

Camps.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The American has the following today: — The greatest financial war, according to Wall Street, that ever has been waged on that multi-millionaires' battle-

trade.

In this war are involved twice as many millions of dollars and three times as many thousands of miles of railroad as were represented in the famous fight for possession of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, which resulted in the memorable Northern Pacific corner, when the price of that stock was rushed up to \$1,000 a share and a panic in Wall Street followed.





are casting wistful eyes toward the Canadian West. The crop estimates used were those compiled by John Aird, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. He says the great scarcity of hides is due in some measure to the Chicago meat scandals, the export of canned beef has fallen off so much that not nearly so many cattle are killed as formerly.

Mr. King says shoes are about thirty cents to forty cents per pair higher than they were a short time ago. 
