The usual toasts were drunk, and the agricultural interest of the county of Wellington fully discussed. The hearty good wishes of meeting were expressed for the prosperity and welfare of Mr. Robertson and his family. Among those present were Dr. Fell, Mr. James Allan, Mr. Brandon, Mr. Brandon, Mr. J. The Provincial Ploughing Match of district number three, open to all ploughmen in the Province, took place on Tuesday in the township of South Dumfries.

The first detachment of the mounted police reached Fort Garry on the 21st, and their arrival has caused an increased feeling of security in the settlement.

The new rector of Trinity Church, Galt—the Rev. W. B. Carran, late of Montreal—was inducted to the pastorate of that church on Sabbath last by His Lordship the Bishop of Huron.

A son of Mr. Wm. Eden, of the township of Waterloo, while engaged drawing cordwood on Friday last, overbalanced himself and fell from the top of the load. His right arm struck the ground with such violence as to break the bone just above the wrist.

LISTON'S taxation for the present year is half a cent in the dollar less than for 1872. The *Banner* is informed on good authority, that this rate not only meets all the demands of the current year, but sweeps off a debt of \$1,000 which was left over from last year unprovided for. This certainly speaks well for the economy of the village fathers, which we take into account the amount necessarily spent this year in improving streets, sidewalks and bridges, not to mention the High School, the building and seating of which cost \$750, and fire-escape at a cost of \$250.

SENSIBLE ACCIDENT.—There was an accident on the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway (Southern extension) about half a mile north of Lockton station on Monday last. Four gravel cars were thrown off the track by running against an ox. There were about one hundred men on the train, two of whom had their legs broken. The first, Alexander McDonald, was so severely smashed as to necessitate amputation. He died from the effects of his injuries. The other, James Mobar, is doing well. There were in all 15 or 16 men more or less injured.

A PERSON engaged in buying butter for a Montreal firm met with a heavy loss in Galt on Monday evening. He missed his pocket-book, which he says contained \$700, and although diligent search was made, it could not be found. In the morning the book was picked up by a boy in a passage, but with no money in it.

BY TELEGRAPH.
Yellow Fever Spreading.
Coal Mines Flooded.
Specie Payments, 1877.
Going Home.
More Embezzlement.

New York, Oct. 23.—There were twenty-two deaths from yellow fever at Columbus, Texas, during the last 24 hours. A. H. Davenport, a well known actor, died at New Orleans. To-day the weather is clear and cold. At Memphis 21 deaths occurred within the last 24 hours.

Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 23.—The recent heavy rains have flooded the coal mines, and interrupted mining operations to a great extent.

Chicago, Oct. 23.—At the evening Session of the National Board of Trade the finance committee made a report favoring the resumption of specie payment by paying coin for greenbacks after July, 1877. Treasury notes to be legal tender for all debts the same as now. That in seasons of contraction the Treasury issue fifty millions of registered certificates in sums not less than five hundred dollars. These are to be computed in reserves of national banks.

London, Oct. 23.—At a meeting of the creditors of Clews, Laibach & Co., to-day, it was resolved to allow the firm to liquidate its own business without interference.

The Emperor of Germany left Vienna for home to-night.

New York, Oct. 24.—The *Times* claims in relation to the transfer of \$2,250,000 in bonds of the Lake Shore Railway by the Union Trust Co., that an attempt has been made to cover up one of the most stupendous frauds in railroad management ever brought to light, and to keep a matter of immense defalcation hidden away from the public on account of the reputation for respectability which has accrued to men most prominent in diverting the property of great railroads to their own uses. The *Times* also says that not only have the \$2,250,000 bonds of the Lake Shore Co. been embezzled and squandered by prominent people of the Co., but there is additional defalcation by which cash of the Corporation has been to a large extent depleted. The loss to the Lake Shore Railroad according to the best information at hand is about three millions.

South Huron.
The Signal says, in reference to the recent election—Of course the Tories claim that the result shows that they have gained over to their side a large number of Reformers; but the full returns as compared with those of the election last year, show that the Tories have polled 49 votes less than they polled in the same municipalities last year. The reduced Reform majority is due therefore wholly to the fact that a large Reform vote remained unpolled. We fear local and petty jealousies had much to do with the indifference of Reformers. In looking over the return, the result of the unity and organization of the Conservatives is shown in the fact that Mr. Case has polled within 49 votes of the total cast for the Conservative candidate last year, while Mr. Bishop falls 358 votes short of what were cast for the Reform candidates. A sufficient Reform vote, therefore, remained unpolled to give Mr. Bishop a very handsome majority, in stead of the paltry 14 by which he is now returned.

Speech of the Hon. John Bright.
On Tuesday evening the Right Hon. John Bright addressed an assemblage estimated to number 16,000 persons, in Birmingham. He commended the Administration of Mr. Gladstone for its past legislation, with the exception of the Education Act, which, he said, was framed in a hasty manner and is incomplete. He advocated the repeal of clause 25 of the Act, by which denominational schools are allowed to receive payment from the public rates. He referred to the relations between Great Britain and the United States. Some Englishmen had spoken of the Treaty of Washington as humiliating to Great Britain. The humiliation was between 1861 and 1865. If at that time the British Government had practiced towards the United States a generous neutrality, the wealthier classes of England would not in the main have sided with the insurrectionary slave-holding planters. If newspapers here had then dealt in a spirit of fairness with our transatlantic kinsmen, the dispute settled by the treaty of 1872 would not have arisen. The conduct of the Administration in reference to that Treaty, and the subsequent arbitration under its provisions, had added a nobler page to the history of England than had all the bloody battles in its records. It was scarcely expected by the general public that any business except that relating to the Pacific Scandal would be brought before Parliament at its present session.

In thus deciding to make the session one for general business, we wonder how much the Government were influenced by the necessity of making the Speech of a decent and presentable length.

The Speech announces also the surrender of the Pacific Railway Charter by Sir Hugh Allan's Company, and the consequent ignominious failure of the Government in an important feature of their policy.
