Fifteen Thousand Men Routed By Fierce Bayonet Charge, In Which Indian Troops Suffered Severely—Turks Used Machine Guns.

LONDON, April 16.—(\$.30 p.m.)—The British India troops have inflicted another defeat on the Turks in the vicinity of Shaiba, Mesopotamia, altho at a considerable loss to themselves, their casualties being about 700. This announcement was made by the India office in an official report issued tonight. The report says that after clearing the Turks out of their positions north and west of Shaiba last Tuesday, the British on Wednesday continued their offensive in the direction of Zobeir, four miles south of Shaiba fort. The Turks were driver, out of the advanced position, and the British attack was then directed against their main line near the Birjisiyeh wood.

At Bayonet Point.

"Here," says the report, "the enemy, whose strength is estimated at at least 15,000 men, including six regular battalions, with six guns, had occupied a series of well-concealed trenches, from which they were able to direct a heavy rifle and machine gun fire on our advancing troops.

"Nevertheless, our attack drove the enemy out of his trenches at the point of the bayonet, and the whole line of his position was finally captured, tho not without heavy loss to our side."

The casualties are believed to amount to about 700 men of all ranks. On the other hand, the Turks were so severely handled that they retired to Nakhailah, 19 miles northwest of Zobeir.

FRENCH AVIATORS BLOW UP GERMAN POWDER MAGAZINE

Shell Factory Also Bombarded-Metz Electric Light and Power Plant Partially Wrecked, and Three Airmen Driven to Death.

PARIS, April 16.—Successful operations were conducted by French aviators today, in which they bombarded a German shell factory, blew up a German powder magazine, hit the central electrical station which supplies Metz

man powder magazine, hit the central electrical station which supplies Metz City and forts with light and power, and gave chase to three German aviators, who were forced to land. The official report follows:

"Our aviators were very active. Ten bombs were thrown on the workshops of the railway station of Leopoldshohe, which were being used for the manufacture of shells. Ten bombs were dropped on the powder magazine at Rotthwell. Six struck the mark, and a huge red flame shot up, surrounded by dark smoke. The aeroplanes were struck by shell splinters, but returned safe and sound.

"Forty bombs, most of which struck their mark, were dropped on the central electric station at Maizieres Les Metz, about ten miles north of Metz smoke rose from the central building. On their return, our aviators encountersuffered no mishaps, altho subjected to a violent cannonade from the Metz

BATTLE IN CLOUDS

Swoops Down on Raider and Shoots Dead Pilot and Observer.

NORTH OF FRANCE, April 16,-Garros, the famous French aviator, than whom no one has done finer ser vice during the war, added another exploit to his already large list, at Dunkirk this morning. A German aeroplane was reported shortly before six o'clock heading for the town doubtless for the purpose of bombdropping. It is one of Garros specialties to give battle to the enemy's aircraft when aloft in the clouds, and his energies have been often called for within the last few days, during which German activity has been greatly accentuated, so he was quickly on the track of this morning's invader when an aeroplane was beating it for speed. He was able to jockey for position at his will and finally swooped upon it from above and behind, reserving his fire with admirable coolness.

Bombs Dropped at Many Points in Kent County and Anglia.

AVOIDED LARGE CITIES

Towns Attacked Probably Mistaken for Naval Base Sheerness.

LONDON, April 16.-(10.80 p.m.)-England this afternoon experienced its third hostile air raid within 43 hours, but the last, like those immediately preceding it, resulted in no loss of life and no serious damage to prop

Taking advantage of fine flying weather, which enabled a Zeppelin airship to visit the vicinity of the Tyne Wednesday night and the coasts of Suffolk and Essex early this morning a German aeroplane, having crossed the North Sea this afternoon, flew over the County of Kent dropped-in the vicinity of the towns of Faversham and Sittingbourne, the latter just across the Busic from the Isle of Sheppey, which is the birth-place of the British royal naval dying corps. All the bombs fell in fields.

Missed Naval Base. Zeppelins, for it is believed there were two of them, visited Anglia during the early hours of this morning and dropped some 25 incendiary and explosive bombs on Lowestoft. Southwold, Maldon, Burnham on the Grouch, Heybridge and Tillingham, but, tike the raid of the previous night on the Tynemouth district, only material damage was done, and little at that, altho a number of persons had very narrow escapes. In Lowestoft a bomb dropped in a garden shattered a row of small houses, and people sleeping in them were cut by broken glass.

During the three raids at least fifty bombs have been sent down by the Germans. Either by error or purposely the airmen seem to have kept away from the larger towns, where they might have been discovered by scarchlights and come under fire from the land. There is an inclination here to consider the raid only in the nature of reconnaissances, for except in case

to consider the raid only in the nature of reconnaissances, for, except in case of aeroplanes' bases, points of military importance were avoided, altho in each importance were avoided, altho in each case aircraft passed within a short distance of such places. In view of this belief extra precautions are being taken while the fine weather lasts. The allies already are making reprisals for all German attacks over the fighting zone, and it is considered here to be likely that the raids over England will receive their reply before very long.



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

## LIQUOR BUSINESSES STATE CONTROLLED

Attitude of Ministerialists to Scheme Disquiets Liberals.

Special Cable to The Toronto World.

LONDON, April 16.—Some disquietude has been caused in Liberal circles by the romor that some sections of ministerial opinion are not very favorable to the scheme for the acquisition by the state of breweries and licensed houses. There is considerable public opinion in favor of state control of the trade, and brewers also are said to be not averse to this step. ## A HEAVY DEMAND FOR WAR STAMPS

Public Getting Accustomed to New Stickers, Altho Many Forget.

With the supply of war-tax stamps still inadequate the Toronto Postoffice officials had to wire to Ottawa yesterday for a million more stickers. There has been much confusion since the tax came into operation over the matter of using inland revenue stamps on mail matter. Postmaster-General Casgrain settled the difficulty by sending a wire to Postmaster Rogers to the effect that the inland revenue stamps could not be used on firstclass mail.

Already some 12,000,000 war-tan stamps has been distributed in the Toronto district of Ontario. The heavy mail on Thursday night was followed by one that was slightly befollowed by one that was signify below the normal on Friday. The increase was due to the fact that advertising firms took adayntage of the opportunity to place their claims before the public before the higher rate vent into effect.

The mail was normal again last night, and with a large shipment of the war-tax stamps arriving in Toronto this morning, the rush was nearly met. The tax on railway and steamship tickets is carefully large. met. The tax on railway and steam-ship tickets is causing a little incon-venience, and will do so until the pub-lic gets accustomed to the new order of things. The railway men point out that the United States has had a war-tax for several months, and that the levy on steamship tickets is greater on the other side of the line than it is in Canada.

#### Pruning the Rosebushes

This is another thing our gardeners had better attend to now. I notice in my own little backyard that some of the rose bushes are already showing signs of many fat leaf-buds. If some of the extra growth is cut back, all the growth that would otherwise go to those branches can be utilized else-

where. It is as a rule a good plan to prune the rosebushes early, for this reason. But, remember, all rosebushes should not oe pruned the same way. Rosebush pruning is a science in itself, and depends almost entirely upon the kind of bush you have—and as a rule our gardeners have several kinds—and as well, upon the individual characteristics and needs of each especial bush. We cannot expect our new gardeners to know their rosebusnes yet, but if they plant even one rose bush (and if they plant even one rose bush (and while they are at it let them plant a good three-year-old), they should study that bush during this summer and find out all the things they can about it.

As e say, rose pruning is a science in itself and the best we can do in this department just now is to indicate a few of the fundamental principles of rose pruning.

#### A Play With a Purpose

The idea of the play perhaps deserves more attention than it is likely to get in a commercial age. It is. broadly, the relation of the artist to his times, where his maintenance is in question. The artist in all the lines of fine art used to depend upon a patron, and often fared well enough but had also to run the risk of many slights and turns of favor. If he has now acquired independence it is at the risk of a livelihood, and he has to console himself with deciding that a precarious livelihood is to be preferred to a precarious patron. Mr. Bell-Smith's hero was lacking in the commercial instinct. Some artists, in all the lines of fine art, have the commercial faculty sufficiently developed. A few of them are no stronger in this respect than the ordinary business man who is responsible, according to the commercial agents, for ninety-five per cent. of failures in all the new businesses started.


It is generally felt that socialism does not fully answer the question of the artist's vocation. It is difficult to convince the ordinary socialist that great socialists like Bernard Shaw, for example, should be permitted to survive. Mr. Bell-Smith did not profess to solve his problem. He merely stated it. He hinted at government ownership in the conclusion when the Hungarian Government bought the artist's picture for \$25,000. But obviously there is no solution of the problem as long as money continues to be a medium of exchange. And this appears to us to be the weakest point about Mr. Bell-Smith's play. Money must be abolished before the artist can be perfectly free. But we doubt if the author is prepared to go to this radical extremity.

#### India's Share in the War

During the debate on the budget in the Legislative Council of India, the viceroy, Lord Hardinge, made the gratifying announcement that all signs pointed to an unusually large surplus of wheat this year available for export. In order to prevent any interference with prices thru gambling operations the Indian Government has fixed minimum prices in the dependency, and has further assumed control of the export trade, which is expected to yield a considerable margin of profit. That profit will probably be devoted to the development of agriculture and the benefit of the agricultural classes.

The conduct of the Indian troops, who have been employed not only in Europe, but in Africa, Egypt and Mesopotamia, has been everywhere excellent and the loyalty displayed thruout the whole Indian Empire has been wonderful beyond expectation. India will certainly participate in the changes that will attend the close of the war. That these will mark another stage in the development of the imperial ideal is as certain as is the

## BRITISH FIRED MINE IN ENEMY'S LINES

Successful Operation in German Trenches Won Village for Allies.

CASUALTIES MANY

Particulars of Incident Near Armentieres in Official

LONDON, April 16 .- News of an ortant mining operation by the France, by which a hole was blown in the German line, is contained in an cial eye-witness narrative dated April 16, and issued by the government press bureau. It follows:

"On the morning of the ninth we fired a mine at LeTouquet (LeTougel.) two miles from Armentieres. The greater part of the village was in our hands, but the enemy's lines on the outskirts ran thru houses connected by toop-holed garden walls. Under this position a gallery was driven, despite the difficulty of underground

despite the difficulty of underground excavation thru the waterlogged areas close to the river.

Belief That War Influence Will Extend Into Next Harvest.

CHICAGO, April 16.—Wheat rose at one time today nearly 5c a bushel. The jump was accompanied by assertions that foreigners were buying new crop deliveries and were also purchasing new crop flour on account of belief that the war influence would extend into the 1915 harvest. Unusually heavy profit-taking, tho, led to a reaction, the market closing unsettled 1-8c off to 31-8c up compared with last might. Corn gained 13-8c to 15-8c net and oats 5-8c to 13-8c. In provisions the outcome varied from 5c decline to 15c advance.

Buying demand centred chiefly on the July option, a new crop month, and seemed to have broadened out away beyond what would naturally be required to cover any previous short selling. Word of a big advance in prices at Buenos Ayres and of extraordinary European competition for what little was left of the Argentine surplus served to emphasize reports of foreign buying here and elsewhere in the United States, especially at Kansas City and the seaboard.

Sales of wheat features here to realize profits amounted to several million bushels before the market showed a decided tendency toward a setback. No doub the opening of lage navigation, which permits heavy shipments from Duluth and other important points and will perhaps result in a rapid decrease of the visible supply total, had much to do with the unmistakably strengthened feeling on the buying side. The market also fesponded more or less to the bullish influence of huge export clearances for the day and the week.






