

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM is administered on the first Sabbath of every month. Parents are expected to give previous intimation of their intention to present their children for baptism.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is observed on the last Sabbath in January, April, July and October.

THE SESSION meets in the Vestry every six weeks, or at shorter intervals at the call of the Moderator.

THE TEACHERS OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL meet, for the study of the lesson, every Wednesday at a quarter to nine p.m.; for prayer every Sabbath at the close of the School; and for business on the call of the Superintendent.

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT meets in the Managers' room on the third Wednesday of each month at half-past eight.

THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION meets in its room on alternate Monday evenings at eight, and the young men meet for devotional exercises on Sabbath morning at a quarter-past ten. Young men are cordially invited to attend.

THE HOPEFUL GLEANERS' MISSION BAND meets in the Church Parlour on alternate Wednesdays at 3 o'clock.

MISSIONARY COLLECTORS visit their districts after the first Sabbath of each month, leave a copy of the *Presbyterian Record* with every family of the congregation, and are expected to pay the sums received to the Treasurer on the Wednesday evening following.

APPLICATIONS for sittings are made to the Managers, one or more of whom are present every Wednesday evening before and after prayer meeting to attend to this matter. *There are no seat rents. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute towards the support of ordinances according to their ability, and by weekly offerings; envelopes for which are given at the beginning of each quarter. Anyone not now receiving envelopes and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to one of the Managers, who will see to their being supplied.*

ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held on the evening of the 18th January, in the Lecture Room of the Church, and was largely attended. After devotional exercises, conducted by the Pastor, Mr. R. Kilgour was, on the motion of Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. McDonald, appointed Chairman. Mr. J. T. Monteath was requested to act as Secretary. The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Managers' Report for the year, and the Treasurer's Financial Statement were read by Mr. Robert Mills and Mr. J. Y. Reid respectively.

It was moved by Mr. H. W. Darling, seconded by Mr. G. Laidlaw, and carried, "That these Reports, as read, be adopted; and that the hearty thanks of the congregation be, and are hereby, tendered to Mr. J. Y. Reid, for his faithful and painstaking services as Treasurer of this congregation."

The Report of the Ladies' Furnishing Committee, announcing the successful completion of their effort to meet the expenses connected with the furnishing of the Church, was read by Mr. Wm. Kerr, and on his motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas Kirkland, the Report was adopted as read, and the gratification of the congregation expressed at the complete removal of this indebtedness, and its thanks tendered to the active ladies who had accomplished it.

On motion of Mr. Wm. Johnston, seconded by Mr. J. C. Douglas, Messrs. Bruce and Gray were re-appointed Auditors for the present year.

It was moved by Mr. Wm. Kerr, seconded by the Rev. J. M. King, and carried, "That the cordial thanks of the congregation be, and are hereby, tendered to Mr. Douglas and the Choir for their valuable help in leading the service of praise; and that Mr. Douglas be requested to accept \$300, as a token of the appreciation of his services by the congregation."

A communication having been read from Mr. Horn, a former member of the congregation, and now a resident in Hanover, expressing the wish of the Presbyterian congregation in that village to secure, on as moderate terms as possible, a melodeon not at present in use, it was, on the motion of Mr. Johnston, seconded by Mr. Mills, agreed that the matter be left in the hands of the Managers.

The question of the propriety of reducing the large debt still remaining on the Church building, and of taking immediate steps to accomplish this object, having been brought before the meeting by Mr. J. Y. Reid and warmly advocated, it was moved by Mr. Wm. Kerr, seconded by Mr. Alex. Nairn, and unanimously adopted, "That an immediate effort be made to reduce the present debt by at least \$10,000, and that it be remitted to a joint meeting of the Managers and Session to take steps for the accomplishment of this object."

Attention having been called to the valuable services of Mrs. Thomas Ewart in assisting the Managers in collecting the unpaid amounts on the former subscription list, it was, on the motion of Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Nairn, *Resolved*, "That the thanks of the congregation are due

and are hereby tendered to Mrs. Ewart for her important services in this connection."

During the course of the evening several pieces of music were rendered by Mr. Douglas and members of the choir. A subscription list was opened towards the close of the meeting in connection with the movement for reduction of debt, and \$3,000 were subscribed in sums of \$500.

The meeting, which was large, and the interest of which was sustained to the end, was closed with prayer by the pastor a little after 10 o'clock.

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ADDRESS FROM THE SESSION.

DEAR BRETHREN, — We embrace, as usual, the opportunity which the printing of the various congregational Reports gives us to address a few words to you, and to add some particulars of information on matters coming more directly under our supervision.

We may be allowed to congratulate you on the generally cheering character of the Reports submitted. These seem to indicate some advance in every department of our work. The Reports of the Managers and Treasurers show a slight improvement in the ordinary congregational revenue, though from the large amount required to meet payments on interest the balance on hand is smaller than last year. The Report of the Missionary Association indicates a marked advance even on the exceptionally large income of the previous year. The membership of the Young People's Association has received a considerable increase, and the interest of the meetings is more than sustained. The change in the Constitution of the Association has been fully justified by the result. Though the main object is the intellectual improvement of the members, we are glad to know that the meetings are opened and closed with devotional exercises, and that it is the aim of the office-bearers to make it a truly Christian Association. Having this aim, it has our best wishes for its success. The attendance in the Sabbath School has likewise increased, and very few, indeed, of the older pupils have left it during the year. A few have passed from the ranks of scholars in the school or in the Bible Classes to those of teachers.

This is as it should be. Attention was called from the pulpit to the difficulty experienced by the Superintendent in getting a sufficient number of suitable male teachers. The difficulty still exists ; and it is scarcely to the credit of the congregation that any such difficulty should be experienced. We invite the coöperation of members of the congregation, who have had some experience in teaching, to sustain this important department of our work.

The number of members in full communion on the 1st January, 1881, was 483 ; it is at the corresponding date this year 508. Seventy-five were added to the Communion Roll during the year ; thirty-four on profession of faith, and forty-one by certificate ; fifty have been removed from it ; seven by death, and forty-three by change of residence and other causes. The names of those who have been removed by death since the date of our last address are : Mrs. Rankine, John Gairns, John McDonald, Elizabeth Stewart, Elizabeth Wilson, Mrs. Mackay and Peter Christie. Some of them had been long connected with the congregation, and one, at least, had been for many years an active and zealous worker in the Sabbath School, and in other departments of labour, until impaired health compelled her to withdraw. Their removal repeats to us the call to work with all diligence while it is day. "The night cometh when no man can work."

There are few things which promise to be attended with better results to the congregation at this time than the movement recently inaugurated with so much spirit to reduce the debt on the Church building. The object, to bring the debt down to a point at which it can be easily carried, can be attained without any of the members of the congregation in humbler circumstances being burdened, by those to whom God has given more ample means recognising the obligation which their possession implies. A Communicants' Class was opened and conducted for two months last winter, and so far as we could judge, with good results. A similar class will be opened almost immediately. We trust that it will be largely attended by young people, who have not yet seen their way to the Lord's table, and by others who are already communicants. We bespeak the prayers of those who love the Saviour, to whom the advancement of His Kingdom is dear, on behalf of those attending the Class. Here, "all things are of God." He can bless savingly; He alone can. And He, who reveals the Father, and is the way to the Father, says:—"Ask and ye shall receive."

After all, such Reports as these can only deal with what is, to a large extent, external. That which is most vital in individual and congregational experience and attainment, cannot be embraced in the retrospect which they supply. It is all the more important that we should deal faithfully and as before God with ourselves, in relation to what is highest and most spiritual. It is difficult, indeed, to overstate the importance in these days of meeting the unbelief of the world with an exhibition of life in Christ, so real and positive as to arrest its attention and compel its homage, if it cannot, in every case, change its unhappy attitude. Wherefore, brethren, "put ye on the Lord Jesus," "be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might."

MANAGERS' REPORT, 1881.

THE MANAGERS have much pleasure in submitting to the congregation their Twenty-eighth Annual Report.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$6,501.16, the expenditure to \$6,575.50, and the balance on hand at the 1st of January was \$510.47.

The receipts were made up as follows :

At the last Annual Meeting the Managers were asked to assume charge of the Church debt, and this year the sum of \$1,228.50 was collected from subscriptions promised the Building Committee. Deducting this amount from the total receipts, the ordinary revenue will be seen to be \$5,272.66, an increase of \$179.22 over that of the previous year; and the expenditure, after deducting the amounts paid for interest on debt, shows an increase of \$232.19, when compared with that of the preceding year.

The Managers have paid the Treasurer of the Building Committee \$137.46, the amount due him as per last statement of that Committee, and for interest due on mortgages, \$2,204.37. As has been already stated, the receipts from subscriptions amounted to \$1,228.50, but to meet the charges on the Church debt it has been necessary to use not only this amount, but also \$1,113.33 from the ordinary revenue of the congregation.

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The two mortgages for \$28,000, representing the debt on the Church, and bearing interest at seven per cent., matured on the 15th November last, and it was necessary for the Managers to make arrangements to meet them.

At a joint meeting of the Session and Managers the subject was carefully considered, and it was the general opinion of those then present that the best plan to adopt would be to give a new mortgage for \$20,000, and carry the \$8,000 as a floating debt, in the hope that the congregation, feeling the great desirability of having the debt reduced as speedily as possible, would deal with the matter at its Annual Meeting.

Accordingly, a new mortgage for \$20,000, for five years, at six per cent. interest, has been executed, with the privilege of paying it off by instalments upon notice being given, and the \$8,000 is carried as an open account, also bearing interest at six per cent.

As the amount due from subscriptions is now small, the Managers think it would be advisable for the congregation to devise some means for reducing the debt to such a sum that the interest on it could easily be met out of the ordinary revenue, and any scheme which the congregation may adopt for this purpose will receive their most cordial support.

From the statement of the Ladies' Furnishing Association it will be seen that their debt has been entirely paid.

The Managers who retire this year are Messrs. Carrie, Alex. Nairn, Christie, Woodbridge, McIntosh and Mills.

As a congregation we should rejoice at the harmony that prevails among all connected with it, and should pray to God for His favour still to be continued to us.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL.

In presenting our Report for the year it is pleasant to have to announce progress in every respect. The attendance has been larger and steadier than in any previous year. There has been a marked increase in the contributions for Missionary purposes. A larger number has been added to the Communion Roll of the Church from the Sabbath School than during any year of its history. And while there have been, as is always to be expected, many instances of

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sickness, both among teachers and children, there has not been even one of death since the date of our last Report.

The number of names on the Roll is, of boys, 139 ; of girls, 178, in all 317, or an increase of 17. In the infant class, which continues to be taught by Miss Caven and Miss Inglis, there are on the Roll fifty-five boys and thirty-seven girls. This interesting class, however, is subject to continuous change ; new classes being formed from it every few months, while others come to take the place of those thus removed.

In addition to this class there are at present thirty-one classes taught by seventeen female and fourteen male teachers ; the classes being on an average larger than they formerly were.

The most advanced class of girls is still taught by Mr. Kirkland, and is largely attended. During the course of the year it has given several teachers to the School to take the places of those removing, or to take the charge of new classes.

The School has had to lose the services, during the year, of several long and valued workers ; some on account of severe illness, or impaired health, and others through removal from the city or other causes : Mrs. Kirkland, Mrs. Picken, Miss Creighton, and Messrs. Picken, Smith, Dawson, McPherson and Wightman. Those who have the closest acquaintance with the School will be the readiest to admit how great is the loss sustained by the withdrawal of some of these. We tender to those who have been compelled by sickness to retire from loved work, our sincere sympathy ; and we follow to his new home, with our best wishes, Mr. Wightman, whose quiet, steady discharge of duty will be long and gratefully remembered. We have received in the room of these, Misses Taylor, Thornton, McIntosh, Gowans and Peattie, and Messrs. Watt, Brown, and Dunbar.

The Anniversary of the School was held in its usual place of meeting on the evening of the 14th January. The attendance of children was large. They were addressed by the Revs. Messrs. Parsons, Gilray, and others. The usual summer gathering was held at Mimico on the 18th June, and was largely attended both by parents and children.

The Librarians report the Library in good condition. It now numbers 800 volumes, 50 new ones having been added during the year. About as many, which had done long service, were sent to the mission field in the Presbytery of Barrie, of which the Rev. D. James has the charge.

A weekly meeting for the preparation of the Lesson, and occasional meetings for business have been held, while the brief season of prayer after the dismissal of the school has been continued, and has been found to be useful and refreshing.

The statement of Mr. Smith, who has so long and so efficiently acted as Treasurer of the School, is appended. The hope is cherished that restored health may enable him to renew his service at some not distant date.

The contributions of the school for missionary purposes, including a small sum for interest, have amounted during the year to \$276, being an increase of \$46.50 over the previous year. This amount has been allocated as follows:

REPORT.

In submitting their First Annual Report, the Committee congratulate the Association upon the success of the past season's work, and in looking back over the year that is gone they feel assured that the change from a Young Men's to a Young People's Association has been a very happy one. From the Association not having been formed until December 6th of last year, and the decision to hold fortnightly meetings instead of weekly having been reached, the working session was shorter than it otherwise would have been.

The Association has met on each alternate Monday evening, in its room, at eight o'clock. The average attendance of members at ordinary meetings has been thirty, and the number on the roll fifty-two. The regular programme consisted of readings, essays on given subjects,

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debates, extracts from the Association magazine, impromptu speeches, the analysis of Tennyson's "In Memoriam," and music, vocal and instrumental. Four debates have been held, four essays read, a great variety of interesting articles written for the magazine. The analysis of the "In Memoriam" has been one of the most prominent and useful features in the season's work. At the beginning of the session it was decided to take up some department of Christian work, but the season being advanced nothing was in the meantime attempted. Later, however, some of the members took an active part in canvassing for the Church Extension Association, and about \$60 was collected by them from members of the congregation. In closing this brief report, your Committee would suggest that the coming year witness a united effort on the part of the Association to take part in some distinct form of Christian work, as they feel convinced that by such effort the Association would be greatly benefited.

REPORT FOR 1881.

YOUR Committee has much pleasure in again reporting a considerable increase of income over that of the previous year, large as that was.

The sum received through the collectors is \$1,799.28 ; the sum paid directly to the Treasurer, including the collection at the last annual meeting, is \$218.30 ; the collection for Home Missions at the interesting services of yesterday, after deducting the usual Sabbath collection, amounted to \$280. Adding to these sums the interest received for moneys deposited during a part of the year,

\$14.42, the entire revenue of the Association will be seen to amount to \$2,312, as compared with \$2,129.18 for the previous year, or an increase of \$182.82.

This increase, gratifying as it is, does not represent fairly the advance which has been made in the general rate of giving. It must be borne in mind that the revenue of last year was increased by special donations and contributions, made in connection with the visit of the Rev. Dr. McKay, which we could not expect to see repeated during the year which this report covers. It is, therefore, most satisfactory to be able to state that these have been more than made good by a very general increase in the contributions of members for missionary purposes.

Of the amount above reported, there were contributed, specially for Foreign Missions, \$50 by William Gordon and \$10 by four little girls; for Formosa, \$20 by Mr. Geo. Smith and \$10 by Mr. Josiah Bruce; and for the McAll Mission, Paris, \$10 by Mr. George Smith. Deducting these special donations, and \$51 paid for the *Records* which are distributed to the congregation, and \$4 for Collectors' books and advertisement, there remains \$1,977 to be allocated among those schemes of the Church on behalf of which these moneys have been contributed.

The following is the allocation of the amount which is suggested for the approval of the congregation: For the General Assembly's Home Mission Fund, \$987; for the Foreign Mission Fund, \$250; for the College Fund, \$420; for Manitoba College, \$25; for the University Scholarship Fund, \$60; and for French Evangelization, \$135; being an increased amount to each of the four great objects over that allocated last year.

To complete the view of what has been contributed by this congregation throughout the year for the schemes of the Church, it is necessary to add \$270.50 contributed by the Sabbath School for Home, Foreign, and French

Mission work; \$175
Band for Foreign M
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Mission work; \$175 by the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band for Foreign Missions; \$55, the collection on the day of Public Thanksgiving, for the Aged Ministers' Fund and Ministers' Widows' Fund; \$41.78 paid by the Treasurer for the Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery Funds; \$25 paid by members of the congregation to the Knox College Building Fund; and \$127 to the Toronto Presbyterian Church Extension Association; in all, \$694.28. making the whole amount contributed by the congregation for Missionary, Educational, and Church Extension purposes to be, \$3,006.28.
