PEAT INTO COAL

Chicagoan's Process Makes Fuel from the Bog Earth in Twenty-

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 27. - A Chicago engineer has solved the problem of changing marsh mud into coal and making it a marketable product all within twenty-eight minutes after it is taken from the bog.




