The Hyams Brothers Are Wanted in New York.

FLED UNDER A CLOUD 10 YEARS AGO

Osler Will Prosecute, Not Defend, the Accused.

The Wife of Harry P. Hyams May Testify Against Her Husband-Many Interes ing Developments in the Case Yester day-A Readable Despatch From Montreal As to the Operations of Harry P. Hyams in That City-The Accused Arraigned at the Police Court and Renanded Until Feb 20.

At five minutes past 10 o'clock yesterday morning Harry Place Hyams and Dallas Theodore Hyams confronted Deputy Police Magistrate Kingsford at the Police Court on the charge of mur-dering William Chianock Wells.

The prisoners, who are twin brothers, are as like each other as were the two Dromios. They are 35 years of age, short of stature, and of dark complexion. Each has jet black hair and dark mustache has jet black hair and dark mustache and slightly tipped nose. The only difference in their appearance was that Harry had a fur-trinmed coat, whilst ballas wore a velvet collar, on his coat. They appeared in great trepidation as they clutched the bar of the prisoners' lock. Nervous twitchings of the face and hands were noticed by the few persons who were in court. Furtively they glanced all round the court, but there were no looks of recognition.

On the charge being read each pleaded not guilty.

Mr. W. G. Murdoch, addressing the court, said that Mr. Horn, who was last evening instructed to defend the accused, expected to have a consultation with Mr. B. B. Osler that afternoon as to their defence. Hence he asked for a remand.

Crown Attorney Curry said he was not ready to proceed with the case, and asked that the prisoners be remanded for a week.

They took a law yer and a parson along with them to assist in canoning the civic autocrats, but better had they left the man of parchment at home, for he only hurt their cause.

This is the offending clause in the proposed bylaw: "No person shall allow his dog to run at large in any of the public parks, squares, drives, streets, lanes, alleys or other public places in the city, unless such dog is accompanied by and is under the immediate charge and control of some competent person, and any dog found running at large contrary to this provision shall be liable to be captured and disposed of as hereinafter provided."

Mrs. S. G. Wood made a pathetic appeal for dogdom, but the merciless exald. Thompson answered her in harsh words. He did not see why the public streets should be made "a playground for vicious dogs,"

or vicious dogs,"
Ald. Sheppard: One of my children was bitten by a dog. I would rather all the dogs in Toronto were destroyed than have my child mutilated. The dogs have a right to live, certainly, but not

have a right to live, certainly, but not in preference to our children.

J. G. Ridout: I would rather see some men shot than a dog.
