FRENCH AVIATORS BLOW UP MAGAZINE | ZEPPELIN RAID FAILS Russians, By Surprise Attack, Carry Height in Carpathians INDIAN TROOPS DRIVE 15,000 TURKS FROM STRONG POSITION

DUTCH CALL FOR REPRISALS FOR SINKING VESSEL
Ministerial Conferences Held Upon Torpedoing of Steamer at Anchor.

SUBMARINE GUILTY
Belief Held That Attempt Was Made to Sink Ship With Belgians.

THE HAGUE, April 16.—(Via London, 10.25 p.m.)—Further ministerial conferences were held today to consider the sinking of the Dutch steamer "Katwijk," from Baltimore to Rotterdam, with a cargo of grain consigned to the Netherlands Government, in the North Sea Wednesday night. The sinking of the steamer without warning has aroused the most widespread public irritation, and has called forth stinging protests from all the newspapers, and from even those inclined toward the German side.

BULGARIA TO JOIN ENTENTE POWERS?
LONDON, April 17, 3.14 a.m.—Premier Radolov of Bulgaria has acknowledged the possibility of Bulgaria's impending participation in the war in support of the triple entente powers, says The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent. "This attitude brought about by Germany's refusal to deliver munitions of war which Bulgaria has paid for or to make the April loan advance as agreed upon."

British Under Deadly Fire Carried Turkish Position
Fifteen Thousand Men Routed By Fierce Bayonet Charge, in Which Indian Troops Suffered Severely—Turks Used Machine Guns.

LONDON, April 16.—(8.30 p.m.)—The British India troops have inflicted another defeat on the Turks in the vicinity of Shaiba, Mesopotamia, altho at a considerable loss to themselves, their casualties being about 700. This announcement was made by the India office in an official report issued tonight. The report says that after clearing the Turks out of their positions north and west of Shaiba last Tuesday, the British on Wednesday continued their offensive in the direction of Zobeir, four miles south of Shaiba fort. The Turks were driven out of the advanced position, and the British attack was then directed against their main line near the Birjajiyah wood.

LONDON, April 17.—(2.30 a.m.)—The Amsterdam correspondent of Reuters' Telegram Company, writing under date of Friday, says: "Turkish headquarters reports that a cruiser yesterday bombarded the Dardanelles fortifications from the entrance. A Russian fleet bombarded Ereğli and Sunguldaik (in Asia Minor, on the Black Sea)."

FRESH SUCCESS BY MUSCOVITES IN CARPATHIANS
Austrian Force Surprised and Practically Wiped Out Near Zuella.

GERMANS DEFEATED
Confirmation Received of Rout of Bavarians in Fierce Battle.

GREECE IS READY FOR PLUNGE
ATHENS, April 15.—Prince George of Greece will return to Paris tomorrow. His departure is thought to have a bearing on the political situation. The Journal Herald indicates that the government is making overtures to relinquish neutrality, and these overtures are understood to be well advanced.

BOMBS KILL TEN AT AMIENS
AMIENS, France, April 15.—(11.30 p.m.)—Several bombs have been dropped by a German Taube aeroplane in the vicinity of the cathedral here. Ten persons were killed or wounded. The material damage done was slight.

DARING EXPLOIT OF FAMOUS BIRDMAN
French Aviator, Garros, Brings Down German Aeroplane Near Dunkirk.

BATTLE IN CLOUDS
Swoops Down on Raider and Shoots Dead Pilot and Observer.

GERMANS ARRIVE AT CONSTANTINOPLE
LONDON, April 17, 3.05 a.m.—Telegraphing from Sofia under date of Thursday, The Times' correspondent says: "A Russian fleet has bombarded Kara Burnu, which lies inside the Thetatalja line on the Black Sea, about 25 miles north of Medea. "Travelers from Dedegatch report that a fresh batch of German officers has arrived in Constantinople. They say also that the greater part of the garrison of Adrianople, Demotica and Kirk-Kilissah, have been withdrawn for the defence of the capital."

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FRENCH AVIATORS BLOW UP GERMAN POWDER MAGAZINE
Shell Factory Also Bombarded—Metz Electric Light and Power Plant Partially Wrecked, and Three Airmen Driven to Death.

PARIS, April 16.—Successful operations were conducted by French aviators today, in which they bombed a German shell factory, blew up a German powder magazine, hit the central electrical station which supplies Metz, and forced to land. The official report follows: "Our aviators were very active. Ten bombs were thrown on the work-manufacture of shells. Ten bombs were dropped on the powder magazine at Rothwell. Six struck the mark, and a huge red flame shot up, surrounded by dark smoke. The aeroplanes were struck by shell splinters, but returned safe and sound."

CHASED THREE AVIATORS.
"Forty bombs, most of which struck their mark, were dropped on the central electric station at Malieres Les Metz, about ten miles north of Metz. This station supplies the town and fort of Metz with power and light. Much smoke rose from the central building. On their return, our aviators encountered three aviators, to which they gave chase, forcing them to land. Our squadron suffered no mishaps, altho subjected to a violent cannonade from the Metz forts."

BISHOP APPEALS FOR AMMUNITION
Nation Must Concentrate Mind on Problem to Save Life.

FOLLOW FRENCH LEAD
Treat as Traitor Employer or Employee Who Hinders Work.

LONDON NOT ALARMED
Special Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, April 16.—London waited expectantly tonight for an air raid, but at midnight nothing had occurred. Last night one Zeppelin, possibly more, reached Maldon, only 20 miles away, demonstrating beyond all doubt, the possibility of reaching this city. A special constable corps, consisting of civilians who were organized into a new force at the outset of the war, were called out to watch for approaching aircraft and to help preserve order in case of attack.

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ZEPPELIN RAIDS ON BRITAIN DID LITTLE DAMAGE
Bombs Dropped at Many Points in Kent County and Anglia.

AVOIDED LARGE CITIES
Towns Attacked Probably Mistaken for Naval Base Sheerness.

LONDON, April 16.—(10.30 p.m.)—England this afternoon experienced its third hostile air raid within 48 hours, but the last, like those immediately preceding it, resulted in no loss of life and no serious damage to property. Taking advantage of fine flying weather, which enabled a Zeppelin airship to visit the vicinity of the Tyne Wednesday night and the coasts of Suffolk and Essex early this morning, a German aeroplane, having crossed the North Sea this afternoon, flew over the County of Kent dropping bombs. In all, four missiles were dropped in the vicinity of the towns of Faversham and Sittingbourne, the latter lies across the Bueie from the Isle of Sheppey, which is the birthplace of the British royal naval flying corps. All the bombs fell in fields.

MISSING NAVAL BASE.
From Sittingbourne the aeroplane flew over the Isle of Sheppey, and it is thought probable the raider mistook the towns attacked for Sheerness, the British naval base, which is on the other side of the island. On his way the alman passed over Canterbury and other towns in Kent, but did not drop any explosive projectile upon or near them.

ZEPPELIN'S FOR A BOMB.
During the three raids at least fifty bombs have been sent down by the Germans. Either by error or purposefully the alman seem to have kept away from the larger towns, where they might have been discovered by searchlights and come under fire from the land. There is an inclination here to consider the raid only in the nature of reconnaissance, for, except in case of aeroplanes' bases, points of military importance were avoided, altho in each case aircraft passed within a short distance of such places. In view of this belief extra precautions are being taken while the fine weather lasts.

THE ALMS ALREADY ARE MAKING REPAIRS.
The alms already are making repairs for all German attacks over the fighting zone, and it is considered here to be likely that the raids over England will receive their reply before very long.

WANT PARK SITE DECIDE TO FORM BOARD OF TRADE

Ratepayers of Dufferin and St. Clair District Pass Resolution. New Toronto Ratepayers Discuss Future of the Municipality.

HISTORY OF THE SITE TO APPLY FOR CHARTER

Claimed That Estate Men Are Responsible for High Figure. Successful Concert at St. Margaret's Anglican Church.

A public meeting under the auspices of the Dufferin and St. Clair District Ratepayers' Association was held last evening in Earlscourt School, Hugh J. Macdonald presiding.

President Macdonald, in his opening remarks to the meeting was called to give the residents of the district an opportunity of discussing the question of the proposed park site known as the Miller property, and whether the arbitrator's award was considered favorable or not.

William Carter told how the Miller property was chosen as a park site, stating that the B. I. A., with H. Farrey and himself brought the desirability of the property as a park site to the attention of the Parks Commissioner Chambers three years ago.

Some time afterwards Parks Commissioner Chambers sent up a real estate man from the city to value the property, and immediately the prices jumped up so much, said Mr. Carter, that the proposed park site could not be bought for less than \$240,000.

It was resolved "that the meeting strongly urge the city council to immediately proceed with the expropriation proceedings with regard to the Miller property."

FIRE CHIEF NO MORE

John Thompson, until yesterday, chief of the Toronto Fire Brigade. He joined the department in 1876, and 28 years later was made its head. He retired from active service yesterday at noon.

CHIEF THOMPSON GIVES UP REINS

Became Private Citizen Yesterday as Whistles Blew for Noon.

LONG SERVICE ENDS

Forty-One Years Fighting Fire — Saw Many Narrow Escapes.

At 12 o'clock yesterday John Thompson, chief of the Toronto fire department for thirteen years and six months, and with forty-one years of fire-fighting experience to his credit, became plain John Thompson, private citizen. With the intention of leaving his post as quietly as possible, he spent the morning putting the affairs of his office in order for his successor, Acting Chief Ebenezer Smith. When noon came and the term of his service had expired he stepped out of his office in the Lombard street hall, and found all the men lined up to say good-bye. The veteran fireman was much affected, and as he passed down the line shaking hands with his former comrades, many hearty good wishes were extended to him. Acting Chief Smith, who was with him, drove him away in his car to his home, 274 Wilton avenue.

Joined in 1876. John Thompson joined the department as a fireman on January 13, 1876, and twenty-eight years later was appointed chief. During his experience of forty-one years, he was present in nearly all the big fires and figured in many dangerous situations. On one occasion a fireman standing beside him was killed instantly, while he escaped uninjured.

The big Toronto fire of April 19, 1904, was his most memorable experience. He was the only fireman to be injured, his leg being broken when he undertook to leap from one building to another. He was present and helped to direct operations at the McIntosh fire on Front street, by which five men were killed when the wall fell.

"I have had a wonderfully lucky time of it since I joined the department," he said last night. "I have had such narrow escapes that it makes me tremble to think of them, and I have reason to thank God that I am as well as I am."

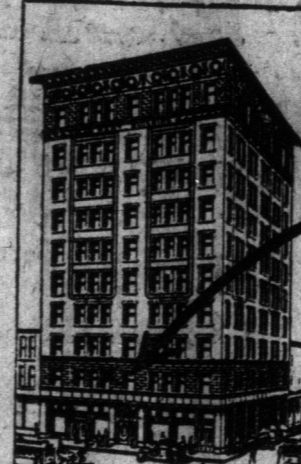

CONVOCATION AT VICTORIA COLLEGE

Less Confidence in German Professors Now, Says Dean Robertson.

LIST OF PRIZE WINNERS

W. J. Mumford Won Greatest Percentage of Marks in History of College.

"It is with sadness and distress that many of us who have owed much to German thinkers and writers and German universities contemplate this struggle," said J. C. Robertson, M.A., dean of faculty at the annual Victoria College Convocation last night. "Yet our conviction is clear and steadfast of the righteousness of our cause, and of the certainty of its triumph. It may be that we shall feel less confidence hereafter in the judgment of German professors on matters of science, since we have now seen their lamentable failure to estimate sanely the facts and forces of their own time."

Secured Great Number. In introducing W. J. Mumford, M.A., who won the Stanford gold medal for general proficiency in his entire B.D. course the dean stated that never before in the history of the university had a student obtained a greater percentage of marks.

Rev. Chancellor Bowles spoke with pride of the students who had left their work unfinished in order to fight the cause of the empire.

Rev. Thomas Manning, B.A., B.D., told the graduates to have confidence in themselves, and stated that the Christian ministry owed no apology to any other calling.

Political Intelligence

OTTAWA, April 16.—Few here now doubt that a federal election will be brought on within eight weeks. An order-in-council may be looked for any day instructing judges to prepare voters' lists for the unorganized districts of Ontario and Manitoba; next, senators will be appointed for existing vacancies; then the dissolution announced—albeit before Saturday next. If these things are done, the elections could be over by June first.

The Liberal chiefs have passed the word. Their friends to expect a speedy election. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is busy issuing general orders, and especially active in getting candidates to run in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces. The program for Quebec is in charge of Sir Lomer Gouin. The campaign for the western provinces will be directed from Regina.

It is generally conceded that Speaker Sproule of the commons will be called to the senate. Richard Blain of Peel is also named; more likely he will run for the commons again, with chair honors in sight.

R. B. Bennett of Calgary is mentioned for early cabinet honors.

The Borden government have been giving some attention to the great petition from Ontario asking federal assistance for hydro-electric radial railways, and it is believed that a policy based on broad lines is now under the consideration of Sir Adam Beck and the government. The policy would have to be of a character that could be applied to all the provinces.

Winnipeg, April 16.—Hon. Robert Rogers is in town from Ottawa, supposed to be pulling up the fences before a federal election in June. He is due back in Ottawa early next week. The tension between the Roblinists (Sir Douglas Cameron) in the scandal over the parliament buildings, is attracting much attention.

Mr. Roblin's followers say he will not consent to be defeated by the governor as to the commission of enquiry. Another report is that the Conservatives are willing to surrender the government to the Liberals on certain terms. Also that Arthur Meighen, solicitor-general at Ottawa, will succeed Sir Rodmond Borden.

It is not likely that any finding will be reached before the federal election can be held.

Mrs. Frederick Mercer, president of the society, was on duty yesterday afternoon as saleslady, and demonstrated and aroused much interest in the display.

LONDON, April 16.—Some disquietude has been caused in Liberal circles by the rumor that some sections of ministerial opinion are not very favorable to the scheme for the acquisition by the state of breweries and licensed houses. There is considerable public opinion in favor of state control of the trade, and brewers also are said to be not averse to this step. It is hoped by many Liberals that practical difficulties may find this a most fitting time for a step which would help the production of munitions, and also to promote much-needed social reform.

ILL-TREAT BRITISH IN PRISON CAMPS

Whipped for Slight Offence—Food Good, But Conditions Deplorable.

In spite of the fact that he is a Swiss he was taken into custody in France and held in the Nieder Zwehren camp. Set at liberty recently he has just returned home, and he reports that there are 20,000 British, French and Russian prisoners at Nieder Zwehren. He says the food is fairly good, but that the sanitary conditions are deplorable. The British received the worst treatment. Some of the camp guards are armed with heavy whips with which they strike the prisoners for slight offenses.

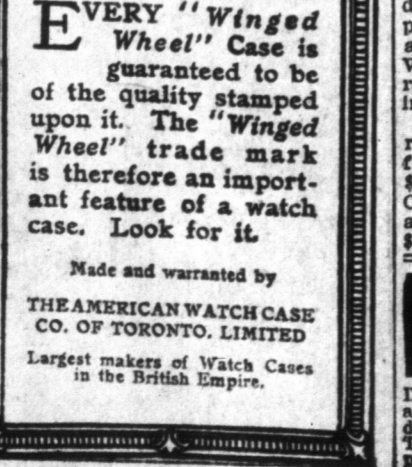

BRITISH FIRED MINE IN ENEMY'S LINES

Successful Operation in German Trenches Won Village for Allies.

CASUALTIES MANY

Particulars of Incident Near Armentières in Official Report.

LONDON, April 16.—News of an important mining operation in the German line, is contained in an official eye-witness narrative dated April 15, and issued by the government press bureau. It follows:—"On the morning of the ninth we fired a mine at LeTouquet (LeTouquet), two miles from Armentières. The greater part of the village was in our hands, but the enemy's lines on the outskirts ran thru houses connected by loop-holed garden walls. Under this position a gallery was driven, despite the difficulty of underground excavation thru the waterlogged areas close to the river.

"The operation was crowned with complete success. By the explosion debris was hurled 500 feet in the air, some falling 250 yards beyond our trenches. When the smoke cleared away the wall had disappeared, and the place was taken by an enormous crater, which had been blasted in the middle of the German line. Two Germans were killed; it is impossible to say how many casualties must have been made, since the trenches were fully manned. Twenty nine wounded were afterwards carried across the river."

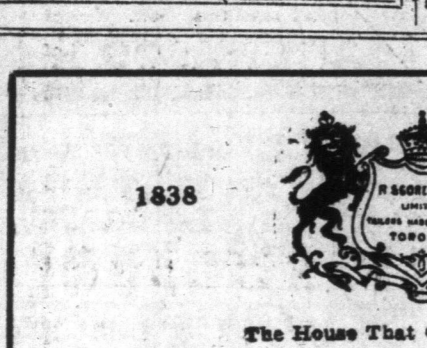
Clymer Boys Keep Up Terrific Slugging Against College Team at Durham.

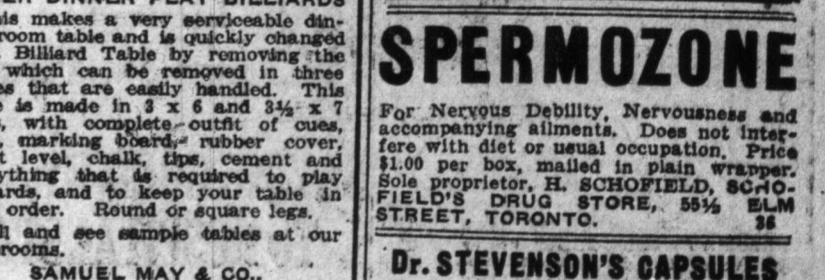
