Opening the Door.

Having alluded in a general and abstract way to the great dormant mineral wealth of country and to the duty of opening wide, so to speak, the door, in order that foreign capital may flow in for the purpose of developing that wealth, we now come to deal with a branch of the subject somewhat more circumstantially. There exists on the one part of William Creek no inconsiderable stretch of depressed ground commonly known as 'The Meadows.'

It is now more than a year since a larger scheme for dealing with the ground was propounded; but that scheme never attained any tangible form, probably owing chiefly to the absence of adequate capital with which to carry on so great an undertaking; and so the whole matter has remained in statu quo.

Prevention Better than Cure.

As the present season it may perhaps not be deemed to offer a few remarks concerning diphtheria and its congeners, more particularly as to their cause and the best means of obviating or palliating their too often disastrous effects. Leaving the proximate cause of these diseases to theorists, nothing is more certain to the student of hygiene than that many low forms of disease such as Typhoid Fever, Malignant Scarletina, and the worst forms of diphtheria have a powerful predisposing, if not a direct exciting cause, in the presence of cess-pits, foul drains, &c., in close contiguity with human habitations.

A very painful reflection now arises in connection with this subject. The great amount of such diseases as diphtheria is borne by the young and helpless portion of the community, by those who are at once ignorant and the most susceptible to their attacks, therefore these remarks should commend themselves. Without entering on the subject of a radical cure to these defects, it may be asked, can anything be done to neutralize the noxious emanations arising from cess-pits, drains, &c.?

BRITISH MAILS ACROSS AMERICA.—The Chicago Post, of May 18th, says: 'As an illustration of the revolution that has been brought about by the construction of the Union Pacific Railroad—the world's highway between the two great oceans, and to India—we may mention the fact that last Wednesday evening's express train from this city on the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railway, as we are informed by conductor J. 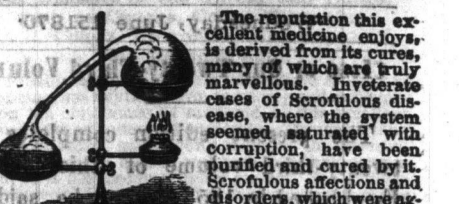

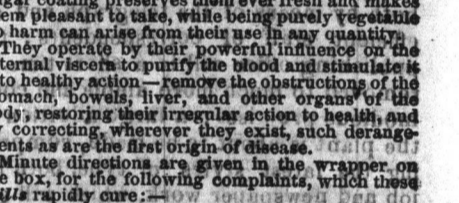
