## HOUSEFOLD RECEIP TS.

Turery Roasted.-Do not dress a turkey until it has been killed four or five days. Stuff it as follows:-Mix about four ounces of Ene bread crumbs with the same weight of nicely minced beef suet oputter, a bit of lemon peel, a little parsley and sweet herbs, some pepper and salt, and a small onion finely chopped; bind them together with one or two egga, and, if you like, add a little sausuge meat; stuf it into the craw; make some into balls, and put round the Cish. Put a sheet of nice paper over the breast. dredge it with flour, put it down to roast and baste it with butter. When nearly done dredge and baste it again and take the paper off. Three hours will be required for a large turkey, and two hours for one of a middling size; a small one less; send up with pork sausages, gravy sauce, mushroom; oyster or egg sauce, \&c. If turkeys are baked, 's bit of butter should be sent with them for basting.

## HOUSEHOLD RECELPTS.

A Chear Pudding. - Take half a pound of flour, half a pound of currants, half a pound of suet well chopped, and four ounces of treacle, with milk sufficient to mix it into a paste or stiff batter; butter a basin, put it in, and when tied in a cloth, let it boil five hours. When cold it may be cut into slices and browned in the pan.

## Owen's Pile Dintment a sure cure for Piles.

Rusks.-Take nineteen eggs; first beat the whites, and then beat the yolks with one pound and a half of loaf sugar in powder. Mix the whole, adding one pound and a half of flour and a few carraway seeds, if you like their flavor. Fill some in buttered moulds, and bake them. Cut in slices, and put them again in the oven to brown.

Rolled Pudding.-Make a paste as for a pie; roll it out in a long strip, cover it equally over with currants and chopped apples; roll it up, tie it in a cloth and boil it. In serving it up, cut it in slices; add melted butter for those who choose it, which will not be many. This pudding may also be made with any preserved fruit or jam, or even with treacle, and a little chopped apple.

Plum Pudding Sauce.-Mix a little pounded lump sugar with some melted butter; add a glass of sherry, a small glass of brandy, and a little nutmeg and lemon-peel grated.

A. Common Cheap Cake.-Mix well together one pound and a half of flour, half a pound of butter or clarified lard, four ounces of sugar, and half a grated nutmeg. Make a hole in the middle of the flour, and set a sponge with a tea-cuiful of yeast and a little warm milk. When it is well risen, add a little candied lemon or orange peel minced, and one egg well beaten. Mix the whole into a proper consistence with a little warm milk; set it to rise in a warm place, but not close to the fire, and when it has risen bake it. Seeds can be added if they are approved of, and spices or fruit also at pleasure.

Bath Cakes are very simple, and are suitable for the breakfast or tea table. They are thus made: Mix one pound of fresh butter with a pound of flour, rubbing it well in; then make it into a paste with a gill of yeast and some warm cream. Set it near the fire till it ferments; and when it has well risen make it into cakes, sprinkling in a few carraway seeds if you choose. Form it into cakes about the size of rolls, and bake them on tins.
