Fifteen extra troughs have been dded to the Windsor Fish Hatchery, hereby increasing its capacity three quarters of a million. Last year 22.-000 fry were liberated in the stream above the hatchery, and at the same point 2,000 healthy fingerlings were also given their freedom. The Mill Pond, Fall and Maple Brooks have been closed to fishermen, and a heavy penalty is invited through the breaking of this regulation. The only permit for fishing in these waters is granted to hatchery overseer or one of his assistants in connection with hatchery experiments, and such permit only comes through special permission from the department. It is out of the question, as well as unjust, for any individual other than above described, to seek a special permit for fishing privileges in these waters .- Hants Journal.


