#### POSSIBILITY.

BY WM. C. KNIGHT.

V's road in a recent number of a prominent Philatelic Journal, a list of the three largest collections in the world, the first being the collection of Herr Von Ferrary, of Paris, who spent 24 years of his life in enlarging his collection, and it is now valued at a million and a half. Think of that ! Some of our large Corporations feel solid with less backing and capital than that, and here is a million and a half spent and nothing to show for it but a classified collection of stamps.

The next on the list is the Taplin collection, valued at \$500,000, and the third on the list is Sterr Breitfuss, of St. Petersburg, Russia. He has devoted 40 years to acquiring stamps, adding patiently and faithfully to his collection, so that now it is valued at \$300,000. Many will smile at the fortune invested in these bits of paper. and probably the remark follows that after all it is only a form of madness. but philatelists know different. They all have the same instincts and ambitions, and that is to have a collection that they must be proud of, and if-it were possible we would all be Von Ferrarys, Tapplins, and Breitfusss, philatelic honours. but when we consider that 24 years under ordinary conditions and circumstances that most every modern philatelist is master of, why cannot time produce a like valuable collection. Think of the value of any fair sized collection of today 40 years from now. The young philatelist, as he looks at his collection, which numbers 3000 or more, is often discouraged, and thinks "What is the use of the whole thing, anyway." Well, there is a use for it. When one has spent a year or two within the realm of philately he thinks too much time has been wasted, and without fruit or reward of any kind. Some noted writer has said that man is just chucked full of possibilities, and why can't this apply equally as well Just to introduce ourselves we offer in the realm of philately as in anything else. The man with a hobby is blessed, has been written time and again, and he that has the sticking qualities to add day by day to his collection, and whose interest is always The U.S. and Colony Packet awakened and refreshed, never lagging and purposeless, to him all is possible in the realm of Philately.

#### The Philatelist Periobicals.

The Philatelic Bulletin for November 25, as usual looks hardsome; Old Dominion Notes by A g. Dietz. The Stamps of Schleswig Holstein by Lacus Viridis; Canadian Notes, A Reference List of Type and Die Varieties by J. L. Kilbon; and the Press Review make a readable number.

The Illinois Philatelist is a bright little journal of small pages and narrow columns. One thing is lacking which no journal should be without, and that is the number of the pages on the corner. F. G. Snow, John Peltz, R. L. Dook and Cecil Russon contribute, while the publisher, S. E. Moisant, is editorially breezy.

(Since writing the above, the journal has given up, owing to denial of second class rates.)

The Indiana Philatelist comes from Goshen, Ind., Vol. 1, No. 1 showing little reading matter, but it looks clean and we can expect a good journal here-

The Bay State Philatelist came minus a cover for December. We should hate to believe it had dispensed with it altogether. The publisher rather smusingly calls me "the grand old man" of philatelic journalism. To be sure, I am no chicken, but am still very young in the philatelic world. Cecil Ranson gives "Advice to a Young Dealer," but he cannot be a very old dealer himself. (Keep quiet Cecil! )

Mis. Amy L Swift gives us "The Thoughts of Woman-kind" in the newly-fledged Buckeye Philatelist published by Paul Cline of Tippecanoe city, Ohio. Mr. Cline, although a young man, has written some for other journals. E. L. Fischer, Gerard Morrison, Leon V. Cars, J. fl. Lowe and others contribute. The typography is clean, but the using of long "dashes" throughout is rather peculiar and monotonous.

The November Post Office is full of good things, some original and some reprinted.

Dr. B. A. Cattlon is an interesting writer at all times and his "Chicago Notes" and "Odds and Ends" in the Herald Exchange for November and December show it. This journal has larg pages like the JUBILEE PHILAT-ELIST, and is very popular with those who make use of exchange advertise-
