



During the sitting of Parliament, During the sitting of Parliament, it was stated by the Minister of Militia that the Government intend-ed to reorganize the Volunteer Force of the Dominion, reduce the number of officers and men to 30,000, render the force more efficient than it had been under the late Govern ment, and hold out more encourage ment to the men in the shape of better pay. The Government have promptly carried out their promise, and a general order has been issued from the Militia Department, specily-

ing the changes proposed. In the first place, fitteen companies gazetted, but not yet equipped, have been removed from the list of Active Militia: The only company in this locality so removed is the cavalry troop at Stratford. Five companie

reported as disorganized are removed from the list of those entitled to drill this year. These are all in Quebec. Forty-seven companies which were under thirty non-commissioned offi-cers and men at the annual drill last year are removed from the list of corps entitled to pay on completion of the annual drill thisyear. Among these are included the Garrison Battery at Goderich, the companies at Southampton, Kincar-dine, Lucknow, Wingham, Clinton, Milton, &c. It will be noticed that none of the Companies the 30th Wallington Battalion have been re-moved, as all of them muster the fall complement of men, and are re-tained in the force. The annual drill for 1874.75 will be practicable in Brigade Camps for ex-ercise, at which the cavality, field ar-tillery, and infantry corps within the Brigaue Division who may be autho-rized to attend such camps, will be concentrated for twelve days' drill and training. This order, therefore, does away with the Battalion drill. In its place there will be Brigade Bivision Camps, and the probability is that Guelph may be selected as one of the places where these camps will be held. The places, however, have not yet been fixed upon. The orders also provide that in froop of cavalry, garrison battery of artillery, company of rifles, infantry, and engineers, shall not exceed forty non-commissioned officers and men, which the addition of two per com-pany for s aff sergents and band. Also that the several corps compos-ing the Grand Trunk Railway bri-gade are removed from the list of corps entitled to pay on the com-pletion of the drill authorized for the year 1874.75.
