Remarkable Revelations Of Haldane's Visit To Germany

Plans for Invasion of England Referred to as Actually Existing—The Kaiser and His Army—The Bagdad Railway

London, Sept. 1.—Important revelations form a valuable chapter in the history of British and German negotiations during the eight years before the war are published by the Manchester Guardian. The revelations are a detailed account of the negotiations which Richard Burdon Haldane (now Viscount Haldane), then secretary for war, conducted with Emperor William, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German imperial chancellor, Admiral Von Tirpitz, minister of the German navy, and other German leaders. Striking conversations are included. Haldane was the foremost student of Germany among the British public since the war, the gist of the attacks upon him being based on a charge that he knew of Germany's designs but had reassured his fellow countrymen that all was well.

News of Casualties Came Today to More Soldiers' Homes Here

Mrs. Ethel Levine, of 99 Lombard street, received the following telegram from Ottawa this morning: "Sincerely regret to inform you that your son, Pte. Myer Levine, officially reported dangerously ill, condition unchanged. Admitted to Royal Victoria Hospital August 28, suffering from gunshot wound in the left leg." Mrs. Levine received a similar telegram two weeks ago, and since that time has lived in hopes of receiving word that he was convalescent, but when she received the telegram this morning, she broke down. Pte. Levine left home about one year ago with the 140th Battalion, but soon after his arrival in England was transferred into another Canadian unit in France.

German Gain Very Small and Made At a Great Expense

Heavy Bombardment and Some Infantry Attacks on New Advanced Posts—Hand Fighting on Roumanian Front; Allies Doing Better

London, Sept. 1.—The British official statement issued last night follows:—"Early this morning the enemy opened a heavy bombardment against the positions recently captured by us east of the Hargreave and east of Epehy. At the same time the Germans shelled our lines east of Goussau Court. East of Hargreave, no infantry attack developed, but farther north strong bodies of the enemy attacked at an isolated knoll north of Guillaumont Farm, forming part of the ground gained by us on August 19. They forced our small garrison to evacuate this advanced position. Other hostile parties which attacked our trenches east of Goussau Court were repulsed. During the night strong German raiding parties succeeded in entering one of our posts east of the Oostverne. A few of our men are missing."

HORNBY IS AGAIN SECOND

Rough Still National's Leading Batter

Cobb Keeps up Remarkable Batting, 13 Hits in Seven Games—Other News of the Ball Players

Chicago, Sept. 1.—With an average of 83.4, Roger Hornby, of the St. Louis infielder, regained second place among the National League batters, according to averages including games of Wednesday, released today. Roush of Cincinnati continues to show the way with 349. Roberson of New York, led Cravat of the Philadelphia for home runs, each having nine. Williams of Chicago has taken the lead in sacrifice hitting with 25. Carrie of Pittsburgh continued to lead in base hitting, 38. New York tied Cincinnati in team batting with an average of 265.

CHURCH CONGRESS IN MOSCOW OPENS

Many Reform Bills Prepared Since Revolution—Some of the Changes

Moscow, Aug. 30.—The ecumenical congress of the Orthodox church, which is empowered to reform the canon law within the limitations prescribed by the Holy Writ and by the dogmas, canons and tradition of the church, held its first business session today. The congress is expected to sit continuously for two months, completing its labors before the convocation of the constituent assembly, to which body the proposals of the congress for the future inter-relations of church and state will be submitted for confirmation.

SUPPLEMENTARY SERIES OF HARVESTERS' EXCURSIONS

Montreal, Aug. 31.—Representatives of the chief Canadian railways met today in Montreal and decided that in view of the condition of farm laborers in the west it was advisable to arrange for a supplementary series of harvesters' excursions to Ontario and Quebec only. Those from east of Ottawa will leave on September 11 and those from Ottawa and west on September 12.

TO STORE MILLION BUSHELS OF POTATOES IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Sept. 1.—Plans for purchasing and storing 1,000,000 bushels of potatoes, for use after Jan. 1 next have been started by the middle western section of the national food administration. The potatoes are to be sold to consumers at cost.

SAYS DOKKHOBS SHOULD GO TO WAR TOO

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 1.—Peter Verigin, head of a Doukhobor settlement near Brilliant, B. C., says that in his opinion the Doukhobors in Canada should be exempted from military service. He also says that some young men in his settlement have already enlisted in the war.

FORMER CANADIAN DOCTOR IS ARRESTED

Detroit, Sept. 1.—Dr. Geo. A. Fritch was locked up at the central headquarters following the death of Mrs. Christine Gordon, aged twenty, who passed away at Harper Hospital. Death was due to a criminal operation, and the police say the woman made a statement incriminating the former Canadian physician.

NO MORE DUTCH BOBS.

The Hague, Sept. 1.—The Netherlands government has forbidden the exportation of flower bulbs.

YESTERDAY'S ACCIDENT

SHORTAGE OF COAL ALARMS AUSTRIA

Basel, Switzerland, Sept. 1.—Herr von Hatzfeldt, the Austrian Minister of Public Works, started the Austrian Chamber of Deputies by giving it as his official opinion that the coal crisis had become a vital question for Austria-Hungary, according to Vienna advices. The situation, declared the minister, was one which must be faced with optimism and with the utmost seriousness.

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NEW SCHOOL BOOK SYSTEM WORKS WELL

Fredericton, Sept. 1.—The cash system with respect to school books sold by the provincial government seems to be working out very satisfactorily. The change from the old system of advance payment on account of books on credit, the vendors wishing to take advantage of the 16 per cent discount allowed by the government. The balance represents the proceeds from the sale of new books, the cash has accompanied the orders in each case.

SULPHUR SHIPMENTS EN ROUTE ENTER FREE

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—The Department of Trade and Commerce has been notified from Washington that the Bureau of Export Licenses has authorized the United States customs collectors to pass sulphur shipments to Canada, which were already en route on or before August 27, and prior to the coming into effect of the new American export regulations.

ITALIAN POET IN GALLANT WORK

D'Annunzio Prominent in Air Raid on Austrian Lines and is Slightly Wounded

Paris, Sept. 1.—Gabriele D'Annunzio, Italian poet, took a prominent part in the recent Italian air raid over the enemy lines above Pola and was wounded slightly, according to a Havas dispatch from Milan. On the morning of August 19, D'Annunzio remained over the enemy lines for forty-eight minutes at an altitude of between 300 and 900 metres, attacking the Austrian infantry with machine gun fire. He repeated the performance in the afternoon.

CAPTAIN COLQUHOUN MAKES HIS ESCAPE INTO HOLLAND

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 1.—Worri has received here that Captain W. G. Colquhoun of this city, one of the best Canadian officers to be taken prisoner by the Germans has made his escape into Holland. It is expected that he will soon be paroled. Before being wounded and taken prisoner, Captain Colquhoun, who was with the Princess Patricia's regiment, distinguished himself as a sniper and trench raider.

CARRY CANADIAN FRUIT TO MILLION HOMES. Canada's fruit crop must be utilized to the fullest extent this year to relieve the pressure upon other sources of food supply.

Government authorities, the transportation companies and the growers are co-operating with this end in view.

University and high school girls are taking the place of men who have gone to the front in the work of gathering in the crop, giving up their vacations to toil from morn till eve in the orchards.

In order to bring the fruit to the consumer in the best of condition the Canadian Express Company is operating over the Grand Trunk line each day a special train from the Niagara Peninsula carrying fruit only.

This train which begins its run in the early afternoon at St. Catharines, Ont., is made up of the most modern type of express cars specially adapted for carrying fruit, having the maximum of ventilation.

There is an average of twelve of these cars on the fruit special each day. The fruit is picked in the early part of the day and is carried to special sheds erected at each of the fruit shipping points.

These sheds being kept scrupulously clean and free from dust. This special train service makes it possible to place the fruit on the consumer table within twenty-four hours of its being picked.

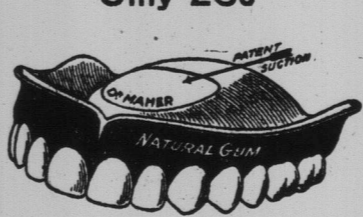

AN EDUCATED EYE

Its Owner Able to Draft Plans Without A Scale.

One of the major advantages of the modern system of manual training is the education of the hand to conform to the functions of the eye. Now Charles M. Horton, writing on "The Value of the Eye in Designing," in the American Machinist, makes suggestions which should be of interest to instructors of the young.

A striking incident is cited in which a designer of machinery had so educated the eye in the matter of accurate measurements that he was able to plan intricate

engines without resorting to the scale. While this expert gesser admitted that the faculty was in part a gift, he insisted that it could be cultivated to a high degree. In this case the possessor of the valuable asset claimed that it was easy for him without using the scale to establish the thickness of cylinder walls, size of ports, diameter of shaft, diameter of fly wheel, and other dimensions, from what he remembered in the shop and from the work of those around him. Useful as this gift, or acquirement, may be, it is probable that there will still be more or less use for instruments of precision in machine shop designing rooms. But education of the eye, along the lines suggested, could not fail of being useful to both designers and makers of machinery, even when accuracy is determined in thousandths of an inch. —Hochester Democrat and Chronicle.

SOME INQUIRIES AS TO OFFICERS DOING DUTY HERE

The following questions, asked on Aug. 29, were to be answered yesterday in the senate:

1. Militia Act, page 677, section 48, says "Whenever the militia is called out on active service during an emergency the governor in council may appoint officers to a rank superior to that of colonel." When was the militia called out on active service? What was the emergency that is referred to by this section as stated by the Hon. Sir James Loughheed in Hansard—the Debates of the Senate No. 21 under heading Military Districts and Commanding Officers replying to inquiry of the Hon. Senator Cloran. Question No. 8. How did the rank of brigadier-general originate in Canada and for what service performed and on what authority?

2. The quarterly militia list corrected to April 1, 1917, page 26, Military District No. 6, makes no mention of any brigadier. New Brunswick as having any such rank on the staff or otherwise. What was the reason for the omission, or why or what brigadier-general is employed in New Brunswick and in what capacity? What was the emergency calling for the necessity of conferring such rank and on whom was it conferred and on what date? And for what service?

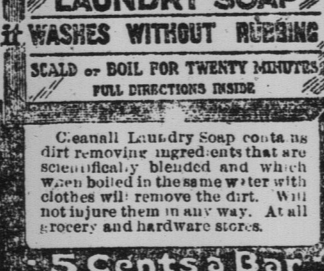
3. Who is the officer in New Brunswick who signs all official documents in the department as "Brigadier-General Commanding G.O.C., Canadian Expeditionary Forces?"

ST. MARTINS RAILWAY

The railway commission recently ordered extensive repairs and replacement on the Hampton and St. Martins Railway and gave the company until Sept. 1

TWENTY MILLION MEALS.

The military hospitals will serve twenty million meals a year. The penny pinching war time housewife staggers at the thought, but the figure measures only one phase of the vast problem before the Military Hospitals Commission in caring for convalescent soldiers.

S. A. Armstrong, director of the commission, quoted the figure in Halifax the other day and pointed out that with 15,000 patients, necessitating a staff of 8,000, this figure for a year was very modest.

The commissary department is in charge of a skilled dietitian in each hospital, who is responsible not only for variety and food value in rations, but for economy in service. If a saving of only one cent a meal could be effected it would net the government \$200,000 a year.

Canada Boasts Big Telescope

Has a Mirror 73 Inches in Diameter, and Weighing Two Tons

An Electric Control—Mounting is Done With Great Mathematical Skill and Precision

Few Canadians are probably aware that Canada possesses the largest telescope now in use. It will be surpassed soon by the new Mount Wilson 100-inch reflector now in course of construction.

This big glass is at the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory, Victoria, B. C., which is situated on the summit of Sarnich Hill, elevation 782 feet, about eight miles north of the city. It is easily accessible from there, either by automobile over a good road paved most of the way, or by electric car to a station at the foot of the hill, whence the summit can be reached on foot, a mile and a half by road or half a mile by shorter and steeper trail.

The telescope is of the reflecting type and differs from the more familiar refracting form in using a concave mirror for producing the images of the objects looked at, rather than a lens. The principal mirror of this telescope is 78 inches in diameter, 12 inches thick and weighs over two tons. It has a thin, bright coat of silver deposited on its front surface, which is concave in form, and ground and polished to an accuracy of the one two hundred thousandth part of an inch. By means of smaller auxiliary mirrors, observations can be made at either the upper or lower end of the tube, and magnifying powers from 100 to 5,000 times can be used. It must, however, not be forgotten that the higher powers can only be used very rarely and under exceptional atmospheric conditions.

Well Mounted.


The mechanical parts or "mounting" of this telescope are almost equally important with the optical parts. Their purpose is to hold the optical parts in their correct relative positions, and enable them to be exactly pointed to, and to accurately follow the motion of the stars. In order to carry the great weight of the mirror without excessive bedding, which would be very harmful to useful work, the parts must evidently be very massive, indeed the moving parts of this telescope weigh twenty-five tons. At the same time, they must be delicately balanced and work with great smoothness and accuracy. The engineering problems involved were very difficult ones, but so successfully have they been carried out, that a pressure of five pounds at the upper end of the tube will move the whole forty-five tons.

The telescope is pointed and exactly centred on any desired star by electric motors, there being seven motors and several magnetic clutches and solenoids for this purpose. After the telescope has been pointed, an exceedingly accurate governor mechanism, called the driving clock, moves the telescope at the exact rate to follow the star's motion across the sky. The whole mechanism has been so beautifully designed and executed that it can be handled with greater ease and convenience than many telescopes of only one-quarter the size.

Entirely of Steel.

For the proper use of this telescope, it is necessary to have a specially designed building with revolving dome, so that the opening in the latter, which is closed by a pair of shutters when not in use, can be directed to any part of the sky. In addition to the shutters, canvas curtains move up and down the shutter opening to prevent the tube being shaken if the wind is blowing, and an elevated platform, extending across the opening and moving up and down its whole extent, enables the observer to work with safety and convenience at the upper end of the tube in any position. All these movements are operated by electric motors by convenient controls, and the whole mechanism of telescope and dome, designed and constructed by one firm, the Warner and Swasey Co., of Cleveland, is devised to require the minimum of effort on the part of the observer.



Both building and dome are entirely of steel, with double covering arranged to allow a complete circulation of air, from openings at the bottom of the walls to louvers at the top of the dome. This prevents overheating in the day time, keeps the interior at the shade temperature while the metal construction allows the building to rapidly assume the temperature of the air when observing, both conditions being essential for the best work.

To Unravel Mysteries.

The work to be done with this unexcelled equipment will differ widely from the popular conception, which, in general, imagines the astronomer seated at the eye end of a great telescope and sweeping the heavens to discover new planets, comets, stars, etc. This is very far from the truth, and nothing of the kind will be attempted with this telescope, whose purpose it is to extend our knowledge of the constitution, motions, etc., of the heavenly bodies to the fainter stars, which cannot be reached by smaller telescopes. The ultimate aim of modern astronomical research is to unravel the mysteries of the universe, and it is hoped that this equipment will be able to make an important contribution to this end. Although marked progress has been made in recent years in this problem, it is only by co-operation among astronomers and by long-continued, systematic observations with the largest telescopes that advances can be obtained.

a successful conclusion. Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Balfour, Mr. Asquith, Lord Robert Cecil, or somebody else, restates the case anew nearly every week, and keeps before the public the solid facts of the case—the cause of the war, the gigantic aggressions of Germany against her neighbors, the lust for conquest and world-domination, the deliberate and scientific barbarism practised on Belgium and Northern France in the effort to terrorize Europe, and with the definite purpose of depopulating regions the invaders meant to retain. The causes of the war are re-stated, the long-laid plans are explained, and the nearness of the success of those plans at an early stage of the war is made known. As we have said, this educational work has been kept up in England all through the war, so that the public mind might not be allowed to interest itself in trivial things, and so that indifference, like a creeping paralysis, might not overcome the thought and will of the British public. There has been little or nothing of a similar kind done in Canada, and the consequences of this neglect are today seen in all parts of the country, the people everywhere proceeding about their business pretty much as if the war were being fought on the moon, and as if the result of it could not concern them. There has been a great let-down, a subsidence of public spirit, and a tendency to show impatience with those who undertake to disturb popular indifference. Among the masses of the people the families of men who have fallen, and of men who are now in the fight, go their way, saying little as yet, but thinking much. These people are weighing the country and finding it wanting. They are seeking each other, coming together in local organizations, beginning to be articulate. Then will come a time for plain speech and for the public exposure of those who made use of the world's disaster, and of the sorrow and sacrifices of their neighbors, as an opportunity for their own enrichment. The curious thing is that anybody could imagine that there would come no time of reckoning after an orgy of war prosperity when the soldiers return from their perils and labors—woefully thinned as to ranks—and they and their people, silent no longer, demand an accounting from the country they served.

How the Germans Keep Going.
The Germans, with whom we are fighting know something of popular psychology. They knew the importance of keeping every man, woman and child in the country interested, doing something for nothing as a patriotic service. From the first day of the war until now they have used this idea. Half the schemes

that are credited to their organized efficiency are not designed to produce material and practical results, but are for psychological effect upon the public. Even the "hate" meetings were meant to direct discontent away from home, to give anger plenty of vent and safe direction. Every child in every school spent a part of each day making bandages for soldiers, not so much in order to get the bandages made, but for the effect on the national mind. Every mother and wife was required to bring in her gold ring and get an iron one, not so much for the sake of the gold, but because the mother and wife of the soldier risked death in the war wanted to make some personal sacrifice, and would wear an iron ring on her finger as if it were a decoration, a sign of sacrifice and service. By all sorts of similar devices the German government has kept the people interested, doing something for the public good, safe from the paralysis of indifference.

There Has Been False Teaching
Here the idea has been that the war was being attended to over at the front. Those could go to the war who chose to enlist, but as for those who stayed at home they were not only to go in for "business as usual," but for more of it than usual. The false teaching has gone forth that men could do their part in the war by doing what they had always done at a greater profit than they had ever reaped. enlarged—his plant and his profits. The farmer has been ennobled as one deserving a decoration from the king because he has planted and grown more in increased prices. The worker has made munitions, at double his usual pay, and has glowed with pride as he felt he was "doing his bit," when, in fact, he was making his bit and spending it about as freely as a sailor on shore leave. There has been too much false teaching. People have not been serving the cause and the country—except in the sense that they have always been serving it—by "production." They have been serving themselves and it is time the hypocrisy were dropped. The soldiers are serving the country. They are giving real service by leaving their homes, the people they love, by enduring hardships, and by facing dangers and death.

BEEF STEW BARRED ON MEATLESS DAYS

Fine of \$100 for First Offence and \$500 or Three Months in Prison for Subsequent Times

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—The food controller's office issues the following: "The food controller has been informed that the managers of certain restaurants throughout the dominion declare that they have been given authority to serve beef in such dishes as beef stew on Tuesdays and Fridays. No such authority has been given. The regulations affecting public eating places have not been interpreted in any shape or form. Complaints have been received that the law is not being observed. While it was the intention of the food controller to allow managers, proprietors, etc., of public eating places sufficient time in which to adjust their establishments to the new regulations, continued infractions of the regulations will result in early prosecution and the act will be sharply enforced. First offences under the order are punishable by a fine of \$100 and subsequent offences by a fine of \$500 or imprisonment for three months or both."

Calling on one of them he would ask to see the vacant room, and on being ushered into the apartment would make sure that no one else was at home.

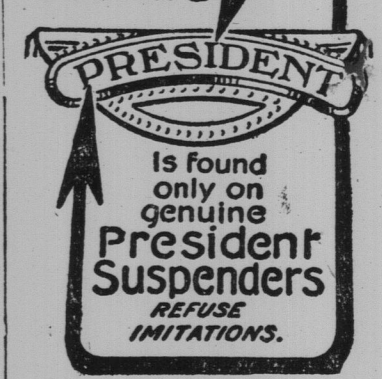

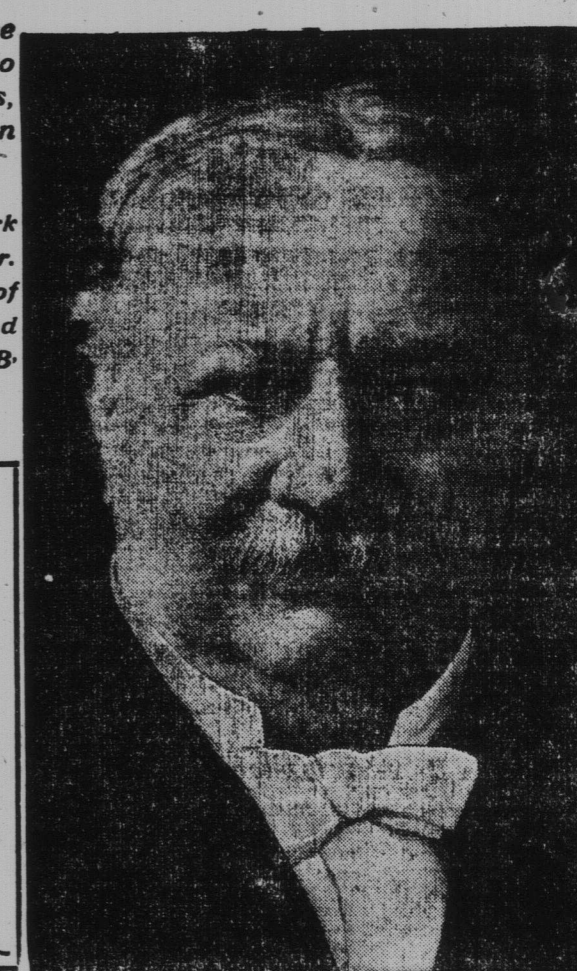

ALL HER SEVEN SONS SOLDIERS

Moreover, All Married And Each Has Family
DAUGHTERS SERVING, TOO

Fighters Were Born in Dublin of Scotch-Irish Stock—The Brave Mother Wishes She Could Do More Than Knit

New York, Sept. 1.—The seven sons of Mrs. W. J. Tisdall, of No. 1123 Garden street, Hoboken, were born in Scotland, of Scotch-Irish parents, which may or may not explain why they are such a family of fighters. At any rate, whatever the reason, the last man of them is lined up in the Allied cause.

But that's not the only remarkable fact about this unusual family. They are all married, and have families of from two to six children, but not one has claimed exemption. Every one of the seven was an electrical engineer, and followed that profession, until called to shoulder a musket.

Mrs. Tisdall also has six daughters, two of whom are doing hospital work, while their English husbands are at the front.

The eldest son, John, forty, and Edward, twenty-seven, having both lived some years in Canada, joined the Canadian forces and have come through many months of service in France unscathed.

Victor, twenty-six, left his home in Hoboken three months ago to join the gallant Canadian Scouts. His wife is studying nursing and hopes to be sent across with a Red Cross unit when her course is completed.

Henry Tisdall, thirty-eight, has been in the British army five years and holds the rank of colonel.

Trevors Hastings Tisdall, twenty-five, is about to be sent to the front with the Eleventh Regiment, New York, which has been in France two months.

Edward Gurney Tisdall, twenty-five years old, has recently joined a Canadian regiment.

William, thirty, and Mark, thirty-four, both residents of Connecticut, were taken in the recent selective draft and have passed physical examinations. Both have families, but will not claim exemption.

"It seems a pity I am too old to do anything for my country but knitted," said Mrs. Tisdall, meanwhile busily clicking needles over a heavy grey sweater. "If I were only a bit younger I'd be right over there doing my part. I haven't forgotten the training I had in nursing many years ago in England."

"There is nothing so remarkable about my family. We are all fighters and can't help it—it's in the blood. My father, Thos. McCurdy, fought in the English army with Wellington at Waterloo when Napoleon came to his ignominious end. My brother fell in the Battle of Aden in Egypt in 1857. My husband was an officer in the British army until his death sixteen years ago."

"While I am glad, of course, that my boys are following the precepts of their forefathers so faithfully, I am proud of them for having risen by their own efforts to such positions that they are now able to leave their families well provided for, which is after all, the greatest duty a man owes his country."

Of all the big family only a young daughter is left to give care and comfort to Mrs. Tisdall. Even a boarder at the Tisdall home, Samuel Tarento, has volunteered to serve in the American army. He is an alien and could claim exemption on that ground, but refused to do it. He said the heroic example set by Mrs. Tisdall had inspired him.
