WILL GEN. THAYER GET GAS?

Consumers' Gas Company Has Not Yet Signed the Agreement and It is Said Wants Bigger Prices.

BELIEVES PEARSON IS BLUFFING.

If the Gas Company Backs General Thayer Will Make His Own Gas—City Hall Object.

General Thayer, on the part of the Carbon Light & Power Company of Philadelphia, and the Board of Control, on the part of the city, agreed yesterday to a final draft of the contract for incandescent gas lighting, and General Thayer went with City Solicitor Caswell to execute the contract.

But, from all the World could learn, and is not yet, and there is a possibility that the dawn of the twentieth century may find the city of Toronto, or certain of the streets, avenues, squares, parks and lanes thereof, steeped in Chamberlain darkness.

This is how it may happen. At 12 o'clock on the night of December 31 the Consumers' Gas Co. may turn off the gas, and General Thayer may not be able to turn it on again.

The General explained to the Board of Control yesterday that the form of the contract was unique, inasmuch as it did not provide the usual interregnum of thirty days after the expiry of the contract, during which the contractors would be compelled to keep the light going at a proportionate price, and during which the new contractors would be able to install their apparatus. The Board of Control and City Solicitor Caswell had never heard of this simple, business-like provision before, and the necessary advantage of it struck them right flat upon their intelligence, and they immediately proceeded to apply the General's information to the contract they were about to let to him, General Thayer smiled and said it was perfectly satisfactory to him. But he wondered why it had been omitted from the Gas Company's contract. The Board of Control could not make reflections on the legal department.

The Kernel of the Situation. And now for the kernel of the situation, which threatens the city at the witching hour of night, just when the City Hall chimes are ringing the old year and century out and the new year and century in.

Manager Pearson of the Consumers' Gas Company has yet "signed nothing" for General Thayer. The General was the last in town Manager Pearson agreed with him to supply gas at the ordinary price to consumers 200 lamps or over, when General Thayer went down to call upon Manager Pearson yesterday. The World is informed that the latter demanded bigger money. The Board of Control and City Solicitor Caswell are not to be taken in by a bluff, and they are determined to see that the contract is signed.

How is he to do it? He simply can't do it. If Mr. Pearson refuses to furnish the gas, but the General believes that Mr. Pearson is bluffing, and that he will sign the contract on the night of the 31st December.

HARBOR-STREET COLLEGIATE.

Yield Their Annual Commencement Yesterday—Matriculating Students Were Over One Hundred.

The annual commencement of the Harbor-street Collegiate Institute was held in the lecture room yesterday afternoon.

The report of the Committee on Works set forth that the street lighting project has been exhausted. But there is a surplus of \$7000 to the credit of the work appropriation. The Engineer asked that this \$7000 be transferred to the Street Lighting Department.

Ald. Spence reminded the board that they are willing to increase that bond to a sum of \$100,000, but he cannot let you have our property until you have the money to pay for it.

Gen. Thayer offered a \$20,000 bond, and Ald. Sheppard's proposal being included, Gen. Thayer then went off to sign the contract.

Mr. Stewart is Too Late. A communication was read from Mr. T. Stewart, electrical engineer, asking that the contracts for street lighting be not let to the contractor of a more economical arrangement, which he could lay before the board.

Mr. Sheppard, in reply, wrote on behalf of a client, who, in the month of April, came into possession of a license which he took out \$15 license. The license expired on the 30th of the same month, and immediately an official license department came for a renewal of the license.

The Mayor: I think it is indefensible to take a year's dog tag for a few dollars' worth of license.

Ald. Spence asked that the Engineer be authorized to let the contract for the number of cars of each class, giving the number registered, the date of issue, and the number in service now, and how many in course of construction. A motion was carried.

Elliot & Neelon Plant. The City Commissioner reported the cost of removing the Elliot & Neelon plant was \$484. Possession could not be given to the Commissioning Organ Company until the sheds had been removed some 30 feet, at a cost of \$1000.

Ald. Bowman: It costs us \$800 before we get a dollar's rent.

Ald. Sheppard: It would have been more profitable to keep the lot as it was.

Mr. Adamson's letter, asking that three Bore can be secured to ornament the front of the City Hall was referred to Ald. Lamb.

The Board thought if anything in the line suggested by Mr. Adamson could be secured as easily as Mr. Adamson believed, the Board would have no objection to it.

Frame: We have too much track down there now. We have a small shop, and we are not going to have a large one. A \$500 Grant Asked.

Mr. Blythe: I have a grant of \$500 for the exhibition of the city.

Ald. Sheppard: I don't see why Toronto should be asked to pay for the exhibition of the city.

Most of the stock exhibited came from the United States, and it is not fair to ask the city to pay for it.
