BARRISTER HANDS' FATE. The Court of Appeal Hands Down Judg-ment Against Him, but Passes Stric-tures on His Trial Below.

The Court of Appeal yesterday gave judgment in the now famous case of Hands v. the Law Society, an action brought by Mr. J. Baldwin Hands, barrister, of this city, to restrain the Law Society from proceeding to disbar him for unprofessional conduct. The Court of Appeal allows the appeal of the Law Society from the indement of the Ouean's

disbar him for unprofessional conduct. The Court of Appeal allows the appeal of the Law Society from the judgment of the Queen's Bench Divisional Court and affirms the judgment of Chancellor Boyd, which sustained the action of the Benchers and refused to interfere with their decision.

The offence charged against Mr. Hands was that of having missappropriated certain moneys of his client, Miss Jemima Craine, of St. Catharines. The matter was brought before the Sanhedrim of the Ontario Bar, the Discipline Committee of the Law Society, and this body, acting on unsworn evidence, sentenced Mr. Hands to professional execution, viz., to be disbarred and to be struck off the rolls as a solicitor. Mr. Hands then brought the proceedings before the committee were irregular, the evidence before them having been taken without the sanctity or legal responsibility of an eath and that the notice calling the meeting was not sufficient.

The Chancellor dismissed the action, but on Mr. Hands' appeal to the Queen's Bench Divisional Court this de islom was overruled, the court holding that the proceedings of the committee were irregular.

Mr. Justice Osler of the Court of Appeal upholds the judgment of the Divisional Court as to the question of the evidence being required by statute to be sworn testimony and expressed his disapproval of the manner in which the evidence was taken. Chief Justice Hagarty express d the opinion that some new method of dealing with matters of this kind should be provided, and intimated it was a question for the interference of the Legislature.
