The grinning skull of the oldest woman in the world is now beneath a glass case in the large central hall of the Natural History Museum at South Kensington for all the world to see.

It was the discovery of the fragmentary remains of this skull that sent such a thrill of excitement throughout the scientific world in the late autumn of last year. Charles Dawson, F.S.A., unearthed it from a pit at Plitdown Common, Sussex, in which he had been engaged in geological excavation for several years, and a great company of distinguished professors gathered at the meeting of the Geological Society at which the discoverey was first made public.





FOREIGN STUDENT

Great Number of Them in French Capital

Members of Chamber of Deputies
Must Not Drink any More on
the Nation—French Professor's
Work in White Plague Fight

(Times' Special Correspondence) Paris, June 18-It will not be surprisng if foreign residents in Paris, and re particularly young men and woselves called upon to pay a tax in the near future. The minister of finance is studying several new methods—in adaising money, and a more or less direct raising money, and a more or less direct tax on foreign students would bring in a considerable sum, and would be popular. One hundred and sixty million dollars, at least is needed for the increase of armaments, so new forms of taxation are becoming necessary. Besides, this year's army bill, when passed, will put the young Frenchman who is studying for one of the liberal professions at a disadvantage when compared with foreign students who intend to remain here, for they will have no military service, while the young Frenchman will lose three years at a critical moment.

One idea is to tax very heavily all foreign doctors who have not been naturalized before the age of twentyfive, and therefore served in the French army. The number of foreign students here in France is enormous. There are

Prison Fare

It is a popular fallacy that the model prison at Fresnes, which is certainly a very comfortable prison, provides for its inmates a daily bill of fare which is far too luxurious for men who are living at the taxpayers' expense for crimes which they have committed. The inmates of Fresnes are sufficiently fed, but by no means luxuriously. Each prisoner, at six o'clock every morning, gets a roll of brown bread, and at nine o'clock a bowl of soup—vegetable soup for the most part. In addition to this, each prisoner gets only one meal a day, and the meals never vary. The meal is served at four o'clock.

On Mondays he gets lentils, on Tuesday white beans, on Wednesday pea porridge, on Thursdays Irlsh stew with more potatoes than meat in it; on Fridays boiled rice or macaroni with gravy sauce, on Saturdays red beans, and on Sundays thick soup with a piece of mean and a few vegetables. From this list, which is repeated from one year's end to another, it will be seen that the prisoners of Fresnes are not better treated in retirement than is the French soldier during his military service. The criminal's bill of fare, though, is more varied than that of the soldier, who gets beef or mutton every day throughout the year, or rather a small piece of beef or mutton in a bath of soup, with some potatoes.

The methods of the bureaucracy are always amusing or grevious, according to the frame of mind in which they are considered. Here is a little story of two knives. Two knives were needed in the arsenal at Toulon. They would have cost an individual about eight cents each, and could have been bought in five minutes. The Toulon arsenal, in accordance with the law, published a notice in the official papers stating, with much detail, that the acquisition of two knives was necessary, and asking for tenders. The drawing up of these notices required the signature of the chie engineer and those of the director of naval construction, a navy engineer, are auditor, and another official. 

SHERLOCK HOLMES DISPLEASED BELL

Original of Famous Character Not Flattered

REMARKABLE PERSONALITY

A Story of the Edinburgh Prolessor That Shows How True Sir Conan Doyle Has Hewn to the Line

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, June 11—To most folk who have read the "Sherlock Holmes" stories one of the most interesting men of recent years is the late Dr. Joseph Bell, under whom Sir Arthur Conan Doyle studied medicine at Edinburgh and whom the creator of Holmes always has acknowledged as the original of his famous detective. Of Doctor Bell, we have known comparatively little heretofore, except that, besides being a brilliant physician, he possessed the faculties of observation and deduction, which Doyle made the most striking characteristics of his great sleuth, but now one of Doctor Bell's closest friends, Mrs. Jessie E. Saxby, has published a book about him which describes all sides of a remarkable personality, not forgetting the one which appealed so strongly to at least one of the men who studied under him. Doctor Bell did not feel flattered, it seems, by his "nick-name," as he called "Sherlock Holmes." Essentially kindhearted and merciful, he did not relish being world-famed as a sleuth. He spoke once of "the cataract of drivel for which Conan Doyle is responsible," and at another time was provoked into exclaiming, "I hope folk that know me see another and better side to me than Doyle saw."

For the sake of its vanity, it is to be hoped that the shade of the late Alfred Austin did not visit the Chapel Royal at St. James' Palace on last Friday. It had been announced that a memorial service for the late poet laureate would be held there, and partly with the object of noting how many of the author's admirers paid tribute to his memory, the writer attended it.
