## NEW DRIVE, AT PLACES, IS THREE

Yesterday's Attack Was By Anglo-Scottish Troops

GAIN ALL ALENG LINE

Important Villages Captured—Advance Over Difficult Country and in Spite of Obstinate Re-

London, Oct. 28-Over the entire

front held by the British further gains have been made by Field Marshal Haig's men from the region south of Lecateau to the Scheldt River, according to the British official communication issued to British official communication issued tonight. At some places enemy positions
to a depth of more than three miles
were penetrated, numerous villages were
taken, and several thousand prisoners
and many guns were captured.

The text of the British official statement tonight follows:

"The attack this morning was delivered by Anglo-Scottish troops of the third and fourth armies between the Sambre Canal and the River Scheldt, outh of Valenciennes.

can bre Canal and the River Scheldt, outh of Valenciennes.

"An advance was made over country that was difficult, over many streams and through villages and woods which were defended with much resolution.

"In the period of assembly and the early stages of the battle the hostile artillery displayed great activity with high explosives and gas shells.

"We have fought our way forward in spite of obstinate resistance, especially by the enemy's artillery and machine guns.

"Advancing with great steadiness some hours before dawn our infantry penetrated the enemy's defense along the whole of the front, and at an early hour had captured the important village of Pommereuil Forest and Romeries. On the extreme right there was strong resistance at the fortified farm of Gimbremont and the railway nearby, but at both places the enemy's defense was quickly overcome.

"Left of the centre the village of

outchy overcome.

"Left of the centre the village of Beaurain, which was held by the enemy with great tenacity, was stormed by the English with the assistance of tanks.

"On the left other English troops crossed the Harpines River at an early stage of the advance and captured Verticin

"During the morning we pressed on over the whole of the front, carrying the enemy's positions to a depth of more than three miles, driving him from many strongly defended villages, farms, woods and other localities organized for resistance.

"The English 25th division had hard fighting in the Bois Leveque, but progressed through the wood. East County troops, advancing to a depth of three and a half miles, captured Bouse

(Bousier?).

"The Anglo-Scottish troops secured crossings of the Harpines at the Vendagies Wood and captured Vendegies village. English and New Zealanders operating on their left reached the outskirts of Neuville and established themselves

on the high ground northwest of the village. Farther north the village of Escarmain was captured.

"In these highly successful operations several thousand prisoners and many guns were captured by our troops, whose

French Report.
Paris, Oct. 23—The war office statement of the operations on the western front today reads:

"There was great artillery activity on the Oise front. Between the Oise and the Serre we gained ground north of Catillon du Temple, and carried our lines as far as the outskirts of Chevre-

"Farther east we captured a wood, which was energetically defended, to the north of Mesbrecourt-Richecourt. One hundred and fifty prisoners remained in

our hands.

"There was stubborn fighting during the day on the Serre-Souche front. Our units succeeded in debouching between Froidmont-Ochartille and Pierrepont and in maintaining themselves on the east bank opposite Brazicourt, despite strong German counter-attacks.

SINCE AUGUST, 1916 OTTAWA PAPER SPEAKS

London, Oct. 28—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuter's Limited)—The British admiralty announces that British merchant tonnage losses during September totalled 152,000; allied and neutral combined, 88,000. The aggregate constitutes the lowest monthly sinkings since August, 1916, and is below that year's monthly average. The total losses for the three months ended September 30, were 898,000 tons compared with 964,000 in the previous quarter, and a million and a half tons in the corresponding quarter of last year. The sailings of steamships exceeded 500 tons gross between the United Kingdom and overseas ports excluding cross-channel traffic was seven and a half million tons in September.




