#### VON KLUK IS PLACED ON THE RETIRED LIST

Wound Incapacitates Man Who Failed in Drive on Paris. Berlin, Oct. 19.—Field Marshal Alexander H. R. Von Kluk, who commanded the right wing of the German army in its sweep towards Paris in the fall of 1914, has been placed on the retired list, his own request. He had never returned to the front since he was wounded by shrapnel fire in March, 1915, while inspecting advanced positions. The field marshal was 70 years of age last May.

### WAR SUMMARY

#### THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

ALTHOUGH another heavy rainfall has delayed action in France, the allies continued to improve their position yesterday. The British slightly advanced their lines at the Butte de Warlencourt, near Bapaume, and they stopped by their curtain of fire a German attack. Thus they have considerably widened their front on the ridge before Bapaume. The French kept up their attacks on the front between Biaches and La Maisonette, south of the Somme and near Peronne, and they made fresh progress. They also repulsed a German attack on their lines, thrown north and west of Sully-Saillisel.

#### HEAVY FIGHT PROCEEDS ON SLOPES OF PASUBIO

Austrians Incessantly Attack Italians. Special Cable to The Toronto World. Rome, Oct. 19.—Heavy fighting continues in the region of Mount Pasubio. The Austrians are incessantly attacking the Italians in an endeavor to regain their lost ground. At one time they broke into the Tooth of Pasubio redoubt, but they were promptly driven out in a hand-to-hand struggle with the loss of 100 prisoners. Bad weather continues to interfere with operations on the Julian front. In the sector of the Carso Plateau, the Italians took some prisoners and machine guns.

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### SOMME PICTURES STAND THE TEST

Greatest Crowd Yet Waits in Downpour in Endeavor to See Film.

**BREAKING ALL RECORDS**  
Fifty Thousand Attendance in Four Days—Sir John Hendrie and Party Present.

To further accommodate the people wishing to see the Somme battle pictures, the Regent Theatre management announces that two extra special exhibitions will be given at 10.15 o'clock tonight and Saturday night. The box office will open at 8.45 a.m. today and Saturday, and the first show will open fifteen minutes later.

Despite the intermittent rainfall of yesterday, which did not wholly cease until after 5 o'clock in the night, crowds of people stood in line and clamored before the box office of the Regent Theatre before gaining admittance to see the official motion pictures of "The Battle of the Somme," which after a week's engagement at that playhouse will close Saturday night.

The crowds in the aggregate equalled if not surpassed in number the record-breaking attendance of 14,000, which was present on the preceding day. It is roughly estimated that 50,000 people have seen the pictures since the exhibitions were opened last Monday morning.

Throughout the day yesterday, people, two and three abreast, were in line. During the heaviest rain in the afternoon and evening, the line extended to Bay street, a half a mile distant from the corner of the theatre. Raincoats, buttoned to the neck, and many umbrellas, kept most of the people in line dry until entrance to the house was obtained.

Sir J. Hendrie Present.  
Among those who attended last night was Sir John Hendrie, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, Lady Hendrie, Miss Hendrie and Hon. Col. Fraser.

When the party entered their box, about 9 o'clock, the orchestra played "God Save the King." The members of the party were intensely interested in the pictures and praised them in leaving the theatre.

Arthur Hewitt, president of the board of trade, who attended with his son and Mrs. Hewitt, was impressed with the words of Lloyd George, who declared that the picture in itself was an epic in self-sacrifice and should be seen by everyone. Mr. Hewitt said that everyone in Toronto should take the opportunity to see the pictures.

He declared that he had not seen any scenes which he thought should not be viewed by women.

Among others who attended were Mrs. James Wood, Douglas Wood and Miss Alexis Wood.

Several women fainted during the shows yesterday and were given aid by an attendant, who was prepared for just such an emergency. A man, who occupied a seat down stairs yesterday, and who was taken ill while seeing the pictures, was removed thru a side exit.

Are Kept Busy.  
Ushers, doormen and other attendants of the theatre have nearly reached the point of physical exhaustion as the crowds grow larger each day. A thoro day's work has been given them since Monday in answering innumerable queries, conducting people to seats and in other ways accommodating to the spectators.

The last two days in which the Somme pictures will be shown at the Regent Theatre are expected to be record-breakers as far as attendance is concerned, as the film has already established itself as a record-breaking event in Toronto theatrical enterprises by each day's success eclipsing that of the previous day.

No film has ever caused so much discussion or interest. It has aroused city-wide comment and attracted the attention of everyone who has heard of it or seen it.

Greatest Masterpiece.  
It is easy to account for the stupendous success in this film in Toronto. The pictures are absolutely authentic moving photographs of the Battle of the Somme, the greatest and most important of all British battles.

They were made by operators, who took their cameras right into the jaws of death, working side by side with the machine guns and riflemen in the front-line trenches, working amid the hail of bullets, the roar of explosives and the concussion of bursting shells.

### BANTAMS ARRIVE FROM CAMP TODAY

Battalion Will Reach Bay Street at About Four o'Clock.

**TWO BOMBING SCHOOLS**  
Every Member of Seven Battalions Will Be Given Instructions.

By a Staff Reporter.  
Camp Borden, Oct. 19.—Three units leave tomorrow for winter quarters. The 216th Bantams and the 23rd New Ontario Battalions go to Toronto and the 122nd Muskoka Battalion to Galt. The 23rd will travel via the G.T.R., arrive at Parkdale about noon and then march to Givens and Crawford schools by route of Queen, Dovercourt and Argyle streets.

The Bantams will arrive at Bay street, Toronto, at 4 p.m. via the C.P.R. and march to Jesse Ketchum School by way of Bay, Queen, Yonge and Davenport road.

Both district and brigade bombing schools are to be conducted in Toronto during the winter training season. At the district school officers and n.c.o.'s will be trained as bombing instructors. It will be a "tranch" school with live shell practice. Capt. N. P. Kelley, district bombing officer, will be in charge, assisted by Capt. H. B. Eysel of the 19th Battalion, Lieut. E. A. Dunfield of the 1st Battalion and a sub-staff of twenty instructors. At the brigade school one week's course in bombing is to be given to every member of the seven battalions quartered in Toronto. There will also be a bombing school at Hamilton to instruct the four units there, and one at St. Catharines for the three units in that district.

Donald Cummings and J. Beauchamp, construction men of the Bate McMahon Company were thrown from a motor car when it collided with a truck on Leggo avenue today. Beauchamp had one arm dislocated.

Word received from Ottawa announces that the 24th Battalion with headquarters at Montreal, has permission to recruit anywhere in the Dominion. Lieut.-Col. F. M. McBride is the unit's commander.

The plan to have the 176th Lincoln and Welland Battalions go into quarters at Niagara Falls has not been affected by the destroying of the proposed building by fire. The Niagara Falls people are proving other suitable accommodation and the 176th will move there next week as scheduled.

Ten battalions have left Camp Borden for points east, and winter quarters during the present month. The movement has decreased the total of battalions in camp from 28 to 18. There are now about 16,000 soldiers here.

### BIG CONTINGENT OF TORONTO MEN BACK

Great Crowd of Citizens Give Them Welcome at Union Station.

**IRISH FUSILIERS RETURN**  
Take Up Quarters in Exhibition Park—Bantams Expected This Afternoon.

Despite the inclement weather, a large crowd waited from 7 o'clock until 8.30 last evening at the union station to welcome the 130 returned soldiers who arrived from Quebec on a C. P. R. special. This contingent had been at Quebec for nearly two weeks and were included in the 1,000 which arrived in Canada from England. Sixty-five of the men belong to Toronto and the remainder to different places throughout the province. Included in the total number of those returned are 28 men who went overseas as tradesmen but resigned when the government cut down their wages.

The train was expected to reach Toronto at 7 o'clock but owing to being delayed it was two and one-half hours late. Besides being welcomed by friends and relatives, there was a large turnout of representatives of the city, military hospital commission, Spadina crescent, where everything was in readiness for their arrival. After registering a number of the men

will be able to go to their homes. Recruiting in Toronto took a drop yesterday. Fourteen volunteers applied during the day, and of this number 11 were accepted. With 4 accepted men the artillery headed the role for the day.

The 20th Irish-Canadian Battalion arrived at the Exhibition yesterday afternoon from Camp Borden. The members of Lieut.-Col. T. H. Lennox's battalion look to be in fine fighting condition. They were in charge of Major Bennett and are quartered in the horticultural building.

There was a splendid turnout of the city hall steps, under auspices of the A. R. Club, led to be called off. Tonight the Queen's Own Regiment will attend the mass meeting at Massey Hall. Lt.-Col. Band is looking forward to a full turnout of members of the unit in uniform.

forty crew saved," making it appear that the passengers had been in jeopardy, but this error was later corrected.

The Albatross, one of the new vessels of the Cunard Line, sailed from here on the day the German submarine U-53 arrived at Newport, and must have passed Nantucket at about the same time the U-53, the next morning began her operations in that vicinity against British shipping. Incidentally the Albatross was armed for defence against submarines.

The Albatross carried cargo of between 10,000 and 12,000 tons of merchandise, including war supplies, but no munitions. Among the items listed were rubber and copper goods, food supplies and chemicals. The main part of her cargo was to be discharged at London, only a small portion having been put off at Palmouth.

Built in 1913, the ship was 530 feet long, with a gross tonnage of 13,400.

### TORTUOUS CHANNEL.

Washington, Oct. 19.—Charts compiled by the navy hydrographic office, from announcements of the British admiralty, showing the latest mined areas, reveal a number of extensive fields where mines have been sown, leaving only a tortuous channel, the course of which is known only to admiralty officers, from Falmouth to London. Warnings of these areas have been given to mariners, advising them to obtain special pilots from the admiralty service to ensure safe navigation.

With these precautions to safeguard shipping, navy officials here find it difficult to understand how the Albatross could have been sunk, except by a mine which had broken from anchorage, or one dropped by an enemy mine-layer.

The United States and Great Britain perfected an agreement at the beginning of the war, whereby the areas of mine fields would be announced to mariners, in order to keep the channels open to navigation, admiralty vessels constantly are employed in sweeping operations, both along the coast and at the entrance of commercial ports.

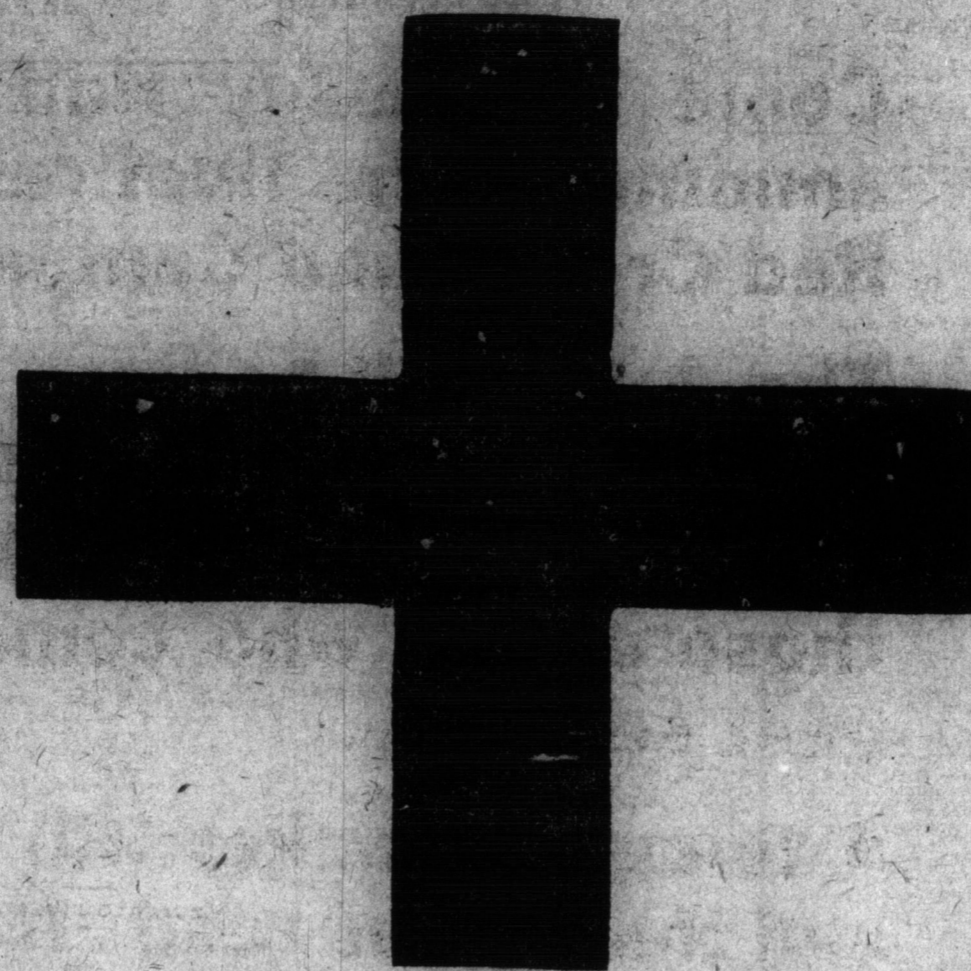
