The two recitations "In Flanders Fields" and the reply "In Flanders Now" were given by William Fitzgerald and Miss Evelyn Fortner. Then followed the act of unveiling and saluting the Shield by Pte. Russell Acton, brother of Sig. Roy Acton, whose pages brother of Sig. Roy Acton whose name is on the shield. The vast congregation stood during this part of the service and then followed the National Anthem. Dr. Hicks, the Sunday School Supt., paid effective personal tribute to these young heroes who had sealed their loyalty and patriotism with their life blood and who lie buried somewhere in France.

The service was brought to a close by an appropriate address by Rev. A. C. Tiffin on "The Significance of This Shield," during which he reviewed the things which were in danger during the war, but which were safeguarded by these and other heroes, dead and alive. They and other heroes, dead and alive. They in reality proved to be our "Shield" in saving us from the Hun and the terrible consequences had the Allies failed to triumph in the struggle. The choir gave two appropriate anthems adding to the impressiveness of the service.

The standard upon which the shield rested for the occasion was heavily draped in black with purple ribbon and bow thus giving appropriate setting to a very impressive and memorable service. The shield will find permanent resting place on one of the side walls and do constant honor to our hero sons.





Farmers Must Wake Up

During the early stages of the present Victory Loan campaign it seemed that one class of the community which was showing reluctance in subscribing for Victory Bonds was the farming community, but it is hoped that before the subscription sheets close Saturday night, this reproach will have been removed. There were similar indications last year but during the last few days of the drive, farmers' subscriptions came in very

Anyone would be loath to believe that the farmers who of all classes of the community are most directly interested in a heavy over-subscription to the present Loan are spethetic. More than one third of proceeds of the last Loan was spent directly in the purchase of Canadian wheat and other foodstuffs, and re-sold to Great Britain and Allied conntries on credit. That is to say \$207,750 .-000 of the money subscribed a year ago went into the pockets of the farmer; and without these heavy purchases the farmer would have been obliged to dispose of his surplus product at a probable loss. The amount that will be spent during the coming year in financing credits to overseas purchasers of Canada's agricultural products is wholly contingent on the extent of the over-subscription to this year's Loan. Therefore if any farmer is desirous of seeing the present overseas market for his products maintained he will help pile up the total of Bond subscrtions. Buy bonds to-day,




