Well-Known Granville Man Dies Slump in Apple Prices in London in St. John

Dealer of St. John, Well-Known Throughout the Annapolis Valley, Passes Away from Sudden Attack of Heart Trouble.

The very sudden death occurred at his home in St. John on the night of November sixth, of W. Rupert Willett, a native of Granville, and well-known throughout the Valley.

Mr. Willett was 53 years of age, and was a son of the late Gilbert Willett, of Granville, who lived to be an octogenarian. Mr. Willett, senior, was a direct descendant of the first of New York's English-speaking Mayors, being a great-great-grandson. His wife, the mother of Mr. Rupert Willett, still survives, and lives on the old homestead. Mr. Willett carried on farming in Granville until five years ago, when he went to St. John and joined his son, John G. Nova Scotia apples have declined from two to three shillings per barrel in the English market within the past few days, according to cable advices received by local importers. The slump followed the almost simultaneous arrival at London of two steamers from Halifax laden with 40,000 barrels. Ribstons, Blenheims and Kings, the only varieties now being exported, are selling at prices ranging between 10s. and 12s. per barrel. Quebec, Nov., 6-The Canadian Northern royal mail steamer Royal George grounded this evening during a fog on the St. Lawrence river, one mile east of Point St. Laurent, Island of New Orleans. Besides a general cargo she carried 900

The Royal George sailed from Bristol (Eng.), on Wednesday, Oct., 30, to make her last trip in the St. Lawrence trade quarantine station this afternoon and at 4.10 o'clock this afternoon started for the port of Ouebec, having a distance of 25 miles to cover before she could reach her moorings at the Louise decks, and in order to reach port in time to allow a landing of her steerage passengers in compliance with the immigration regulations, came up the river at full speed feeling her way through the fog with a rush when she crashed into the rocks.

A FAMOUS BEACON.

The Navesink Light, Near Sandy Hook

is a Wonder The most powerful light in America s housed on a promontory near Sandy Hook, 250 feet above the beach, where it acts as a safeguard to all ships entering or leaving the harbor of New York. It is called Navesink light and is of 95,000,000 candle power. At fifteen or twenty tules its flash is as pointed and brilliant as a star. On a perfectly clear night its shaft of light can be seen 100 miles at sea. When it was erected it was operated at twice its present candle power. 

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SHADOW PICTURES.

Photographs That Can Be Made by the Aid of a Magnet.

It is possible to produce, with the aid of a magnet, shadow photographs resembling those made by action of the X ray. Either an electromagnet or a permanent magnet will answer the pur

l'lace a key or other iron or steel object on the sensitive film of an ordinary photographic plate, then bring the poles of the magnet near the other side of the plate and keep them there for five minutes or more. Upon developing the plate a shadow picture of the key or other object, us sharp and well defined as any of the A ray pictures. will be found

By this method only iron or steel or other paramagnetic substances may be photographed, but the sensitive side of the plate is turned toward the magnetic poles and a disk of tron nearly as large as the plate is placed on the other side then shadow pictures of any nonmagnetic objects, placed on the sensitive film facing the magnet, may be obtained. With an electromagnet capable of litting a weight of 100 pounds one scientist has made such pictures through two tuches of interposed wood. He has also obtained shadow plotures with a compound steel magnet weighing little more than a pound.-New York Trib

ORIGIN OF "BLACKLEG."

The Term Came From Race Track Men Who Were Black Tep Beets,

The term blackleg, which has come to mean one who systematically tries to win money by cheating in connection with races or with cards, billiards or other games of skill or chance and is used as synonymous with a swindler, a weisher, is of uncertain origin. Some authorities connect it with the black legs of a gamerock, so much used by the sporting traternity for bet-

According to another and more probable view, the expression had no disgraceful sense attached to it at first, out was applied to turf and sporting men because they were often in the habit of wearing black top twots. When blackleg had thus become a current phrase for professional sporting men it probably passed into use as applied more particularly to those who took an unfair advantage of their opportunities to cheat the unwary.

The derivation of this term was once solemnly argued before the full court of queen's bench upon a motion for a new trial for liber, but that learned tribunal was unable to decide its origin.-London Standard.

The Bitter End. You have probably often heard a person say "I will follow it to the bitter end" or something to that effect, but very few persons know that this is a nautical term and is borrowed from a ship's cable. If you have ever been on a big ship you must have noticed two big pieces of wood sticking up out of the deck forward, alongside each other. They sometimes have a windlass between them, and they are used to secure the cable that goes to the anchor. These pieces of wood are called the bitts. When the ship comes to anchor and the cable is paid out all that part of it which is abaft or behind the bitts is called the bitter end of the cable. In a storm or in poor holding ground for anchors the more cable that is paid out the better the anchor will hold, and when the captain is at all doubtful he pays out his cable to the bitter end sooner than risk any harm to his ship.—New York Press.

Along the rocky shores of New England is much indelible ink. It is better than any that can be bought-a beautiful crimson in color and when applied to fabrics absolutely unchange able. This ink is contained in little bottles put up by Nature herself, the receptacles in question being certain whelks, or sea snails, of the species known to science as Purpura lapillus. If the shell of one of these whelks be broken there will be found just under the skin of the back a slender whitish vein containing a yellow liquor. The latter when applied to linen with a small brush and exposed to the sun turns first green, then blue, then purple and finally a brilliant crimson.

TEACHERS' CAMPS. Cadet Instructors Receive Practical

The Canadian Government, acting in conjunction with the educational authorities, has established, at several points of the Dominion, camps for the assistance and qualification of cadet-instructors. At these camps a course is outlined which if followed faithfully will enable and qualify the men—especially school teachers—to carry on cadet work and train the youth of our land along the line of outdoor activity. Skill with arms and movement in formed bodies, protection—outposts, advance flank and rear guards—attack, defence, physical training, games, and athletics, and a hearty co-operation with one's fellows for the securing of a desired corporate end, apart from an individual end, are constantly held in view in these training camps during the course of instruction.

One of these camps which will serve as an example was established at as an example was established at Sturgeon Creek, some seven miles out of Winnipeg, on the old Rifle Range. Here thirty-four men, nearly all teachers, has completed a six weeks' course, which entitles each to a Cadet Instructor's Certificate. Cadet corps to be officially recognized and to participate in the rights and privileges of such, must be in charge of some one who has had this or equivalent training. It is to furnish such instructors and strengthen and guide the movement that the authorities have established these camps.

ment that the authorities have established these camps.

Half of the thirty-four men who took the course at Sturgeon Creek were from Manitoba and half from Saskatchewan. They are allowed their transportation and \$1.50 per day; their expenses are \$1 per day for messing in addition to their uniforms and books, which cost about \$2.50 or \$3.

Apart from the valuable training these teachers got and the securing of an Instructor's Certificate, the period

an Instructor's Certificate, the period was a delightful and helpful outing. It might be interesting to know what a typical day's duties are, and the following will serve as a sample Reveille, 6 a.m.; breakfast, 7.30 a.m.; physical drill, 8.30 a.m. till 9.30 a.m.; company drill, 9.45 a.m. till 10.30 a.m.; lecture on the "Attack," 10.45 a.m. till 11.30 a.m.; infantry in battle, 11.45 a.m. till 12.30 p.m.; lunches cheon, 1 p.m.; musketry, 2 p.m. till 3 p.m.; signalling, 3.15 p.m. till 3.45 p.m.; lecture on "Map Reading," 7 p.m. till 8 p.m.

I am sure if it were more widely known among teachers many more would take the course if for nothing more than the personal benefit and enjoyment to be derived. It, however, is much more than an outing. The establishing of corps of Cadets,

Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, and instruction in drills is only part of a general movement towards the securing girls of our land, a desire to send them into life physically healthier, mentally brighter, more aiert, moral-ly stronger and more self-reliant, with ability to act promptly and heartily together as occasion may demand in

The end in view is not preparation for war only, although if that should occur Canadians would be in a better position to carry on operations defen-sive or offensive as might be necessary for the maintenance of the security of their homes or as might be needed to preserve the integrity of the Empire. This is a duty incumbent on every one because under the Militia Act every one is practically a Canadian militiaman.—Canadian Courier.

MEERSCHAUM MINING.

The Pits at Nemiau Have Been Worked

For Twenty Centuries. en worked for 2,000 years, it is claimed, and the process is quite simple. The mines, which at one time reached from mines, which at one time reached from Kahe to Mihalitch, on the sea of Marmora, are concentrated around the city of Eski-Shehr and give employment to

The mines are worked in the most primitive manner by a foreman and two to five workmen with picks. The depths of the pits vary greatly and de-pend upon the depth at which a reddish brown earth is met, which is the first indication of the existence of mag-

Sometimes this red earth is found only a few yards beneath the surface, but ordinarily at a depth of twenty yards, often forty and even sixty. In this layer of red earth meerschaum is regular shape. The size of these rarely exceeds twelve to sixteen cubic inches. The greater part are of the size of a walnut. No explosives are used, the ground being soft.

Almost the entire output of this article is exported to Vienna and thence distributed to the various European countries and to the United States, the latter buying only the finest selections.
