PLOT TO DEFEAT RECIPROcity

Annexation Bogey Being Worked by Its Opponents

SOME STRAIGHT TALK

Open Charge is Made in Washington—Bennet's Fool Speech First Move in Campaign—Tory Toronto Stands by its Traditions

(Canadian Press) Washington, Feb. 17.—That the opponents of the reciprocity agreement between the U. S. and Canada are plotting to defeat the measure by stirring up bitter opposition to the measure in Canada and Great Britain, based upon fears of annexation, was openly charged today by friends of the administration.

They declared that the resolution presented yesterday by representative Bennett of New York, calling upon the president to take steps relative to annexation, was the first move in the campaign to have the reciprocity agreement null and void.

Representative Bennett is one of the chief anti-reciprocity leaders in the house and students of politics claim to see in his tactics the full scope of his campaign against the agreement. The agreement's chief opponents evidently concluding that the agreement will pass the senate, are determined to use every means to prevent its passage in Canada.

Mr. Bennett is trying to defeat this bill by indirect methods, he declared. "The Canadian negotiators of the reciprocity agreement will naturally be handicapped in their efforts to have the measure enacted at Ottawa as a result of this absurd talk of annexation."

C. P. R. Sued By Owner of Kronprinz Olaf and in Turn Sued—Likely to Privy Council

MEN FOUND GUILTY; THE WOMAN FREE

Sensational Russian Murder Case Ends; Two Are Sentenced

LIFE FOR DELASSY

Pantchenko Given Fifteen Years in Prison—Count Breaks Down as He Hears Doom Pronounced—Trial Had Aroused Tremendous Interest

(Canadian Press) St. Petersburg, Feb. 17.—The sensational trial of Count Patrick De Lassy, Dr. Pantchenko and Mme. Muraviev, charged with the murder of Count Vassili Boutourlin, came to an end last night when a verdict of guilty was returned by the jury in the case of De Lassy and Pantchenko and not guilty in the case of the woman.

De Lassy was sentenced to penal servitude for life and Pantchenko to fifteen years' imprisonment. The jury noted extenuating circumstances in the case of the woman.

The trial aroused enormous interest and developed some startling testimony. Prior to the beginning of the proceedings Pantchenko made a confession to which he accused De Lassy of luring him to poison Count Vassili who was heir to General Boutourlin's millions.

On the witness stand Pantchenko denied the confession and made no further statements that he came to be thought of as a man of nerve.

Count Overcome At the end of the trial De Lassy was quite overcome. He spoke in a few words to the jury but ended abruptly by saying, "I cannot talk. I leave the fate of myself and relatives to your minds and your hearts."

Pantchenko, in an incoherent speech, said that he did not repudiate his confession but wished to specify the degree of his guilt.

Mme. Muraviev refused to say anything. The jury were out for three hours.

DECIDE AGAINST CLOSE SEASON FOR MOOSE

Committee of Maine Legislature Recommends Against Proposal But Favors Extension of Caribou Close Season

Augusta, Me., Feb. 17.—The proposition to put a four year close time on bull moose—it is already illegal to kill cow moose—in Maine—came up before the fish and game committee of the Maine legislature and the advisability of enacting such a law was heatedly argued by hunters, fishermen, guides, hotel men, sporting camp proprietors and sportsmen from all over the state.

The bill had its chief support from the Maine Sportsmen's Club and Game association and from the William Tell club. At the close of the hearing, the committee voted to report "ought to pass" on the bill extending the close time on caribou six years.

HIGHER SALARIES FOR JUDGES IN THE STATES

KILLS WIFE TO MARRY ANOTHER

M. E. Vanaman, Youthful Reading Murderer, Confesses His Crime

SLAIN BY SIDE OF HER BABY BOY

Drastic Scene as Girl he Wood is Brought Face to Face With Him—Confession of His Guilt Quickly Follows

(Special to Times) Montreal, Feb. 16.—Hearing in the admiralty court in the legal disputes between the C. P. R. and Johann Bryde, over the collision between the Kronprinz Olaf and the Montcalm in the St. Lawrence last season, were started here yesterday.

This is the beginning of a series of actions which is expected to end only when the jury in the case of De Lassy and Pantchenko is satisfied with its verdict.

The collision occurred last September, some sixty miles below Quebec. The officers of each declared those of the other responsible. The Kronprinz Olaf was not very seriously damaged, and as a result its owner, Johann Bryde, is taking action against the C. P. R. for \$250,000.

The Montcalm suffered more severe injuries, and the C. P. R. is suing Bryde and the underwriters for \$25,000.

In the wreck commissioners' court the Kronprinz Olaf was held responsible for the collision, but this proceeding was simply a government investigation, and quite separate from the present actions.

Owing to the difficulty of getting the witnesses who are employed on the two vessels, and therefore liable to be in any part of the world, it will be arranged between the parties that the action be argued on the evidence produced before the wreck commissioners' court.

Story of Fatal Carelessness by Parent is Again Repeated

THROWN SEVENTY FEET

Three Hundred Pounds of Dynamite Explode at Cobalt and Kill Austrian—Hearse Falls Over on Undertaker at an Ontario Funeral

(Canadian Press) St. Petersburg, Feb. 17.—Without waiting for China's reply to its ultimatum, Russia began preparations for actual warfare today by transporting soldiers to the ill district of Northern China for a military demonstration. Among the soldiers sent are several regiments of Cossack from Southern Russia.

According to instructions Mr. Korotkov, Russian minister to China, has presented to that government a note bearing the date of 1881, which China has seemingly disposed of as a forgery. The note sets forth six points and Russia insists upon compliance on pain of complete cessation of friendly relations. These are as follows:

First—Russia's right to impose import and export duties unlimited except in the fifty years, which is due free.

Second—That the extra-territorial rights of Russia in China shall not be infringed; that legal suits involving Russians and Chinese shall be considered by a mixed jurisdiction.

Third—That Russians shall enjoy special privileges of trade and duty free commerce in Mongolia and the extra-territorial provinces.

Fourth—That Russia consulates can be immediately opened at Kobe, Khami and Gaden.

Fifth—Due respect of the local authorities for Russian consuls.

Sixth—Russians to enjoy the right to acquire real estate and erect structures in Mongolia and the extra-territorial provinces.

A CURE FOR DISEASE OF MIND CLAIMED

Blessing Indeed, if Discovery Made by Member of Glasgow Asylum Staff Proves Effective

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 17.—That an attempt will be made to force Russia and China to alter their treaty differences to the Hague Tribunal for arbitration is the belief in official circles here. One arbitral plan already discussed is the appointment of an international commission which shall study the Russo-Chinese situation, evolving a plan of settlement satisfactory to both nations. This agreement shall be submitted to the international arbitration tribunal at the Hague for official ratification after which it will be officially accepted by both China and Russia.

OFFER FOR BIG BLOCK OF STEEL STOCK; BUT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED

(Canadian Press) Montreal, Feb. 17.—An important statement was submitted today by Frederick Harris at a recent meeting of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company. He said that General Manager Casley on his recent return from abroad submitted a very flattering proposition, made relative to the purchase of a large block of common stock at a price considerably above par, but that he did not recommend its acceptance. The executive of the board unanimously decided that no offer for such a block of stock, even though it might not involve the liquidation of the company would in any case be entertained unless it carried with it an obligation to take over at the same price all of the balance of the shares, the holders of which might desire to sell at that figure.

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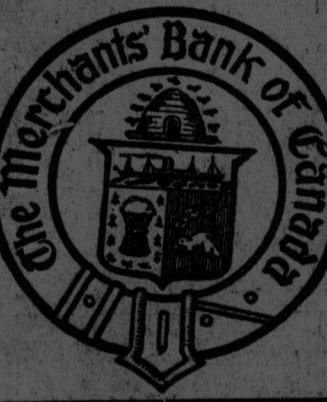

FISHERIES BILL IS REPORTED TO SENATE

(Canadian Press) Washington, Feb. 17.—An unannounced bill embodying the results of the fisheries agreement between Canada and the United States affecting the treaty waters from Passamaquoddy Bay in New Brunswick to British Columbia, has been reported by the foreign relations committee of the senate as a result of the recommendations of David Starr Jordan for the United States and Prof. E. E. Prince for Canada.

Senator Wm. Alden Smith, of Michigan, has succeeded in having the proposed regulations affecting Lake Huron struck out, and he expects that the negotiations will meet again and try to agree on a new draft that will be satisfactory to the Michigan fishermen, who are the real objectors in the case.

Meantime, the Lake Huron commercial fishing will be practically eliminated from the international regulations, and will remain under Michigan control.

Otherwise, the bill embodies a number of important provisions which can be regarded with satisfaction by Canada. Under the terms of the classes approved by the senate, foreign regulations committee, methods of fishing and style of the nets and appliances to be used are described and important plans for the preservation of food-fishes are laid down.

### POLICE AND COURTS

It is fair to ask what the effect is likely to be if the majority of persons proved guilty of criminal offences are let go on suspended sentence. The effect is likely to be active in two directions, and first upon the police force. Of what use is it to have police and to arrest criminals if after a few days in jail the latter are able to go out again, and laugh in the face of the officers? Why should an officer run the risk of having his head broken in an attempt to catch a group of thieves or a criminal of another sort, if the offenders are not to be made to realize the nature of the crime and the certainty of punishment? There can be no surer method of demoralizing a police force than by turning criminals loose without adequate punishment.

### BOARD OF CONTROL

In Montreal the citizens have sought to solve the problem of civic government by adopting the city council and board of control system. But the city council is always unduly the work of the board of control. The Herald gives the following instance and comment thereon: "The city council, if it would preserve the respect of the people who elected it as a reforming body, will not devote its time to overturning reports of the board of control in order to give contracts to the highest tenderer. The spectacle presented on Monday was neither edifying nor encouraging. The controllers had awarded a contract for boots to one man, who was the lowest tenderer by three cents a pair. Twenty-one of the aldermen voted to give the contract to the higher tenderer if he would reduce his price by three cents. This was trivial work for a body that had so much important civic business on hand, and it was, apparently, illegal, for why should a tenderer be allowed to alter his bid after the administration of the city is in the hands of the controller, and the council will be observing the will of its constituents if it leaves these matters of detail to the controllers. The object of the reform movement of last year was to shift responsibility to a small body. This three-cent legislation by the council is calculated to remove this responsibility, and thus restore the old and discredited order."

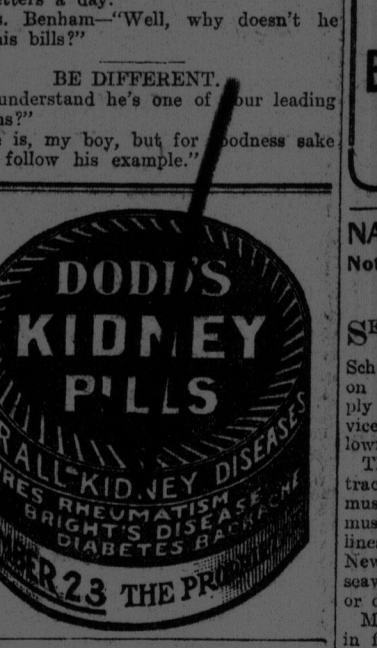

## BOYS' N OLD SHED AFTER MIDNIGHT

**Police Arrest Three in Paradise Row, Each With Smoking Outfit—Two Others Taken Later on Suspicion of Theft**

In addition to three youths who were arrested early this morning, charged with lying and loitering in a shed off Paradise Row, namely Otty Northrup, aged 11; Fred Duncan, aged 10; and Leonard Andrews, aged 10; Detective Killen this morning placed in custody two more, Otty Northrup, aged 11, and Claud Phinney, aged 12, while additional charges were made as well.

When arrested this morning between 12 and 1 o'clock the first three named were found in the old shed. There were found on each a package of "Cobbs cigarettes," on Northrup, \$1.32; on Duncan, thirty-five cents; and on Andrews \$1.00, which they said they had either earned or been given. Young Duncan said the change he had was given him by his brother as a Christmas present. On Phinney \$4 in silver was found.

Judge Ritchie gave some wholesome advice to the parents of the boys, who were in court, about allowing their children to be in the streets after dark. He said there was great need of a juvenile court. "I say have no right to even ask to go out after supper," he said. "The father should get a leather strap, good and long, and if there is need to use it so by all means." Instead of the mother controlling the little ones, it is now a case of the children controlling the mother.

"And many of them make their start in smoking cigarettes. Let it be understood that druggists or no one else are allowed to sell cigarettes to young fellows, and unless should be included as well, for they are but a starter for the tobacco filled cigarettes."

M. V. Paddock had been reported by Sgt. Scott, who arrested the young fellows, for supplying cigarettes to minors. It was said in court that his clerk had sold cubba and not cigarettes, so the matter was dropped.

To learn where the lads had secured the money which they had on their person, they were remanded until 1:30 p. m. The remaining Northrup and Phinney were locked up, and charged with breaking and entering the store of G. S. Coombs, 28 Paradise Row, and stealing \$15 from the safe. This charge has been made against young Andrews as well. The whole five were placed in cells until the matter came up this afternoon.

## STARTED WITH HOLD UP FOR PRICE OF DRINK

**That's What Leo Walsh Told Court Today in Hearing of Mill Street Knife Case**

The case against Thomas Davis, charged with "cutting and stabbing" Leo Walsh was dealt with this morning in the police court, and after the evidence of several witnesses had been taken, the defendant was remanded until Judge Ritchie examines into Davis' record to learn whether or not of late he has been trying to do well. John H. George and Lloyd Moss said that they had been in Mill street and had seen Davis run after Walsh with a knife. Some young fellows were greatly frightened, and one of them cried "murder, murder." George said he had seen blood streaming down Walsh's face.

He said he was for the purpose of meeting Mr. Pennington, who has been on a pleasure trip to Great Britain and the continent and who will arrive here on the C. P. R. steamer Empress of Ireland early tomorrow morning.

Mr. MacPherson in talking to a Times man said the reciprocity agreement between the United States and Canada appears to be the principal topic of discussion wherever he has been. In Montreal yesterday, he said there was considerable comment regarding the motion introduced in the U. S. congress yesterday looking toward annexation. From his own observation he did not think Canadians were at all favorable to annexation and he thought Representative Bennett of New York, who introduced the motion was foolish.

Mr. MacPherson expressed surprise at finding St. John such a large city as he had never been this way before. Mr. Pennington and Mr. MacPherson will go from here direct to Minneapolis.
