They continued to live there until the death of her husband in 1878, rearing to adult age a family of five sons and six daughters. Five of these have died since their father's death and those still living are: Wm. H., Alvinston; Mrs. A. Armstrong, Alvinston; Mrs. Badgley, Vancouver; James and Charlie, Toronto; Thomas, Petoskey, Mich. At the time of her death there were about 25 grandchildren and 30 great grandchildren.

WINDOWS IN MANILA.

Translucent Shells Are Used In Place

of Ordinary Glass. Perhaps in no other country but the Philippines are conchas used as a substitute for window glass. These shells are flat, nearly round, and average four inches in diameter. The edges are trimmed off so as to leave panes about three inches square, and these are set in narrow strips of wood.

The shells are, of course, translucent rather than transparent, and the result is a soft, opalescent light, very agree-able in a country where the glare of the sky would be intolerable if ordinary glass were used.

To obtain the maximum window openings the sashes are made to slide horizontally on wide sills of hard wood in a manner similar to that adopted by the Japanese. By this means openings as wide as twelve feet are obtained.

To realize the splendid resources of the Philippines, says a writer in the Century, one has only to see the hardwood floorings in the public buildings and the residences of the better class. These consist of large slabs of mahogany, or, to use the local names, molave, narra, tindalo and acle, these being of various colors and graining. Frequently the pieces, occasionally as much as forty inches in width and forty feet in length, are laid alternately in dark and light shades. Polished by the household muchachos (house boys) till they reflect like mirrors, they produce a magnificent effect.

LURE OF THE LAW.

The Craze For Litigation Is America's Most Costly Folly.
If one were asked to name the cost-

liest folly known in this country he would not be far from the mark if he should say it was the American craze

for litigation.
In some communities, especially the small ones in rural districts, a man's importance seems to be measured by the number of lawsuits he has on hand, and he who has none is often regarded as a person of slight conse-

But the habit of going to law is not onfined to small neighborhoods nor to persons of trifling affairs, as a single instance will show. There is now in process of settlement in a neighboring state the estate of a man which at the time of his death was valued at \$1,000,000. Rival claimants to the property engaged in litigation, which has extended over a period of several years, and now, as the end approaches, it is said the estate has dwindled to about \$23,000.

Manifestly the parties to this litiga tion have made a heavy investment in experience; but, unhappily for them, it is not what financiers call a "liquid asset"-Docket

MOONS OF THE UNIVERSE.

Besides Our Own Luna Twenty-five Others Are Known to Exist. There are in all twenty-five moons

besides our queen of night, Mars having two, Jupiter eight, Saturn ten, Uranus four and Neptune one, says the Philadelphia Public Ledger. Of course new lunar additions are likely to be discovered at any time, although it is improbable that Mercury and Venus have any satellites or that Mars has more than two.

The two known moons of Mars are, indeed, very minute, neither being over fifty miles in diameter. On the other hand, Jupiter's first four satellites, as well as Ganymede, are each larger than Queen Luna, Ganymede having a diameter of about 3,550 miles. Titan of Saturn possesses a diameter approximating 3,000 miles, while that of Neptune's sole satellite is about 2,000 miles.

As respects our own moon, Queen Luna has only one-forty-ninth the size and one-eighty-first the weight of our earth. Luna's distance from us varies a good deal, from 221,000 miles to 252. 000 miles. Her mean or average distance is about 238,000 miles.

NOTE AND COMMENT. A small Alberta town spends thousands of dollars on an advertis-

ing scheme, while a rich and prosperous county in Ontario is afraid to spend a few hundreds. And yet people wonder that Western towns go ahead quickly.

The three purely Canadian express companies which are doing business in Canada are capitalized at a little over \$4,000,000. The net earnings of these companies in the year ending June 30th last totalled over \$1,100,000, or upward of 27 per cent. on capitalization.

It is always best to wait for the evidence before passing judgment. When you hear reports detrimental to young ladies or gentlemen, don't be hasty in forming conclusions. It is better to be charitable when any one is in trouble. To-day it is somebody else's boy or girl; to-morrow it may be yours.

As an indication of what the farmers are up against in the way of labor, an extract from a letter, written to an Eckrid farmer in reply to an advertisement for farm help, is quoted :-- As I am thinking of going on a farm for the next year as I am used to all kinds of farm work I will come and work for you for 4 hundred a year or 250 for six months house rent and fire wood and privilege to keep one pig and one quart of milk per day if my terms suit let me know and we can meet and see if both are suited with the other."

Brains on the Farm.

How strangely the idea persists that less intelligence is required to succeed on a farm than in the city Why should any one suppose that the man who makes blunder after blunder in the office, the shop or the factory can go out into the country and show the farmers how to raise bumper crops? Perhaps it is because the country visitor to the city being unfamiliar with much that he sees there, is set down as "slow" and

The city-born visitor to the country impresses the farmer in the same way, and often with better reason; but that view of the matter he seldom sees. In point of fact, the city worker is essentially a specialist. The successful farmer, on the other hand, must have a practical knowledge of more things than the city man dreams of, and a versatility beyond his comprehen-

It was urged not long ago, says the Youth's Companion, at a meeting of the New York Child Welfare Committee, that for stupid boys who seemed to have little chance of success in the city, there would be a better prospect of "making good" if they were placed upon farms; but the plan met with a fortunately intelligent opposition, and was quickly

The number of country boys who succeed in the city is beyond reckoning. The cities would be at a loss without them. But those who succeeded would probably be as well off financially and live longer, if they had remained on the farm. who fail in the city would very



Aid to Thoroughbred Stallions.

The policy initiated in 1911 by the Department of Agriculture with reference to the granting of aid, under certain conditions, to the owners of thoroughbred stallions is generally meeting with approval and is accomplishing, in part at least, the objects sought when the policy was undertaken. Amongst other things, owing to the rigid conditions imposed, it owing to the rigid conditions imposed, it is encouraging those maintaining really high class horses and is serving to organize the system of breeding followed in the different communities where Thoroughbred stallions are located. The stimulus given, in this manner, to the use of Thoroughbred blood will, it is believed lead to an improvement in the lieved, lead to an improvement in the light horse stock of the country. Thor-oughbred stallions, if really good indi-vidualy, may be expected to exert such vidualy, may be expected to exert such an influence, in the development of Canadian horses, for saddle and harness use, as is greatly needed and greatly to be desired. The premium placed upon quality, soundness and prepotency, through the grants awarded by the Department is serving to check the use of unsuitable sires and is tending to conserve a type of Thereuchbred the utility of which is

sires and is tending to conserve a type of Thoroughbred, the utility of which is beyond question.

While, as perhaps should be stated it is not the intention of the Department to encourage the breeding of Thoroughbred horses or to develop a type in light horses approximating closely to that of the thoroughbred, there is no question but that a strong infusion of Thoroughbred blood in the light legged mares of the country will be of inestimable value in improving the quality of the stock got

Believing himself to be justified therefore, in further prosecuting the policy begun last year, the Honourable Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, has authorized the continuance of the grant, to be available for all Thoroughbred stalfons standing for public service during Rons, standing for public service during the season of 1912, which comply with the conditions imposed by the Depart-

The conditions under which assistance will be given are as follows:—

(1) All horses on account of which aid is given by the Department must be registered in the Thoroughbred Stud Book of the Canadian National Live Stock Records.

(2) Horses shall be of good size qual-

(2) Horses shall be of good size, quality and conformation and shall be free from all hereditary unsoundness; these conditions to be ensured by submission annually to a thorough, careful examination either at the hands of the Veterinary Director General or such other members of the veterinary staff of the Department, or other persons as the Minister may from time to time appoint for this pur-

ose.

(3) Horses so approved shall be duly and properly advertised to stand for service of mares, under the ordinary and general conditions usual in the districts in which they are to be kept, at an appropriate of the standard s annual service fee (except in the case of Thoroughbred mares) of not more than \$10.00 to insure, such service fee to become due and payable only when mares prove to be in foal.

Any person, firm or corporation owning or controlling any Thoroughbred stallion in regard to which all the conditions above set forth shall have been duly and properly fulfilled, shall, on produc-tion of satisfactory evidence thereof and of the fact that a reasonable number of mares, other than thoroughbred mares, have been served during the season, shall be entitled to receive at the close of each such season the sum of \$250 from the funds of the Live Stock Branch. If, in the event of a horse dying or be-coming incompacitated for service during the season, an improved substitute is immediately placed in the same district, the Minister may, after due consideration of the circumstances, authorize the payment of the subsidy above mentioned.

The necessary forms will be furnised on application to the Veterinary Director General and Live Stock Commissioner, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Toronto, March 25.--Mixed marriages were numerous in Ontario in 1910, acwere numerous in Ontario in 1910, according to the report of the register-general, issued to-day. Of the 3.586 Roman Catholic bridegrooms, 665 married Protestants. Of 3.765 Catholic brides, 844 married Protestants. Apparently more women than men married outside their church. Thirty-one of the men who took Catholic brides did not lay claim to any particular faith and two Roman Catholic protections.

Catholic brides did not lay claim to any particular faith and two Roman Catholic bridegrooms were married to Jewesses.

Marriages in 1910 totalled 24,036 and the statistics show that the marrying age is from 20 to 29 for men. During that year 4,471 women married between 15 and 19; 8,802 between 20 and 24, and 5,194 between 25 and 29.

Of all the deaths in the province, 20 8 per cent, were children. At present in Toronto it is estimated that four babies die per day.

The death rate from tuberculosis shows a steady decrease. In 1881 the death rate per 100,000 population was 121; in 1891

it was 112; in 1901 it went up to 150, The marriages in 1910 exceeded those

of 1909 by 375, the total number for 1910 being 2,293. This leads Dr. McCullough to observe as follows:

"In our opinion all licenses to marry should be advertised in a local news-paper. This would have the effect of checking clandestine marriages."

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

THE WHITE HOUSE.

Madison's Part in Giving the Execu-tive Mansion its Name.

Just how the White House came to be so designated is a question on which historians differ. A local his-torian in Washington thinks that the burden of proof tends to give credit for the name to President Madison.

The structure was made of Potomac river freestone, and the capitol proper was built of the same stone. At the time the British burned the executive mansion they did a lot of other damage, and the country was pressed for money to repair the same. The walls mansion were only slightly damaged, other than being blackened by smoke. Money was scarce, and congress made an appropriation to have the outside of the house painted. The executive mansion may have been called the White House before that time, but this investigator says that he has never been able to find any record of it. If Madison did not officlate at the christening it has been emphatically stated by the historian that he took a prominent part in publishing the fact that the White House was to be the name of the mansion. Up to the time of President Madison executive mansion, which is the legal name for it, was generally spoken of as the president's house, but since then it has been known by its permanent name of White House.-Ex-
