





nangs the ragged edge of the pall, urned blackish brown by age, showing where the part which concealed the doors of the second shrine had roken away. This part of the pall, except for a small piece crumbling on the ground has already been re-moved to the nearby laboratory.

The golden rosettes, about the size of a half dollar, with which the pall is abundantly spangled, still sparkle in the rays of the powerful arc lights used by the excavators. These rosettes are certainly metal, but probably not gold—more likely glided

Behind the rack the golden doors of the second shrine glistened dully, the two bolts, one above and one below, yet sternly guarding the secret

In the middle, set in either of the In the middle, set in either of the doors, are two metal rings, let into the wooden side to which were attached seals, which Howard Carter, directing the excavating work, had previously removed. The doors are engraved with exquisitely chiselled figures of goddesses in the attitude of prayer, while above them is the projecting golden lintel of the second e, which is about seven feet thrine, which is about seven tee high. Planting by Machinery

Machines have been devised to do machines have been devised to do many things, but one of the most remarkable is used by the United States Forest Service, which sets out seedling trees ten times as fast as the old hand-planting method.

Its capacity is from 12,000 to 15,-

000 trees a day. It is an adaptation of a machine made to set out tomato and cabbage plants, and it takes three men and two horses to operate

In appearance the tree planter is In appearance the tree planter is something like a mowing machine. It has a ploughshare arrangement in front, and at the back of the feeder are two metal wheels, which push earth around the tree seedlings and pack it down. Two men seated beside the driver are kept busy placing the seedlings in the planting hopper.
