OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—(Special.)—Before the next general election the government will increase the membership of the senate. This is the statement made to The World to-Meetings Will Be Secret, and Official Statement Will Not Be Issued Until All is Over -Negotiations Are Likely to

While changes in the representation of the commons are matters of automatic procedure under the statute, and take place generally after each census, changes in the senate may be effected at any time. It is stated that the increase will be large. At present there are 37 members of the senate, distributed as follows: Ontario 24, Quebec 24, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 10, Prince Edward Island 4, British Columbia 3, Manitoba 4, Saskatchewan 4, Alberta 4. wan 4, Alberta 4.

The greatest increases will be in the prairie provinces, British Columbia and New Brunswick.

RELY ON CANADIANS TO GUARD PREFERENCE

London Standard Regards Re-Esumption of Reciprocity Negotiations With Equanimity.

LONDON, Jan. 8.-(C. A. P. Cable.)-The Standard says we may contemplate with equanimity the resumption of the negotiations for reciprocity between Canada and America for benefit of both parties. If a fair bargain is struck it will be satisfactory to Canada to be in a position, if not to set the better of her neighbor anyhow, to obtain substantial advantages with out sacrificing her political interests or national pride. Britain is watching with friendly concern, relying on the loyalty of the Dominion. It is most unlikely that Canadian statesmen well either throw away prospective gain, or secure it by means of action detrimental to the mother country. Should such an awkward dilemma arise, we should count on full consideration of the claims of British commerce on Laurier's repeated assurances, which are precise and most satisfactory. Despite home radical ascendancy, colonial preference must eventually be the cardinal out.

A PERILOUS VOYAGE

New Government Quarantine Vessel Arrives Safely at Halifax. HALIFAX, Jan. 8.-Battered

HALIFAN, Jan. 8.—Battered by gales after a four thousand mile voyage, with less than two tons of coal in her bunkers, and her food supply almost depleted, the tiny government quarantine boat Alva, from Dartmouth, Ergland, made Halifax yla the Azores and Bermuda, this morning. The net tonnage of the Alva is forty-eight tons. She left Dartmouth on Nov. 22, and after nine days rough weather made the Azores, where she was detained thirteen days on account of storms. After leaving the Azores, the next port of call was St. George's, Bermuda, which was made in eighteen days. The Alva sailed from St. George's last Monday. Soon after the port was cleared she encountered rough weather, and day. Secretary Hay wrote to Senator Foraker on Aug. 22, 1901, that he hoped to conclude the new treaty with England, "in line with all the suggestions which you kindly made to me." That treaty was ratified by the U. S. senate in Dec. 1901, and in due time was also ratified by Great Britain. Senator Foraker in his letter to the president maintains that this treaty reserved the right to fortify the canal.

The treaty provision for a military force, he argues, supposes as a consequence that this force would have a right to protect itself or "in plainer words, fortify itself against attack."

He also recalls that England did not object to the Spooner law for the building of the canal, and the treaty with Panama, in both of which the intention of the U. He adds that he and other senators believed when the second Hay-Paunceforte treaty was ratified that Great Britain left it to the discretion of the U. S. 




