Dr. Eakins, who is assistant minister at new St. Andrew's, gave the opening address at the Men's Bible class yesterday. The class has been under organization for some time and was announced on the previous Sunday.

Our supreme aim should not be to be orthodox whatever that might mean, since the orthodoxy of one age was the heterodoxy of the next. Nor to appear sound in the sight of man, but to be of the mind of God.

STOCK MARKETS IRREGULAR BUT FIRMER AT THE WEEK END

New President's Address None Too Acceptable—Speculation Has Fallen Flat at Toronto.

World Office, Saturday Evening, March 6. Most of the week on Wall-street has been occupied by the discussion of the incoming of the new president. The stock market responded vigorously to President Taft's nomination, but made the feeblest kind of response in acknowledgment of his first address. A pretty fair diagnosis of his attitude on public matters had already been made, but his stand in regard to capital supervision was not contemplated. His decision to follow in the footsteps of a predecessor could not be construed favorably to the financial juggling on Wall-street, but then the market is made to fit all conditions, and will naturally be made to fit in with the conditions.

Speculation has been considerably curtailed since the last slump, many of the would-be traders being up in the air. The market is one from which release means a comfortable loss at present prices. The floor trader is anything but a bull, and the market is in a state of nervousness. "Guerrillas" have kept the supporting syndicates busy to make favorable books at the close of each day. London has continued to hand out the American stocks every time they exhibited a degree of strength, and there by assisted in dampening the ardor of those who would like to see higher quotations. This has resulted in producing the so-called "traders' market."

It cannot be denied that the events of the week have contributed to bullion sentiment. The decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission in the Pacific railroads has opened up another avenue for diminishing the earnings of those institutions. Further cuts in iron production and a large falling off in the profits of the industrial companies, as shown by some recently published yearly statements, have also been unfavorable incidents. Large purchases of Copper have been reported, but these appear to have no special significance. There is no direct evidence that the metals are not still on the downward trend with the movement interspersed by occasional spots of strength.

The one strongly favorable factor is the condition of the money market. Neither the new flotation, government withdrawal of deposits, nor the gold exports, have had any special influence upon money rates. The recently announced dividend disbursements on the first of the month were also arranged without causing the slightest disturbance. As a matter of fact, the conditions that are back of the stock market are banking to facilitate their designs upon the outside market. The conditions of the dividend-paying stocks show returns much larger than interest rates, and these comparisons are useful in giving buyers a security.

A admitted fact that the public had a sense has not been taken since the first week of the year, and in other directions have proved more attractive and remunerative, but Wall-street has but one eye, and it usually accomplishes its purpose. Prices on the New York market in the majority of issues have declined, and it should be noted that the trend near the time when the trend may be changed. With a small speculative following in increasing its bets, there is a decided upward direction and any upbuilding in prices will be accomplished in small gradations. For speculators, prices are likely to produce profitable turns.

Speculation on the Toronto market during the week has been extremely light, the setback received in the middle of the previous week, which check any further activity which was in the air at that time. Transactions have narrowed down to the smallest kind of operations, and most of the changes have been caused by the dealings of professionals. With the falling off in prices, but these have not declined in price, and it is owing to the fact that only a limited amount of actual stock has been offered in the market.

The interest which has excited in the steel and iron shares by the privy council's decision has now been entirely lost, and except for a little speculation in Dominion stocks have practically ceased. The actions of the Nova Scotia Steel Company in increasing its capital is evidently serving to dampen the common shares having declined since the announcement of points of five points, and the high price of the American traction and power companies have also been depressed. There was a little movement towards the end of the week in Mexican Light & Power, and a small part of the loss which this issue has sustained since the proposed deal between it and the Mexican Tramway Company was re-covered.

The Balkan news again was a dominating factor; the reports that Serbia refused to withdraw her demands for territorial compensation at the hands of Austria-Hungary and the autonomy of Bosnia causing consols and foreigners to sag heavily until Thursday, when the situation became distinctly better by Serbia's more pacific policy, which brought continental repurchases and induced more free investment buying under which the whole or the earlier declines were wiped out. The improving position of the Bank of England's reserve and the prospects of cheaper money assisted in the good tone with a hardening tendency at the end of the week. American securities continued uncertain and irregular. The prospects of tariff revision, the poor trade reports and the reduction in wages in Great Britain and the United States operated here against increased commitments and only moderate movements occurred, thru covering operations in spite of the sharp recovery in metal prices. The inaugural address of President Taft did not have much effect on the market to-day hardened in anticipation of a good New York bank statement and closed steady one to one and one-quarter lower.

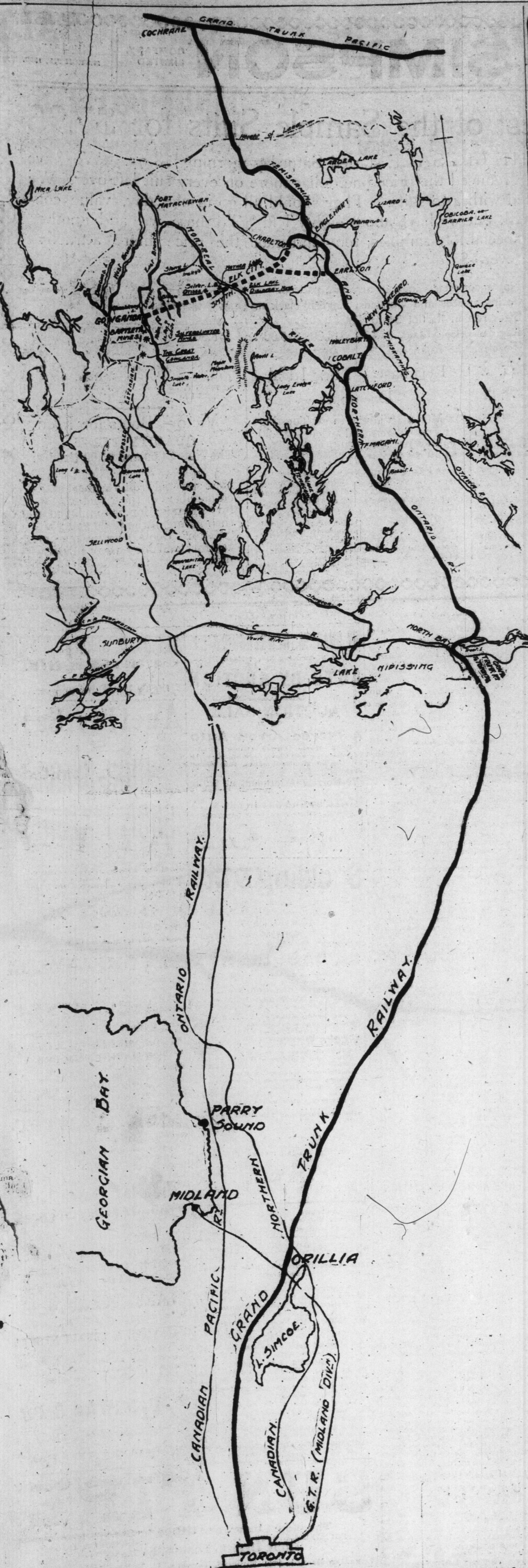

QUARTET FOUND GUILTY CONSPIRACY CHARGE

Jury Bring in Recommendation to Mercy—Judge Calls Jury Back to Clear Away Objections.

A verdict of guilty with a recommendation to mercy was returned at 3.15 Saturday night against former G. T. R. conductors Dan Corrigan and Frank McCallum, and Harry Rosenbess and Joseph Woods. They will not be sentenced until the end of the session, and will in the meantime remain in the jail, ball being absolutely refused.

The quartet were arrested in a roundup planned to take effect simultaneously in Montreal and Toronto. Rosenbess and Woods were suspected of having manufactured bogus tickets good for passage between Toronto and Montreal, which were sold at about \$4 each, and which the two conductors, by special arrangement, accepted in lieu of the regular tickets.

The verdict was returned on the first count of conspiracy. The other counts of the indictment were not read. In accordance with Judge Winchester's instructions that if from the evidence the jury were convinced that there was common design they could not bring in a verdict against one and allow the others to go free, a jury could not convict themselves of conspiracy.

The witnesses on Saturday were Detective Inspector G. H. Dewar, K.C., who testified to having purchased and used bogus tickets, involving the men on trial. The defence sprung a surprise by calling no witnesses, and the counsel for the defence, Messrs. Robinson, Curry and Geary, counsel for the defence, jumped to their feet with a host of objections to the manner in which the evidence was introduced.

The jury were out two hours and fifteen minutes. As they retired to consider the evidence, Messrs. Robinson, Curry and Geary, counsel for the defence, jumped to their feet with a host of objections to the manner in which the evidence was introduced.

Mr. Curry, appearing for Woods, requested that he was here to obtain a verdict of not guilty by hook, by crook, by trick or by twist, as intimated by the crown prosecutor. He also, like Mr. Robinson, pointed out discrepancies in the evidence. It was in the crown's case to disclose the names of the prisoners for accepting the tickets to defraud the Grand Trunk, which charges he said could be preferred even if they should bring in a verdict of not guilty, but he wanted to know what evidence the crown had submitted proving that they had conspired together either in Toronto or Montreal.

His Honor Judge Winchester, after reading the indictment, pointed out that there was a general charge against the men of conspiracy, and that the crown had to prove that each conspired with each other. Altogether there were six counts.

Mr. Curry, appearing for Woods, endeavored to show to the jury that there was no agreement proved between the men and the crown, and that by discrediting any conspiracy charge, he asked the jury to take all the evidence against them as they were given there was an agreement between them.

When his honor re-addressed the jury, he said: "If I stated that there was a common design I had no privilege to do so, but should have said it was your right to draw an inference from the facts established in the evidence, that there was a common design. As to my query, 'Was that all done for friendship?' to which Mr. Robinson takes exception, I will say that it is immaterial whether it was done for friendship or for money, if they did wrong, and that is for you to decide."

"I have been criticized as saying this case was on all fours with the other cases I read. It is your privilege to decide whether it is an adultery or not. I was read in an apology in saying that Reckie swore that he took tickets down and handed them to Rosenbess. There is no need of any explanation on this point. The evidence is quite clear. I did make a mistake in saying Reckie got two hats checks from Woods. What I should have said was that he got two tickets for a short distance out of the city."

"An objection was also raised that I had said you take 109 tickets and multiplied them by \$16.70 and you will have a very large sum of money, which the company did not get. I could not have said this, and I'm sure you did not understand me to have made such a statement, because we have no idea and no possible way of ascertaining or giving any accurate statement as to the number of tickets that had been sold. There is utterly no evidence as to how many were issued. I might add that an acquittal in the charge of conspiracy would not acquit them on a charge of fraud."

Mr. Curry had also suggested that his honor should have told the jury that no evidence had been put in by G.T.R. officials to show that the money for these tickets did not reach the company, but the judge made no further allusion to the tip.
