

Ships, With Steam Up, Ready for Cuban Service

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Sixteen ships under charter by the United States government are moored at docks in South Brooklyn waiting orders, which are expected at any moment, to sail to Cuba or some southern port to take on supplies or serve as transports for soldiers. There are twenty ships in Brooklyn awaiting orders to sail.

ORDER MORE SOUNDINGS TAKEN

After hearing the mayor and H. B. Schofield report on their recent visit to Ottawa, the council decided Saturday afternoon that Director Chabing and the harbor master should personally take soundings at the Sand Point berth, that the city dredge should be put to work continuously during daylight and that the board of works should test a digging machine offered by S. FUNERALS YESTERDAY A. J. GORHAM'S BODY FOUND

Last Sad Rites Extended to Several Well Known Citizens.

Moncton, Oct. 7.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of A. J. Gorham has been solved by the finding of the body of the missing man in the Petitcodiac river this afternoon, about eight miles above Moncton. About 4 o'clock a young man named George Hoar, son of William Hoar, who was at Maurice Steeves' farm, went down on the marsh for the cows. It was high water, and he saw a body floating in the river face down. He sent word for assistance, and Steeves soon arrived and after following the body down river for a mile, the high water drove it ashore and it was recovered. The body was brought by Steeves to the city about 9 o'clock to-night and taken to Undertaker Tardif's rooms, where it was positively identified by friends.

The clothing was weighed with twenty-five or thirty pounds of mud, showing the body had been buried and had probably been washed up by the heavy tide running today. Articles found in the pockets were identified. The collar, which was fastened in front on one side only, as the boys described the body seen floating in the river the day Gorham disappeared, bore the initials A. G. A pair of scissors, a memo book, etc., were taken from the pockets. The gold watch deceased carried was missing. Part of the chain, with charm attached to the vest, was recognized as the property of the missing man. The body was considerably swollen and the features were unrecognizable, but the size corresponded with Gorham's. A bruise was found over the left eye, bearing out the theory that as deceased fell over the wharf he struck head foremost on the rocks twenty feet below.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 7.—It is reported that a fourteen year old son of Richard Aldridge, of Donkton, was fatally shot yesterday. He was out hunting and when climbing a fence his gun went off, the shot entering his stomach and he died in a few hours.

Sunday School Anniversary

The forty-seventh anniversary of the Sunday school of Exmouth street Methodist church was celebrated yesterday by a very large gathering. In the afternoon a large day service was held. The attendance was 467, and the collection amounted to \$11.22, the infant class contributing \$1.49. The service was held in the main school, and the collection was taken in other ways kept the day.

The evening service was very largely attended, and was given by the pastor, Mr. A. J. Frosser, assisted by the choir, made up of the Sunday school members, sang in good voice, while additional services were rendered by the Rev. Samuel Howland, and others. The collection for the day was \$11.22.

The report of the Sunday school for the past year shows that section which meets in Exmouth street church—was thirty-six pupils in the primary department, and 248 scholars in the intermediate and adult classes, a total of 387, the average attendance being 225.

In Glad Tidings hall branch there are ten officers and teachers, sixty scholars in the primary department and sixty in the intermediate and adult classes, a total of 120, with an average attendance of eighty.

The home department comprises seventy-three members, and the average number for the past year was 45. The collection for the year was \$10.87.

The receipts and expenditures for the year were: Cash on hand at beginning of year, \$7.73; Received by mass given, \$31.95; Contributed by Glad Tidings hall, \$5.00; Contributed by home department, \$11.18; Proceeds of three entertainments, \$105.90.

Of this amount, \$38.80 was given on Christmas Sunday for the Sunday school of Exmouth street church. The balance of \$77.09 was paid over to the committee in charge of the Wain property, and \$23.72 was contributed to the Wain property, etc., leaving a balance of \$80.87.

The library contains 327 Bibles and books for reading, and 322 books for circulation among the members of the school.

Superintendent J. A. Adams, in his report, also said that the Wain property was purchased by the school two years ago, and after making considerable repairs, the debt had been reduced about \$400.

The persecution of the early Christians, their fortitude and faith under the greatest sufferings were dwelt upon and dealt with by the speaker in a manner which engaged the deepest attention of his hearers.

The meetings will be held monthly during the winter and Father Meahan will continue his interesting talk on this important subject.



Wonderful Record of Vessels Wrecked and Ruined --A Steamer Driven Into the Woods--Other Vessels Found High and Dry in Mill Yards--Multitude of Evidences of the Big Storm.

The Mobile Record of Oct. 1 presents the following record of vessels and wharves wrecked and ruined during the recent hurricane.

IN MOBILE BAY. Br. steamer Doris Brook, two miles in wood, Dauphin Island. Nor. bark Norge, capsized, all hands lost. Br. schooner King of Avon, capsized, all hands lost, except one seaman.

ALONG MOBILE RIVER. Bark Emma, dismantled.

Schooner James C. Clifford, in Hieronymus' mill yard. Nor. steamer Conard, high and dry in Hieronymus' mill yard.

Then comes the Hieronymus mill, foot of Canal street, a wreck, lumber piled in all directions and the walls blown down, and in some places the top off the mill.

Below that comes the large coal barge of Josephine, high and dry on the wharf. The office and warehouse of the Star Fish and Oyster Company, suffered considerable loss.


