## CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

EASTER, 1885.

---

*To the Vestry and Congregation of St. James' Cathedral :*

The Churchwardens beg to submit herewith their accounts for the year ending 28th February last, together with the Auditors' Report thereon.

The following points appear to be worthy of remark :

The Congregation has raised by direct collections in the Church, and by contributions from its members during the year, upwards of \$15,000, all but about \$2,000 of this being of the nature of regular annual contributions. The figures substantially correspond to those of last year.

Part of the amount was contributed for special objects, prominent among them being the Protestant Episcopal Divinity School. An apparent decrease in the amount collected for this object as compared with last year is accounted for by the circumstance that some large contributions were not handed over until after the year's account was closed. The actual amount contributed by members of this congregation towards that object remains substantially the same. It is cheering to know that the difficulties with which this church is struggling have not led to any falling off in its liberality towards that important allied institution ; whose foundation is in a large measure due to, and its continued support dependent on, the public spirited zeal of this congregation.

Turning to the proper expenses of the Church and the means applicable thereto, by separating items of usual expenditure from the figures in the statement, it appears that the ordinary maintenance of our church establishment including interest on the debt is costing in round figures from \$12,000 to \$13,000 per annum. A corresponding abstract of the figures on the other shews that our ordinary income including the \$787 derived from rents of the Church property, falls short of the above expenditure by about \$2,500. By comparison with the reports of former years since our income from the lands in litigation has been in suspense, it appears that the above annual deficiency is substantially a constant sum.

It has been the habit to provide for this annual deficiency by borrowing from the surplus funds derived from St. James' Cemetery. This fund being legally at the disposal of the Vestry can be drawn upon by it, without swelling the amount of interest-paying debt. Being however, a surplus derived from sales of the land, it is obvious that it is drawn from a constantly diminishing capital, and one that it is improper to treat as a regular source for meeting deficiencies in our income.

During the past year your Churchwardens, with the assistance of the Finance Committee investigated the details of the expenditure without finding any room for reduction consistently with efficiency. It is indeed obvious that in certain directions it would be exceedingly desirable to increase the establishment. The only way of meeting the deficiency is by raising an increased income.

The most obvious room for increase is in the ground rents upon the proprietary pews. The power reserved to the Vestry of raising the ground rents has not been exercised since the original sales, many of them dating back to thirty years ago. The time seems to have arrived when it is equitable as well as necessary for the Vestry to act in this matter, and we feel persuaded that these pew owners themselves will cheerfully acquiesce in the proposed increase. A scheme has been prepared by the Finance Committee for making a gross increase of fifty per cent upon the present ground rents. If adopted, this will yield about \$500 additional income. A resolution on the subject will be submitted at a meeting to be called for that purpose.

The next items to which we would draw attention are those of "paid poor of the parish" \$589, and \$400 salary of City missionary. Of the former sum, a large portion is expended in the support of the admirable institution known as the St. James' Old People's Home. It appears to the Churchwardens that this institution although well administered at present under the charge of the Rector and Clergy, and Mr. Beaty, our City Missionary, might be provided for in a manner to make both its support and administration independent of the funds of the Church, instead of, as at present, increasing the deficiency.

The money is so applied as to assist a number of worthy parishioners, chiefly elderly or infirm persons, to eke out their own means of self-support without sacrifice of their independence and spirit of self-help. It is a great boon to this class to be helped to procure the simple lodgings they require in a decent house under friendly care and supervision. A visit to the institution never fails to awaken sympa-

thy and to invite co-operation. With the assistance of a Committee of our active and zealous lady workers, we believe the maintenance and administration of this excellent charity might be placed, so far as the Church income is concerned upon a self-supporting basis.

The amount of our annual deficit we hope can be greatly reduced by these means, and that the necessary effort will be made on the part of the Congregation to efface it altogether.

The Churchwardens venture to suggest to the ladies of the Congregation to consider the propriety of their forming from among themselves one grand Cathedral Charities' Committee, of which such works as the District Visitors, the Dorcas Society and the Sewing Class, together with the additional work we have referred to might form branches. In such a general Committee the field of benevolent enterprise might be reviewed, and improved methods, and new channels of usefulness developed. Such an organization, it appears to us, would tend to promote among us a feeling of unity in work aim, and form the rallying point which our large and scattered Congregation feels to be a need.

The litigation in which the Church has been engaged has been carried on through the past year pursuant to the resolutions of Vestry from time to time, and we hope will soon reach a final hearing.

The Churchwardens do not propose to recapitulate the proceedings which have been reported at previous meetings during the year. Pursuant to the leave reserved by Mr. Justice Strong as mentioned in the special report of the 20th February, the application to the Supreme Court to allow an appeal direct to that Court has been argued before the full court and now stands for judgment.

The matter being *sub judice*, your Churchwardens do not think it proper to say more than that they await the decision with hopefulness.

The Churchwardens cannot conclude their report without making grateful reference to the able counsel and assistance rendered them by those two important standing Committees of Vestry, the Finance and Consulting Committee and the Musical Committee.

Their assistance has greatly lightened the burden of responsibility which the events of the year cast upon us.

### CHURCH OF ST. JAMES THE LESS.

In this Church, situated within the grounds of St. James' Cemetery, morning and evening service is now conducted by the clergy of the Cathedral. The average attendance during morning service is 70 or 80, evening service 120 or more. Increasing interest seems to be manifested in these services.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL, ST. JAMES THE LESS.

The Sunday School in connection with the Cemetery Church is at present held in Rose Avenue Hall at 3 p.m. every Sunday afternoon. The gentlemen teachers are Mr. Jenkins, Mr. Melville, Mr. Stagg.

The Superintendent is the Rev. Dyson Hague; the Secretary, Mr. Fred. Hodgins; the Treasurer, Mr. Stagg.

The School is in every way prosperous. The attendance is so large, that it is hoped a new school may soon be provided. The children are well behaved, quiet, orderly, and devout. The teachers are earnest and devoted to their work. Many thanks are especially due to our esteemed treasurer Mr. Stagg, whose kindness in preparing the School, and taking care of the Bibles and hymn books is beyond praise.

By the generosity of Mr. Wyld and Mr. Jenkins, illustrated papers are distributed to all the children once a month.

**St. James' Home and Foreign Missionary Society, 1884-85.**

---

Missionary meetings have been held every month, excepting July, August, and September, when most of the members are absent from town. At these meetings accounts of missionary work in the Northwest, China, India, and other countries have been read, also many letters from missionaries working in home and foreign fields.

We have continued our support to the missions helped last year, namely, the Blackfeet Indians of the Blood Reserve, in the Diocese of Saskatchewan.

The emigrant settlers in the district of Beaconsfield, Norquay, in the Diocese of Rupertsland, and to the lady missionaries in India, through the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, besides occasional help to other missions.

Mrs. Bourne, the wife of the missionary to the Blackfeet Indians, was present at one of our meetings, and gave us an account of her own and her husband's work. One practical result of Mrs. Bourne's address was the sending by her of a box of clothes and medicines for the Indians' use.

At Norquay, a clergyman, the Rev. A. G. Pinkham, has been appointed. Mr. Pinkham writes that his parish comprises a district of 200 square miles, though the scattered population does not exceed 400. The people are poor, the harvest, last year, was a bad one, and he appeals to us for help in building a church, getting a small organ. The subscriptions sent by this society amount to \$83.

Last year our interest in the work in India was new, and we had much to tell about it; this year there is not so much to say, but we are still deeply interested in it, and doing what we can to help our sisters who are working so nobly there. In December we had the pleasure of welcoming to our meeting the Rev. Mr. Alexander, who is one of the Church Missionary Society missionaries at Ellore, South India.

In July the Young People's Working Party in connection with our society sent to Miss Highton, Calcutta, two large boxes filled with

dolls, work-bags, scrap-books, and other gifts, which are useful as prizes in the schools, and which also aid our missionaries in gaining an entrance into the Zenanas.

A kind letter of thanks came from Miss Highton, and in the last number of "India's Women," we read in her report of the pleasure and encouragement it had given her to find that even in distant Canada God was raising up friends.

This year the working party have made clothes which are to be sent to Mrs. Bourne for the Indian children, and now they are working for Algoma.

To the Zenana Mission we have sent \$378.79 this year.

We were gratified by a visit from the Bishop of Algoma, who gave an interesting address upon the work and needs of his large diocese. We trust the interest thus excited may lead to practical evidence of sympathy.

Whilst the efforts already made by this society have succeeded in producing some satisfactory practical results in the contributions, which amount to \$1,021.19 this year, we confidently trust that the liberality of the friends of missions in our Church and congregation will not be found unequal to such additional claims upon them in the exercise of their stewardship. Let us help Algoma more generously than heretofore, not by diminishing our contribution to other missions, but by denying ourselves, that we may be able to give more, remembering how Christ himself became poor, that we might be rich, and that only in the path of self-denial can we be His followers.

And so we close another year, and as we lay its work at the Master's feet, we can only ask Him to accept the little we have done, to pardon what we have left undone, and as we enter upon a new year of work, to consecrate us more wholly to His service. Our work is only "till He comes," and then from every nation and people and tongue will be gathered all who are among those that love His appearing, and then the rest and joy will be forever.

The School opened the last Saturday in October, and will close about the 21st of May, there has been a regular attendance of from 90 to 105 children, the numbers having varied very little from week

to week this year. Hitherto the Sewing School has always been assisted by a considerable grant in either money or clothing from the Dorcas Society. This year the Dorcas Society declined to promise any aid, and in consequence further subscriptions had to be solicited and were kindly given. It was also found necessary to enquire into the circumstances of the children, and charge those full price who could afford to pay instead of all half price as heretofore. The sum paid by children up to date is \$42.05, at the close of last season the school was left in debt to the Sec.-Treasurer 3.85 which has since been refunded, until the school closes it is impossible to make up the accounts as the children always pay more in proportion at the end of the season it is hoped there will be enough this year to meet all debts incurred. The school usually breaks up with a tea party and prizes presented by the teachers and other ladies interested in it. A great number of prizes were given last year.

#### BAND OF HOPE.

The Band of Hope is the juvenile section of the Church Temperance Society. There are 400 members, with an average attendance of 130 to 150. The meetings are held fortnightly on Saturday afternoons, in the school house, an address is delivered, and songs and recitations are given by the members of the Band. Music is furnished by a large choir of the children who are trained by the kindness of Miss Joseph and Mr. Reekes, under the new system lately adopted, the Band is divided into classes in charge of a teacher who is present at the meetings, and visits the absentees. On January 29th an entertainment was given by the Band of Hope in the school-house, and proved a great success. In a few weeks it is proposed to give another. We are glad to report that the interest taken in the work, and the Band of Hope is increasing, and that good effects are already manifest. Apart from instruction on Temperance subjects, a grand opportunity is offered in the Band for the inculcation of many sound and healthful moral and spiritual principles.

## THE CATHEDRAL HOME.

The above words have come to describe two very plain houses, Nos. 34 and 36 Sherbourne street, wherein are lodged 12 old women, the pensioners of the parish. Those dwellings cannot, in the strict sense of the words, be called a Home, for we do not profess to maintain those lodged therein. Instead of allowing those old and, many of them, helpless women to rent rooms for themselves wherever they could do so, it was thought better to gather them all together into one place and pay for this place the sums for many years given to them by the Church for rent of their several rooms. The advantages of this plan are obvious. It costs the Church no more than did the old arrangement. It secures better rooms in a decent locality, and it affords to the clergy and to all interested in the pensioners an opportunity to visit them altogether, and to hold services for their benefit.

A regular Sunday afternoon service and a Thursday evening cottage meeting have been held in one of the houses. These have been a great comfort to some whose infirmities prevented attendance at church.

By the liberality of two members of the Church a stove and coal were provided for each house. The inmates are very sensible of the comfort yielded by those arrangements.

A Christmas dinner and an Easter tea and entertainment were kindly provided for the old people, which they greatly enjoyed.

## THE POOR.

In a parish so large, and embracing so many poor streets and lanes, the number seeking relief through the long winter, must necessarily be very great. It is the duty, yea the privilege, of every Christian church to take care of its poor, and to apply the offerings of the faithful to their relief. Due care has been taken to do this wisely and well. The great difficulty is to discriminate and to help

only those those having a claim on the church, and who give promise of sobriety and industry and well-doing. In this the District Visitors and the Scripture reader of the parish have given invaluable assistance. It will be found that the sum thus expended is by no means too large, and that it has given timely aid and comfort to many.

#### THE HAVEN.

At the request of Matron and Management of the Haven I have conducted a service in this home every Tuesday evening at 7 p. m. The work is most hopeful, and many seem to have received a blessing through the simple exposition of the Gospel message.
