# **BLOCKADE OF CUBA NO BLOCKADE AT ALL**

A Whole Fleet Sailed into the Important Port of Santiago-Sampson and Schley Both at Key West With Their Fleets-There Should Be a Display of Fireworks Very Soon in Cuban Waters.

TALLY ONE FOR SPAIN.

The Cape Verde squadron of the Spanish fleet, in command of Admiral Cervera, has eluded Admiral Sampson's patrol and is now within the fortified harbor of Santiago de Cuba

In evading the hostile fleet and reaching there he has proved himself a general. At Santiago, Admiral Cervera has the co-operation of 70,000 loyal Spaniards, and the military supplies of the city have been recently shed by colliers and store ships. From a strategical point Santiago is of great importance. The city lies on the south coast of Cuba at about 500 miles distance overland from Havana, with which it is not connected by a railroad, and insurgents have cut off the telegraphic communication. However, so long as Cervera holds Santiago, Sampson will make no success of blockading Havana, and if Sampson leaves Havana to oust the Spaniards from Santiago, Cervera will probably abandon his position and endeavor to place himself beneath the strong fortifications of Havana. The distance around either end of the island from Santiago to Havana is about the same, so that if Sampson roaches Santiago via Cape Mais, Cervera has a road open to Havana around Cape San Antonio. Admiral Cervera's achievement has put new life into the Spaniards, and the whole country is infused with patriotism. The activity of the new ministry is evident, and large forces of troops are being

**CONGRATULATIONS FOR ADMIRAL CERVERA** 

SANTIAGO A STRONG FORTRESS.

Santiago de Cuba may have been taken by Admiral Cervera as, next to Havana, his best harbor of refuge in stress of war. It has been said to be fortified more strongly than any other city in Cuba except Havana. The Montserrat was supposed to have landed its troops and munitions there, and a large force had been stationed in the barracks to keep down the insurgents of Oriente. More than this, Santiago de Cuba has cable connection with Madridthrough two lines. Two cables run directly to Kingston, Jamaica, and there is also connection with Mole St. Nicholas, Hayti, by way of Guantanamo. Though the harhor is deep and ample, the entrance to it is so narrow and tortuous that but one vessel at a time can enter with safety. The principal fortifications are the Morro (all Spanish West Indian cities seem to have a Morro Castle), and the fortifications of La Punta, La Estrella and Santa Catalina. The Morro, or Castle de la Roca, is an ancient structure, built in 1639, under the auspices of Riano de Gamboa.

"England wants 45,000,000 busheis of wheat in the next ten months. This is more than prospective supplies."

The above cable from London was one of the bullish factors in the wheat market today, and others were reports of injuries to European crop, and of an extension of the French wheat duty suspension until Oct. 1. To offset these influences, however, there were the lower cables, an increase in the Argentine shipments, fine crop weather in the United States and finally large receipts in the Northwest, indicating a probable increase in the visible supply for the week. Acting under these influences wheat was arratic on the Chicago board to-day. May cell 5c over night, but closed at yesterday's eash figure. July sold down to \$1.05½ and closed at \$1.08%, 1%c higher than yesterday, the September option advanced to \$8½c and closed at \$9½c, representing a gain of 4c for the day. Little fluctuations were lotticeable on the other American boards.

Argentine shipments are so large as to be significant. For the week they have totalled 1,152,000 bushels, compared with 824,000 last week, and practically none the corresponding week of last year.

In the twenty weeks since Jan, 1 Argentine shipments have aggregated 20,312,000 bushels, compared with 1,719,000 aushels in the same period last year.

Canadian Bacon. The importation of Canadian bacon into Great Britain for the first three months of 1898 was, according to British figures, £77.-179, against £55,925 last year, and of butter £25,561, compared with only £3481 the same period in 1896. The total importation of Canadian cheese during the three months was valued at £199,961.
