





keen. That is what will start Great Britain and Germany to war if any-thing does. But 4 think conflicts of the future will be more of preparation than actual combat. For instance Germany is not going to strike at Great Britain until it knows it can win. It is going ahead rapidly in the building of a great navy and a great army. When it reaches a point where it knows that it has the advantage of England the German emperor can go to the king of Great Britain and say: "Look here, we have an army and navy that is far superior to yours. 
