



JURY COULD NOT AGREE

Ten for Conviction and Two for Acquittal, Their Standing

William A. Clark, charged with attempt to commit rape, indecent assault and common assault, will be re-tried on the first two counts on the 23rd of this month.

After being out on Saturday for six hours the jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the count of common assault alleged to have been committed upon Amelia Vaughan, and they stood ten to two in favor of conviction on the counts of attempt to commit rape upon Ethel Train and indecent assault upon Grace Tuttle. From three o'clock to 7.30 p. m. the balloting resulted in 10 for conviction and 2 for acquittal. Clark was remanded to jail until the date of his second trial.
