Canada Boasts Big Telescope

Has a Mirror 73 Inches in Diameter, and Weighing Two Tons

An Electric Control - Mounting is Done With Great Mathematical Skill and Precision

Few Canadians are probably aware that Canada possesses the largest telescope now in use. It will be surpassed soon by the new Mount Wilson 100-inch reflector now in course of construction. This big glass is at the Dominion Atrophysical Observatory, Victoria, B. C., which is situated on the summit of Saanich Hill, elevation 782 feet, about eight miles north of the city. It is easily accessible from there, either by automobile over a good road paved most of the way, or by electric car to a station at the foot of the hill, whence the summit can be reached on foot, a mile and a half by road or half a mile by

S. A. The engineering problems involved were very difficult ones, but so successfully have they been carried out, that a pressure of five pounds at the up-per end of the tube will move the whole

per end of the tube will move the whole forty-five tons.

The telescope is pointed and exactly centred on any desired star by electric motors, there being seven motors and several magnetic clutches and solenoids for this purpose. After the telescope has been pointed, an exceedingly accurate governor mechanism, called the driving clock, moves the telescope at the exact rate to follow the star's motion across the sky. The whole mechanism has been so beautifully designed and executed that it can be handled with greater ease and convenience than many telescopes of only one-quarter the size.

For the proper use of this telescope, it is necessary to have a specially designed building with revolving dome, so that the opening in the latter, which is closed by a pair of shutters when not in use, can be directed to any part of the sky. In addition to the shutters, canvas curtains move up and down the shutter opening to prevent the tube being shaken if the wind is blowing, and an elevated platform, extending across the opening and moving up and down its whole extent, enables the observer to work with safety and convenience at the upper end of the tube in any position. 



There has been a great let-down, a subsidence of public spirit, and a tendency to show impatience with those who unto show impatience with those who undertake to disturb popular indifference. Among the masses of the people the families of men who have fallen, and of men who are now in the fight, go their way, saying little as yet, but thinking much. These people are weighing the country and finding it wanting. They are seeking each other, coming together in local organizations, beginning to be in local organizations, beginning to be articulate. Then will come a time for plain speech and for the public expos-ure of those who made use of the world's isaster, and of the sorrow and sacrifice of their neighbors, as an opportunity for their own enrichment. 



IN FIRE WHICH SWEPT OVER RUSSIAN CITY

St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 31—The political crisis, arising from the rejection, by the legislative council, of the Business Profits Tax Bill, unanimously endorsed by the national government, has been settled without resorting to an appeal to the country.

Since the Sept. 1—Several thousand persons are reported to have been killed and injured in the fire which swept the city of Kazan, on the Kazanka River, 480 miles east of Moscow, early this week. The fire burned for thirty-six hours, driving most of the population outside

Fredericton, Sept. 1—Rafting operations of the St. John River Log Driving Company at the Douglas boom are proceeding steadily. Mews, Cook, McNamara and Bell, who at onve voted in favor of the Profits Tax Bill, which thereupon became law. In the lower house, after heated addresses vigorously condemning the attitude of those opponents of the measure destined to increase the pensions of the country's soldiers and sailors, a parliamentary bill of August, 1911, was unanimously passed, defining more clearly the rights of the legislative council, and reserving to the lower house full right to deal with money and simlar bills.
