Provincial Paragraphs.

The government dredge St. Lawrence is now at work in the Saginaw River, dredging the mouth of the Saginaw River. Albert G. M. P. F., has resigned as a member in the Legislature, and is the recipient of deeds for Yarmouth County.

Basile A. Robichaux, Esq., of Meteghan, one of the oldest residents of the county, died Monday morning at the advanced age of 84. Col. Herbert of the Grenadier Guards the new commander of the Canadian militia, is expected to begin duty at the end of November.

The City Council of St. John has agreed to purchase the Carleton Branch Railway for \$200,000 and transfer it to the Canadian Pacific, which will give the latter a clear right of way to the western harbor. A Robb & Sons, of Amherst, has displayed their characteristic energy, since their heavy loss by fire, and now have an immense stock of their furniture, boiler, and machine shops in full swing, with new and improved machinery.

Halifax is importing beef and poultry from Ontario. A Halifax firm of importers have a slaughter-house at Guelph, Ont., where they now have over 100 head of cattle on the farm, and will do their own butchering. Direct shipments will be made weekly.

Letter 1.

Santiago de Chile, September 28, 1890. Santiago, the capital of Chile, has a population of 290,000. Situated in a wide and fertile valley, overlooked by the mighty Cordillera de las Andes, with its peaks, its steeply sloping volcanoes, gleaming snows and ice, this city can at least claim to be interesting. On the west of the city rises the lower ocean range.

To all appearances Santiago is a "mountain town." The plain or valley in which the city rests is 1900 feet above the sea, and it is at this level to the eye an old ocean town. From the plain the mountains rise abruptly. The hills of the coast range tell them they roll away in long swells till they dip beneath the ocean. Each trough is a fertile valley.

The Cordillera de los Andes, in its whole extent, is never greater than in the province of Santiago. Here these mountains rise in culminating points to the height of 20,000 feet. The lower slopes are in spring snow-covered. Higher up are to be seen the various-colored strata, and higher still the snow and ice clinging to the shelves and ledges of rock. From the snow rise black rocks, from whose dizzy heights the fearless tourist gazes on the panorama of the Argentine or out over the Pacific and perhaps down into the gaping crater of San Thome and Maipo. In past ages all these vast undisturbed surs and white that these spots receive the name of "dove's snow."

So completely surrounded by mountains in Santiago that no outlet can be seen. The hills of the Cordillera are so high, traversing all of Southern Chile as far as the Gulf of Reloncote, that it is impossible to see the sea from Santiago. In summer only gentle breezes and a more delightful climate it would be difficult to describe. When a gust of wind does happen to sweep down from the mountains, issuing in a penetrating way, a superheated air, in the spinal column of the faithful waiter for had often and has almost the same effect as the tremors of earthquakes.

Santiago is seven miles long by six broad. The city is well laid out, the streets forming a regular grid. The suburbs are as a rule crowded, but with the exception of some of the streets of poverty, Santiago is a fine city. On the principal streets are to be seen many splendid buildings with imposing staircases, some ranking as palaces. Many of the new houses are constructed on the European style and may be seen side by side the architecture of modern Europe and that of old Spanish America.

In times past for fear of earthquakes the houses were built very low—only one story high. The walls being of a kind of rammed earth and straw brick. The average height of these walls was about twenty feet. On the walls, every window opening was covered with tiles. These roofs were heavy and well adapted to keep out the great heat of a mid-summer sun as well as the heavy rains of winter. People now seem to think that an earthquake sufficiently heavy to throw down a three-story building will be just as destructive to houses of only one. They are raising buildings of three stories. Perhaps the real cause of this change in the sort of building is the fact that the insurance companies in the city do not give the same high rates of insurance on houses of one story as they do on houses of three stories.

The interiors of Chilean houses are on the old European plan—the rooms being built round a central patio or courtyard. The doors opening on the streets are large and very massive. These doors are decorated with knockers, and some of them are very ornate. These useful appendages to street doors are most delicately moulded handles. I heard an Englishman remark on the old country say: "These 'blasting' angles' hands are so tempting, I would like to squeeze them, and they are quite different from the five-pointed knobs which are used in England." A Review.

THE FEAST OF SAINT ANNE AND OTHER POEMS, BY PIERRE STANLEY HENRI, French. London and New York. All our school boys, and many of their mothers, are familiar with the outlines, at least, of the ill-fated expedition of D'Availle. In the French version they will find an immense and fully equipped squadron of some seventy of the finest ships of war possessed by France, whose destination was "To that New World's sacred trodden shore, where first the martial hero's foot pressed, Springs forth to meet his embracing arm, and there it was intended to cradle, if not destroy, the stars of England, America, and especially in this province. For this purpose they sailed."

These words are from the Armande's tale; and the reader will find the details of their ill-fated voyage. The expedition was planned by the Duke of Arville. It was the man chosen by the King to lead the expedition to the west coast of North America. He was appointed viceregal.

The story of the expedition is told in a series of short stories, each dealing with a different aspect of the voyage. The first story is "The Death of D'Availle," which tells of the hero's death at the hands of the natives. The second story is "The Heroine of St. John," which tells of the love affair between D'Availle and a native girl.

The third story is "The Plague," which tells of the outbreak of the plague on the island of St. John. The fourth story is "The Siege of the Fort," which tells of the attack on the fort by the natives. The fifth story is "The Escape," which tells of the escape of D'Availle and his followers from the island.

The sixth story is "The Death of the Heroine," which tells of the death of the native girl. The seventh story is "The Burial," which tells of the burial of D'Availle. The eighth story is "The Return," which tells of the return of the expedition to France.

The ninth story is "The Legacy," which tells of the legacy left by D'Availle to the natives. The tenth story is "The End," which tells of the end of the expedition. The book is a very interesting and well-written history of the expedition of D'Availle, and is well worth a read.
