Southern, Union and Atchafalpa are only two or three points above the year's low levels. THE SUGAR MARKET.

(Halifax Chronicle.)
NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—An easier feeling developed in the raw sugar market to-day owing to increased offerings in expectations of an early settlement of the Cuban railroad strike. Sales included 5,000 bags of Cubas for prompt shipment to a local refiner at 5 7/16 cents cost and freight equal to 7 3/4 for centrifugal and 15,000 bags of Porto Rico for January shipment to an output refiner at equal to 7.03 for centrifugal.

Raw sugar futures were easier under scattered liquidation and trade selling, prompted by the unsettled conditions in the spot market and prospects for improvement in the Cuban railroad situation, recorded moderate advances.

Bankers report a firm though slow market for new securities.

Coloured Diamonds New Development

BEAUTIFUL SPECIMENS MUCH SOUGHT AFTER AS GEMS.
American chemists are endeavoring to colour the diamond. Should the process become successful it may have an effect on the value of some of the rare coloured diamonds which are so much prized.

Attention is called this week in the "Chemical Age" to attempts which have been made by the Rare and Precious Metals Experiment Station of the United States Bureau of Mines to colour diamonds. In its purest form, the "Chemical Age" the diamond is a colourless crystalline substance, and its value is mainly dependant upon its being free from colour.

On the other hand, there are rare instances where specimens are found which colouring is quite definite and particularly beautiful, and blue, red, blue and greens are especially sought after as gems. In fact,

the well known "Hope" diamond is of a decided sapphire colour. The pale yellow and brownish stones are, of course, comparatively common, and are usually known in the trade as "off-coloured" specimens to distinguish them from the blue-whites.

It has been known for some time that colour changes may be effected by the action of heat or exposure to radium emanations, and the recent American work is chiefly interesting for the reason that previous attempts to colour the diamond by radium radiation have not been entirely uniform, and in the main were unsuccessful. It now seems quite evident that direct radiation (probably by alpha rays) is necessary to effect the change in colour, and that no effect is produced by the penetrating (beta and gamma) radiation from radium salts.

Among the results, the American workers found that if straw-coloured diamonds were completely covered with 10 per cent. of Chloride of Radium, sealed in a glass tube and left for a couple of months, a deep sage-green colour was produced,

A Coasting Accident

Between one and two o'clock yesterday morning Frank Neider, a 39 year old resident of Leslie Street, whilst coasting over Springdale Street, ran into a horse and sleigh owned by Mr. James Hickey. The horse was knocked down and the sleigh upset. Neider received several nasty scalp wounds in addition to having his ear nearly severed. He was brought to the General Hospital for treatment.

Firemen Called Out

The services of the firemen were not needed as there was no sign of any fire when they arrived on the scene. Apparently someone seeing sparks fly from a chimney thought a blaze was in progress. The owner of the premises was not aware that anything was amiss until the firemen arrived in front of the premises.

But the speculation is ended and Great Britain now knows that the King's grandson is not a Prince of the Royal Blood, but simply Henry Hubert Lascelles, or "Master Lascelles" for short.

This decisive information is conveyed by the 1924 Debrett, the unquestioned guide to the genealogy of Royalty and the aristocracy of the Kingdom.

The new issue says that a Royal warrant of December 11, 1917 debars young Lascelles from being a Royal Prince. The warrant asserts that none but children of the sons of the Sovereign and the eldest living son of the Prince of Wales shall have and hold the style, title and attribute of Royal Highness with titular dignity of Prince and Princess. The warrant does not mention grandchildren of the King who may be children of the Monarch's daughters.

THE WEATHER IN THE ALPS UNPRECEDENTED.
BERNE, Jan. 2.
The snowfall this season in the Swiss Alps is surpassing anything within the memory of the present generation and the number of avalanches have exceeded all records. Many of the higher valleys are cut off from communication and some of the mountain railways and many highways are completely blocked. Hundreds of Alpine huts are demolished and ten lives have been lost so far.

SEINE THREATENS TO FLOOD PARIS.

PARIS, Jan. 2.
Weather experts and prophets who gauge the ebb and flow of the Seine were predicting to-day that the river would reach the highest level of the present flood to-morrow, but rain set in this evening and the Seine continues to rise more rapidly than had been calculated, while some of its affluents were considerably more swollen than was anticipated. The Seine is now seven feet below the level reached in 1910 flood when subways were flooded and boats were required for traffic round the Foreign Office, St. Lazare Station, and other conspicuous points. At the present rate of rising, the flood should have set a new record by next Friday.

Prince at the Bedside

His Sympathy With Men Broken in the War.
The fine humanity of the Prince of Wales was once again unobtrusively revealed when his Royal Highness opened a new casualty department of the Royal Northern Hospital in Holloway, London. In one of the wards which the Prince visited were a number of ex-Service men with their medals pinned to their shirts. When the Prince entered the ward he at once went to a man in the corner who was wearing the medals of a long-forgotten campaign, and in a moment was chatting away with the old warrior. It was an intimate conversation, for by the Prince's wish the doctors and the nurses stood back, leaving the heir to the Throne and a soldier broken in the country's wars to gossip in comparative privacy. Then, with a shake of his head, as if to say "So-long," the Prince passed to another bedside. In the children's ward one little mite of three, Freda Deerlove, with flaxen hair set off by a big bright blue bow, attracted his attention. "My word," he remarked, "you are smart, quite the smartest in the room," and the little girl preened and simpered, much to the Prince's amusement. One of the wards in the new casualty department has been endowed by Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Collins, of Southampton, with a gift of £10,000 in memory of their son, Major Martyn Collins, who was killed in action on Feb. 4, 1917. Mrs. Collins was pointed out to the Prince, and he conversed with her for some minutes, condoling with her on her loss and, as president of the hospital, expressing his personal gratification at the magnificent gift which she and her husband had made. The names of 1,307 of Islington's dead appear on the memorial archway which the Prince unveiled. Among them, a unique thing in war memorials, are the names of two women—Eileen Foyster and Clara Shead. Miss Foyster was a nurse at the hospital who died as the result of war service on the Western Front; and Miss Shead, a resident of Islington, was a stewardess on board the hospital ship Lansdowney Castle when that vessel was sunk by a German submarine. Underneath her name appears that of her brother, Tom Shead, who was killed in France.—News of the World.

Tumbled into Bath

MOTHER SEES CHILD FATALLY SCALDED AT PLAY.
"Death by misadventure" was the verdict returned at Harrow at the inquest on Elizabeth Foulkes, aged 20 months, of Woodland-road, who died in the cottage hospital from scalds. These were caused by falling into a bath containing 6in. of hot water whilst her mother was cleaning the floor. The child ran into the room, and, turning quickly, fell backwards into the bath.—News of the World.

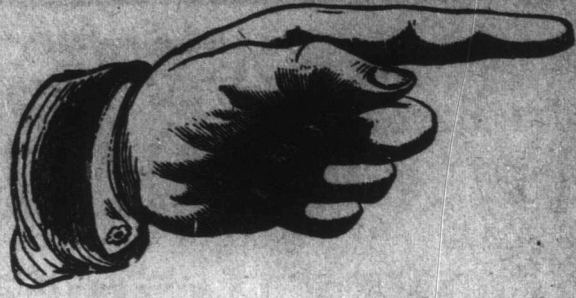

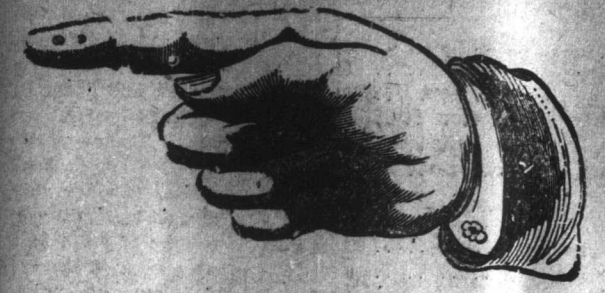

Tutankhamen's Golden Shrine Bizarre Sight

Royal Coffin at Last Revealed in Full Proportions to Modern Eye—Wall Decorations are Remarkable—Endless Lines of Hieroglyphics With Figures in Old Colors That Recall the Art of China.

Luxor, Dec. 18.—All preconceived ideas of Tutankhamen's golden shrine were upset by the sight of this magnificent object for the first time disclosed in almost its full proportions by removal of the partition wall, when the correspondent visited the tomb recently.

The first impression of this gigantic receptacle for the dead, its sides resplendent with chaste decorations of blue and gold, set against a background of brightly colored paintings on yellow, was almost overwhelming. The feeling was of something sacredly hallowed—something that seemed utterly to banish the presence of death in this casket of wonderful workmanship.

One of the first details to catch the eye was the fact that the golden lid on the canopy does not, as one imagined from the view obtained from the opening in the wall, slope down from one end to the other. It rises again at the other end, giving a graceful curved effect, which is declared by competent authority to be unique in Egyptology. The lid is not solid, but hollowed out, roofing over a space of about four feet between the first and second shrine.

In this space the correspondent was able to see—for the doors of the first shrine had been removed—a remarkable species of wooden rack, or scaffolding, erected to carry the immense spangled linen pall resting over the second shrine. It is very like open wooden cage work and is painted a glistening black with heavy gilded carved feet.

In the front, where the removal of the doors of the first shrine renders it clearly visible, it is seen to be made of two parts, rather awkwardly bolted together with two large bolts, probably wooden. From the top turned the ragged edge of the pall, turned blackish brown by age, showing where the part which concealed the doors of the second shrine had broken away. This part of the pall, except for a small piece crumbling on the ground has already been removed to the nearby laboratory.

The golden rosettes, about the size of a half dollar, with which the pall is abundantly spangled, still sparkle in the rays of the powerful arc lights used by the excavators. These rosettes are certainly metal, but probably not gold—more likely gilded copper.

Behind the rack the golden doors of the second shrine glistened dully, the two bolts, one above and one below, yet sternly guarding the secret tomb.

In the middle, set in either of the doors, are two metal rings, let into the wooden side to which were attached seals, which Howard Carter, directing the excavating work, had previously removed. The doors are engraved with exquisitely chiselled figures of goddesses in the attitude of prayer, while above them is the projecting golden lintel of the second shrine, which is about seven feet high. What impresses one more than anything else are the interior decorations of the walls of the first shrine. These are chiefly golden, inscribed with endless lines of hieroglyphics with figures of birds, flowers, and animals, set in a triple frame of broad black lines. This contrast of deep black and old gold recalls the art of old China or the decorative ef-

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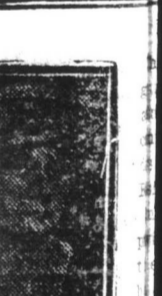

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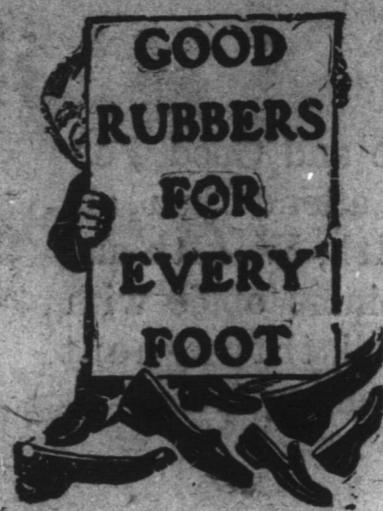

She laughed. "The man who lives there is a bachelor. He lives all alone. And what's more, he bought the house next door for his servants' quarters."

20 Rooms For One Man.

In the huge house which had attracted my attention by its size I suppose there were at least 20 large rooms.

In the house bought for the servants' quarters, there were probably ten more large rooms, for it was a city mansion which would probably cost \$20,000 or \$30,000.

Do I need to tell you any more definitely what I mean by a Bolshevist maker?

In that city there is a tremendous housing problem. Not only the tenements but all the apartment houses are overcrowded. The competition has sent rents up to a painful height. Arouses a Sense of Injustice.

Think how that man's tenancy of that house that he cannot possibly use, must bring home a sense of in-

Justice to the thousands who know about it.

I believe that decency and noblesse oblige, impose in men and women of wealth an obligation to use their wealth in a reasonable way.

I think the man or woman who uses his wealth arrogantly, futilely, foolishly, who buys his wife a \$75,000 fur coat, or spends \$100,000 on an entertainment, or boasts about having more cars or more space in his home than he can use, is a Bolshevist maker. And I think he is as much a menace to his country's welfare as the Bolshevist himself.

Liquor Returned

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—(By Canadian Press)—Liquor valued at approximately \$200,000 has just been returned to John Dunston, at his restaurant, "Jack's" in the theatrical district, where it was seized more than two years ago by prohibition agents who smashed doors and partitions to get at the liquor stock in the cellar.

The liquor was returned under a court order on the ground that the seizure of big stock was irregular.

Quadruple Rescue

Sailor's Gallant Sacrifice of His Life—Drowned After Saving Four Boys.

Grim determination in face of almost certain death for himself led a sailor to go three times to the rescue of six choir boys struggling in the freezing grip of an ice-broken pool. Twice he returned to the shore with a boy under each arm. Entering the water for the third time he never came back alive. The gallant rescuer was James Horton, of Water-street, Kingswinford. The boys who were drowned were Clifford Smith, of Alma-place, Dudley, Albert Parker, Heller-street, Dudley. The boys who were members of the choir of the Dudley Parish Church, had been sliding on the ice on a deep pond, known as Allport Pond. Suddenly the ice, only an inch thick, gave way. Hearing their cries for help, the sailor, who was passing by with a companion, jumped over a wall and dived

into the hole in the ice. "I know I shall get cramp," he exclaimed to his friend as he first rushed to the aid of the boys, "but I must try to save them." He brought a boy up under each arm, and going down a second time again made a double rescue. For the third time he went under, but this time, probably exhausted by his previous exertions and the numbing effect of the icy water, he failed to rise. Further help was soon forthcoming, but unfortunately it was too late. Mr. Crump, a local builder, hadly improvised a raft. His son Sidney, assisted by members of the town council and the vicar of the parish, went out on the raft and recovered the sailor's body and that of one of the boys. Rescue work with the aid of motor headlights went on for several hours in the presence of a crowd of some thousands. Two of the four boys that were saved were taken to the Dudley Guest Hospital where they are making satisfactory progress.

The story of Robinson Crusoe was being filmed for the screen, and one of the actresses had brought her little son with her, a lad of eight, or thereabouts.

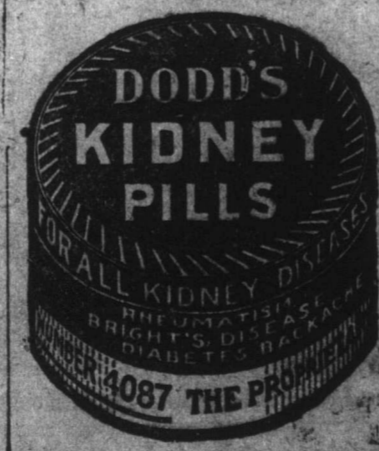

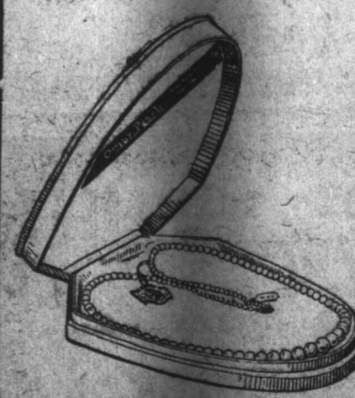
