Enthusiastic Reception Is Given Their Majesties INDIA'S PREMIER CITY Voyage Home to Be Begun on January 10—Relief When Calcutta Visit Ends as That City is Centre of Bengali Agitation

(Canadian Press) Calcutta, Ind., Dec. 29.—King-Emperor George and Queen-Empress Mary returned here this morning, the former after a game shooting expedition in the northern dependency of Nepal, during which he bagged no fewer than thirty tigers and thirteen rhinoceros. The Queen-Empress, in the meantime, made a long tour in the various provinces of India during which she visited many of the historical spots. The royal couple received an enthusiastic welcome from the people of Calcutta, who thronged the gaily decorated streets and cheered heartily as the royal procession passed.

A WONDERFUL ESCAPE Montreal Man's Shanty Blown to Splinters by Dynamite; He is Practically Unhurt Montreal, Dec. 30.—While the flimsy shanty which he occupied was blown to atoms, leaving not a single splinter for nearly 200 yards around, Albert Michaud escaped with a few bruises and a little consequence. The crashing explosion of several pounds of dynamite stuffed away to blast a sewer in the north end of the city threw residents out of their beds, shattered scores of windows, and wrought havoc among chinaware in many houses. Michaud however arose and slightly dazed, went for the hospital ambulance. When it arrived, he clambered in and was taken to the institution, where his injuries were found to be only superficial.

FOURTH OF THE BRIDESMAIDS TO BE MARRIED Recently the Boston Globe printed an editorial dealing with Canadian transportation, ignoring St. John and suggesting that Boston is the natural winter port of Canada. W. E. Anderson, secretary of the Board of Trade, wrote to the Globe and his letter and some editorial comment upon it by the Globe of Dec. 29 are given here.

(Mr. Anderson's Letter) Editor People's Column—Your editorial regarding Canadian trade outlets in Winter practically ignores the existence of one of the most commodious and absolutely the finest all-the-year-round ports on the Atlantic seaboard, viz: the port of St. John, N. B. Under the circumstances we may be permitted to give you some idea of the importance of this port to the trade of North America. St. John is the Atlantic terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway stretching from the Pacific right across the continent to the port of St. John on the Atlantic and which is recognized as the greatest railway system in the world. St. John is also one of the termini of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, running from St. John to Montreal, where it connects with the Grand Trunk system, and upon completion of the Valley Railway running through the Province of New Brunswick and terminating at the port of St. John, this city will also be the terminus of the Canadian Northern Railway—another transcontinental railway—and also a Canadian terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which railway has already purchased 70 acres of land at the head of the eastern harbor upon which to construct its terminal facilities.

As a shipping port, St. John has the advantage of being the Atlantic port of the Atlantic Line, the Furus-Wilky Line, the Montreal Line, the Gulf-Donner Line, Manchester Line, Head Line and the Canada-Australia Line. In addition to these lines which make this their winter port, the Donaldson and Furus-Wilky Lines make St. John one of their Atlantic ports. To give you an idea of the importance of St. John as a shipping port we would draw your attention to the following statement of exports out of the port during the winter season alone for the last 10 years:

ANOTHER MARRIAGE CASE BEFORE THE MONTREAL COURT Montreal, Dec. 30.—Preliminary proceedings in another marriage annulment case were opened yesterday when a petition was presented on behalf of Dame Marie Anne Menie, who seeks annulment of her marriage, contracted in 1903, to have her marriage, contracted in 1903, annulled by the civil tribunals on the grounds of consanguinity. The petitioner also alleges other grave reasons. This differs from the Hebert, ne femere case, in that the main point of contention is not the competency or incompetency of the minister who officiated at the marriage, but simply of the effect of an impediment which is recognized in canon law and which is contended is held to have the same effect in civil law. It is petitioned that no dispensation was secured and that the marriage was thus null from the beginning in ecclesiastical law.

Secretary Anderson Proves to Boston Paper St. John's Position as Canadian Port and Shows Increasing Volume of American Traffic Through Here

(Globe Editorial) The Globe lately observed regarding the small closing of navigation on the St. Lawrence that "the commercial importance of Canada is a demonstrable fact in the summer and fall, but passes into an annual season of comparative inactivity through the port of St. John for the winter months." We added, "fortunately Canada has freedom to cross our border with her products and thus escapes a port of trade stagnation."

It is plain, therefore, that we did not ignore St. John. By the term, "American railway," we obviously meant a railway reaching St. John by crossing American soil—namely the Canadian Pacific. We are under the impression that the larger part of St. John's winter commerce this season over our border.

SECRET CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN ENGLAND AND TURKEY DISAPPEARS IN CONSTANTINOPLE London, Dec. 30.—The Evening Standard prints a story to the effect that secret correspondence between Turkey and England in regard to the Sullim district of Tripoli has disappeared from the foreign office in Constantinople.

ENGINEER SCALDED; DEATH IS EXPECTED Toronto, Dec. 30.—(Special.)—Just after midnight the boiler of a G. T. R. engine at Thamesford exploded, fatally scalding the engineer, Thomas Cade of Windsor. His fireman, George Cook, was thrown 100 feet and had a miraculous escape.

MORGAN AWAY TO THE LAND OF PYRAMIDS New York, Dec. 30.—J. Pierpont Morgan sailed on the S. S. Olympic today for his annual vacation abroad, and this time the banker purposes to visit Egypt. Mr. Morgan's departure came as a surprise to Wall Street, as he usually does not leave on his vacation until later in the season.

NEW FIND BY MARCONI IS ANNOUNCED Wireless Messages Across Desert Without Use Of Masts POINT IT AND THAT'S ALL

(Canadian Press) Rome, Dec. 30.—Wm. Marconi, who has just returned from Tripoli, said that while there he accidentally made a discovery of the greatest importance. "During some experiments in the desert which he took the opportunity to make," he said, "we were surprised and gratified to find that wireless messages could be sent with absolute security over the desert without the usual masts. Instead of poles, wires are laid on the sand in the direction in which the message is to be sent. The wires are not disturbed in any way. Every one knows the difficulties of setting up, especially in time of war, a wireless station, with masts, while in Africa a simple and small case is sufficient. Masts in time of war constitute a grave danger because they can be seen by an enemy from a great distance. Another feature of great importance in the new modifications is that the enemy cannot interrupt or intercept messages, when we have changed the register of our air waves. It is a step in the direction of a wireless telegraph, and a long one. Marconi has gone to North Italy."

GOVERNMENTS TO USE PRESENT POST OFFICE BUILDING Home for Federal Public Works and Also Provincial Quarters is Report Rumors regarding the possible uses to which the present post office building would be put on the completion of the new government building, which is now being erected here, have been current ever since the announcement was made that the new federal government would proceed with the project. It is now said that the government will not dispose of the building but will have it remodelled for the purpose of using it as an office building to accommodate the public departments, which now have offices in different parts of the city.

HIS FOUR CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 30.—Four children of August Mazza, were burned to death last night in a fire which destroyed Mazza's home here. The mother and one son were seriously burned, but it is feared they will die. The fire started in Mazza's bakery, in the rear of his home.

A BIG YEAR ON THE WELLAND CANAL Port Colborne, Ont., Dec. 20.—Twenty-five hundred and seventy-four vessels of all kinds this year passed through the Welland canal, breaking the record. The lockages total nearly 400 more than last season. Perhaps fifty million bushels of wheat were brought down through the canal during the season. The fastest trip from one end to the other was made by the steamer City of Montreal, nine hours and twenty minutes.

THE PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 30.—Theodore Roosevelt cannot escape being a candidate for the nomination for president, according to a ruling made yesterday by secretary of state Vaile, who said Mr. Roosevelt's name made the primary election. The primary election ballots unless John O. Veiser of Omaha, who filed the petition, withdraws it. Mr. Roosevelt is the secretary and cannot cancel the petition. JOHNSON AND McVEY TO BATTLE Champion Agrees on Terms For Fight in Australia—A Match For Noted Canadian Walker

(Canadian Press) Chicago, Ill., Dec. 30.—Jack Johnson, world's champion, and Sam McVey will fight for the heavyweight championship of the world at Sydney, Australia, on Easter Monday, if Hugh McIntosh, the Sydney promoter, approves of an agreement made here last night by Tom Andrews of Milwaukee, McIntosh's American representative, who agreed to give Johnson \$20,000 to lose, or draw, \$50,000 training expenses, and four round trip tickets to Australia. Johnson agreed to fight with these provisions. "McVey is the logical candidate," said Johnson. "He got his place by beating Sam Langford. I stopped him in six rounds, however, and another time cleaned him at the end of twenty rounds. He will be soft for me now. It won't take much training, but I am going in fit, so as not to be surprised. I'll begin work at once." Andrews said he expected the approval of the terms from McIntosh immediately.

CHINESE EGGS MUST BE SENT AWAY OR DESTROYED Montreal, Dec. 30.—The famous Chinese eggs, owned by John Layton & Co., the seizure of which was declared illegal, were sent to the city for disposal by the five justices of the court of Kings Bench, the highest judicial authority of the province, this morning and the city and provincial health authorities were declared to have acted in the interests of the public.

MARQUIS SAYS HE WILL BE AN AMERICAN CITIZEN Liverpool, Dec. 30.—"I am leaving England forever, to become an American citizen," remarked the Marquis of Queensbury as he stepped on board the Cunard liner Lusitania, which sailed for New York today.

England Likely to Send One Out GUARD TRADE POSITION Action in View of Opening of Panama Canal—Part of Lloyd George's Speech in Welsh Church Meeting Criticized as Blasphemous

(Canadian Press) London, Dec. 30.—As a consequence of the representations made by various marine and mercantile corporations possessing interests in the West Indies, it is probable that the colonial office may consent to dispatch a special commission to these islands to investigate and report on their condition, in view of the completion of the Panama Canal. It is generally agreed that the opening of the canal ought to prove of appreciable benefit to Britain's West Indian possessions, and as this event is now comparatively near, it is contended that the imperial government should at once, arrange to assist the administration in the islands in any needful steps for their advancement.

Criticize Lloyd George Lloyd-George, yesterday spoke with the faith that is in him and in impetuous accents; incidentally he furnished adversaries with a new weapon of attack. The chancellor was addressing a church meeting in Wales. "Poverty," he said, "is not the fault of Providence, which provides in abundance. There are millions of men, women and children in this country, the richest in the world, through no fault of their own, sicken in poverty, wretchedness and despair. You cannot deal with a problem of this magnitude by mere spasmodic appeals to charity, or by the benevolence. That is hopelessly inadequate. You must try to turn the army and navy by voluntary subscription. It is the community alone that can command the resources to drain this morass of wretchedness so as to convert it into a verdant and fertile plain."

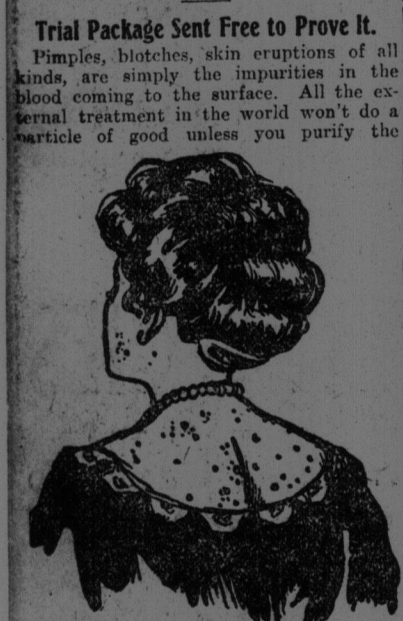

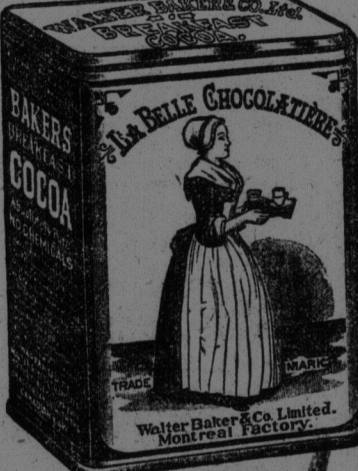

MARINE NEWS. The three masted schooner Moama, Captain Gayton, from Philadelphia to St. John, which was towed into port yesterday afternoon as reported in the Times, was completely covered with ice. Soon after leaving Philadelphia rough weather was encountered and it continued all the way to this port. When off Leagues yesterday morning the schooner became unmanageable and the assistance of three tugs was requisitioned. The Moama had on board 665 tons of coal for R. P. & W. Starr.

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain, Captain Murray, sailed yesterday afternoon at ten minutes past five for Liverpool via Halifax. Among the passengers were O. G. Branscombe, A. J. Clarke, W. T. Robson, Captain A. Simonds and Mrs. Simonds of this city. The total value of cargoes taken from St. John by the first fourteen steamers this season amounts to \$3,442,131. This is a gain of \$1,083,723 over last year.

New York, Dec. 29.—The census report published last Wednesday fully met bearish expectations as to its probable showing, as it indicated an average daily spinning of about 94,500 bales, with a total ginned to December 12—that is the close of business December 12—of 13,792,000 bales.

We still believe that the size of the crop is such as to prove an overwhelming burden on any bull movement, until, at least, the trade has more unmistakable assurances of a short supply than can exist for some time to come.

Glasgow, in point of fact, is a notoriously noisy city. Nothing, indeed, so much strikes the visitor from the metropolis as the harsh and strident sounds made by wheeled vehicles, and to this has been added the incessant hum and hiss of the trams, and the thud which takes place as they pass over points and crossings.

Asphalt was experimented with many days ago in Gordon street, but abandoned of wood. Then more recently tar macadam was tried in George's Place, but it did not stand the traffic without continual stitching and relaying.

Wood has been tried again and again in Buchanan street and elsewhere, and the damp climate and the heavy loading of the street have combined to impair it very quickly, and it has finally been thrown overboard as a final solution.

Specialization on the part of the various companies has now minimized somewhat the requirements for a successful actor of moving pictures. One company, in Glasgow particularly invites aspirant artists to send in western stories which deal exclusively with the American cowboy. This firm will employ no actor who is not an expert rider. Another company has to do almost exclusively with stories in which Indians figure and to supply the demand—particularly keen in Europe—for pictures of their kind, the Indian families of Indians are employed in the western studio of this particular film-maker. 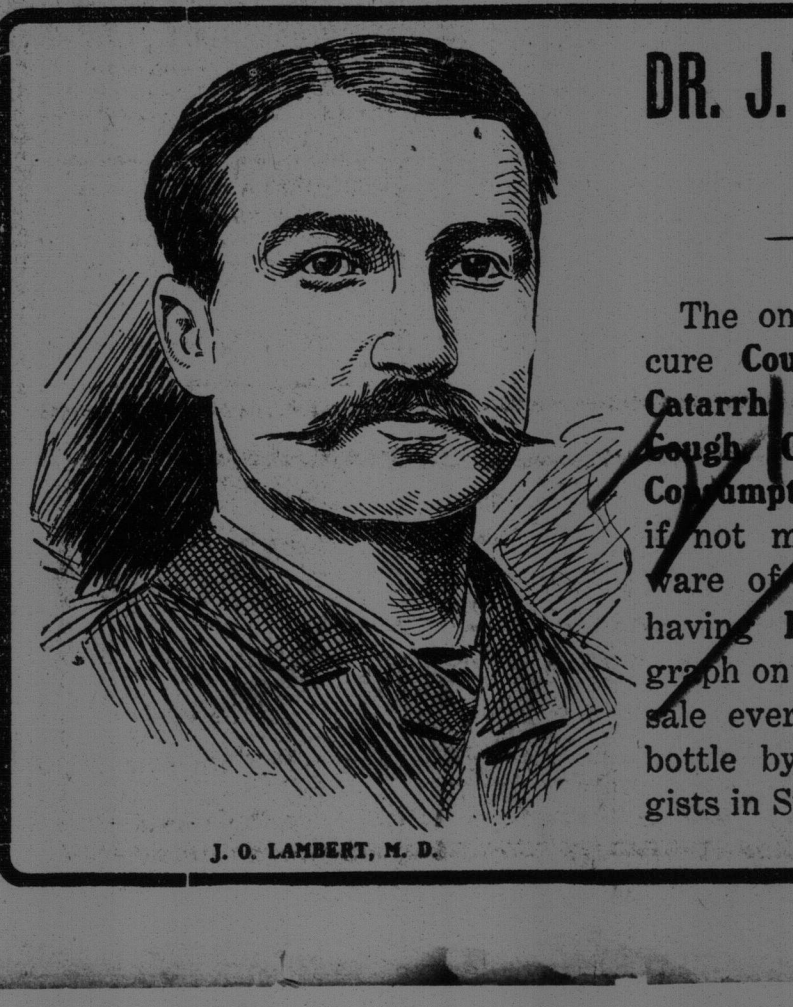
