RICHARD SNOW DEAD. Successful West End Confectioner Passes Away, Aged 73. Richard Snow, who, for several years, conducted a successful confectionery business at 1400 West Queen-street, died on Saturday, after an illness of three weeks. Mr. Snow, who was 73 years of age, was a native of Yorkshire, England, and came to Canada about half a century ago. He early took up his residence in Whitby, which was then in its infancy, and, by skill and industry, he soon established a paying business, and was early recognized as one of the prominent business men of the community. A few years ago, he moved to this city, to find greater scope for the abilities of his sons and daughters, and the success that they have attained in their respective callings, vindicates his judgment. He leaves a widow and three sons and three daughters to mourn his loss. Mr. Snow was a member of many years' standing of Composite Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Whitby, and was a member of the City of this city will represent his Masonic brethren at the services, to take place today at 12 o'clock, at 1400 West Queen-street, and afterwards accompanying the remains to Whitby.

MONOPOLY SMASHED.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—By judgment of the Imperial Privy Council rendered yesterday, Hull Electric Light Company loses the appeal which it took to establish its right to a monopoly of lighting the City of Hull. The company claimed this monopoly under terms of its contract, made with the City Council, but the Ottawa Electric Light Company, which has taken place under the title of United Factories, Limited, which has undertaken to operate Boeckh's Toronto works, Bryan's London factories and Cane's Newmarket factories. REV. WILLIAM SPARLING.

Pastor of Metropolitan Church, The Young Man, is a Father Among His People.

THE CHURCH WAS ERECTED IN 1872

Cost Was \$200,000 and the Present Debt, It is Expected, Will Be Soon Wiped Out.

An imposing edifice is that known as the Metropolitan Church. It is probably the best known Methodist Church in the Dominion; among its pastors have been many of the most prominent preachers of the church in Canada. The present pastor is Rev. William Sparling, a young man of a great deal of force of character, an eloquent and impressive preacher, and above all, a man who goes about among his people and spreads sunshine, gives fatherly advice and enlists sympathy.

The Metropolitan Church will seat about 2200 people, and is the largest church in the city. It has a capable choir under the leadership of Prof. Torrington, who is also organist, and the musical services are always of a high character. The church is built on a plot of ground known as the "Academy." The former church of this congregation occupied the site of the present Trust and Loan Company Buildings, corner Adelaide and Toronto streets. In 1872 the church estate was purchased from the Bank of Montreal for the sum of \$25,000.

Among the celebrated men who have occupied the pulpit are: Mark Guy Fossace Jackson, Joseph Farley, Gavazzi (celebrated Italian), Varley and Dwight L. Moody.

The musical part of the service has been under the care of Mr. Torrington since 1878, when a choir of 80 voices was organized. In 1876 the original organ, being inadequate, was removed, and the present organ, one of the largest on the continent, was installed at the cost of \$14,000.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—The Recorder-Herald's London correspondent wires: The rancid wound of the South African war has been reopened by the Klipdam disaster.
