Dr. Carson says :-

Baptism washes away sins, not because it is the first ordinance, but because it is an emblematical washing of the body with water. We wash away sins in baptism just as we cat the flesh of Jesus in the Lord's Suppor.

Dr. Francis Wayland, expressing the views of Baptists, says:---

The person baptized abjures the world and enters into covenant with God-he was dead in sin, he is now alive unto God. This is what we supposo is meant to be symbolized in the ordinance of baptism.

Thus in the old times it was all upon the basis that baptism is only a symbol. (Continued on page 3.)

He, therefore, who longs for unfailing communion with the friend of his heart's affection, may know that that communion is open to him, if only he will unselfishly open his heart in an unfailing readiness to be of loving service to that friend.

An unselfishly loving mother is in constant communion with her absent son, away at school or college, or in the activities of business, or in the temptations of undesirable companionship. Her boy may forget his loving mother, or may give little thought to her love or to her wishes; but she can never for got him, even while she seems to others to be absorbed in the duties of her daily home life away from him. She thinks of him; she prays for him she lives in an attitude of readiness to servo him-by her love, by her faith, by her labors, or by her very life it self, if that could help him. A loving mother's communion with her loved boy is often all on her side; but it is none the less, rather all the more, real and holy and procious for that.

Ho who loves Christ unselfishly is ever in the spirit of communion with Christ, and with all who are dear to Christ Because he loves Christ, he is ready to serve Christ, and is ready to serve those whom Christ makes His own representatives. No matter what he is doing, whether he is at work or at worship or at recreation, he is in the attitude of readiness for service at the call of 11im whom he loves. His communion with his Lord-in this scuso of readiness for service-is no more real in one place-or in one occupation, than in another, even though he recognizes his duty and his privilege to be in one place or in one occupation for the time being, as alone consistent for that time with the scrvice he owes to his Master. Bound to a loving friend is bound to his friend, the disciple of the Lord Jesus is by this binding love in constant and unfailing communion with Him in whom he lives and moves and has his being. And here, as in no other sphere of being, he who enjoys this spirit of communion may be sure that it is recognized, welcomed and reciprocated by Him toward whom it is lovingly exercised. 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

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

Around a few passages the battle has raged, and especially around Acts ii. 38, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus. Christ for the remusion of sins" In former times how strongly it was insisted that baptism is the symbol of that faith which procures remission of sins; that baptism is on account of and not in order to the remission of sins. the phrase "for remission of sins" tire exhortation, not one part of it to the exclusion of the other. And se he translates in order to the forgiveness of sins. The Bible Union Version, representing the scholarship of Drs. Conant, Hackett, Kendrick and others, Bays "unto remission of sins."

Dr Patton then gave certain deliverances of some of his own brothren present in the Conference, and whose names he omitted out of deference to them, so that I am unable to indentify the authors of these very interesting extracts, which show a decided leaning to the views of the Disciples. The quotations were prefaced by Dr. Patton as follows: "These brethren show a change, a progressiveness of thought as regards their definition of the design of baptism. In an article on Baptism and Remission, based upon Acts ii. 38, in connection with other passages, a brother says:-

"Certainly it would seem that baptism must be very important—inti-mately connected with remission and salvation. How can an unprojudiced mind survey this testimony and then relegate baptism to the realm of more emblem, symbol and profession?

"Further on he says:--

"Baptism is the third of three gospel conditions to which jointly is annoxed the promise of remission. The others are repentance and faith, which baptism is designed to express, embody and consummate.

"Another brother says :--

"A fair reading of Scripture shows that men were discipled by baptism, were baptized for the forgiveness of

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
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
