## NOTES AND NEWS.

### LITERARY.

J. R. Osgood & Co., Boston, are about

### UNITED STATES.

In the Chicago Police Court last Friday  
two drunken bunnies gave their names

### GENERAL.

The Canadian Government proposes

katchewan, with a view to inducing the  
Indians to go to a distant reservation.  
This will open for settlement a tract five  
times as large as Manitoba, and equally  
fertile and richer in other resources.

Information has been received at the  
Treasury Department at Washington,  
that a quarantine of 15 full days has  
been ordered at Malta upon all vessels  
arriving there from the Provinces of Tri-  
poli, Barbary, owing to the appearance  
of a malignant type of spotted fever at  
Benghazi. The disease is described as  
very violent and fatal in form.

A priest at Santa Marta, in the United

## Gallio's Fall.

London, July 30. The race for the Goodwood cup, to-day, was won by Doucester; Kaiser second; Mistolo third.

Vienna journals say that Austria has received a circular note from Germany, urging the great powers to combine to prevent Austria's annexation of Bosnia.

New York, July 30. It is reported at St. Thomas that a rising in St. Domingo was threatened early in the month by some friends of the Emperor.

It is feared that pestilence may follow the flood at Alleghany city, as the ravine at Butcher's Run is choked up for two miles with the contents of the slaughter houses, more than 100 dead horses, and a large number of bullocks.

Special Telegram to the Tribune. The Quebec Ministry-Lumber-The Dawson Route. Ottawa, July 31.

Irvine, the Attorney General of the Province of Ontario, has resigned in consequence of the popular feeling against the Government consequent upon the late land transactions.

There are indications of a concerted movement of the nations bordering on Spain for the protection of the frontier from violation by the Carlists.

There is a serious strike of operatives of the Box Mills at Belfast, Ireland. The strikers work people are making threatening demonstrations to-night.

THE LUMBER CONVENTION in Ottawa yesterday adopted a report in favor of lessening the production by one half to remedy the present depression of the market owing to over production.

PITTSBURGH, July 29. THE PENNSYLVANIA FLOOD-THE SCENE OF THE CALAMITY. Thousands of people are visiting the scene of the recent disaster to-day.

Butcher's Run last evening the scene was peculiarly dismal. The devastated homes now in heaps of ruins doubtless conceal a large number of bodies not yet discovered.

THE BODIES OF THE ENTIRE FARDEN family have been recovered. But one person is missing at Wood's Run, a child of Mr. Gorman's.

THE RETURNS received at the County Commissioners' office show that twenty bridges were swept away by the flood in the county, entailing a loss of about \$40,000.

MISS IRELAND, of Massachusetts, has succeeded in gaining admittance to the Royal Artillery of Berlin; but being only a woman, her name does not appear on the roll of students, and for the same reason no money will be accepted from her, which she says is the only advantage she ever gained by wearing skirts.

THE CASE of Gallang va Gallang, in the Westmorland County Court, continued Wednesday evening. The jury returned a verdict of "No cause for action."

One of the best paying industries of the South is the manufacture of artificial ice, a branch of trade which is rapidly extending throughout all the great cities of that section of the country.

During the war of 1870, a German painter, having nothing else to do, frescoed his own dining room. A dealer coming there one day was so charmed that he gave him 60,000 thalers for the work of his leisure hours, and the panels containing the coveted paintings were carefully removed.
