TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS MEETING

Little Business Done—Only Three Councillors in Attendance.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's office Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Ingram, Bisett and Devereaux.

The minutes of the previous meetings were read and approved. As the last payment on account of the purchase price of the property upon which is situated the electric light station and park has been made the Shives Co. has given the necessary deed and transfer of lease, thus vesting in the town all this property.

The Clerk was authorized to have the above documents recorded. H. P. McNaught made application for permission to install a gasoline tank on street near E. Sullivan's store. Permission granted, subject to regulations.

Clerk read a letter from Mr. Waterbury of the Public Works Dept. re clock tower asking for information in reference to same. The Town Clerk was instructed to answer the letter, explaining that the Post Office was in a district which the bylaws distinctly states all buildings must be of fireproof construction.

Campbellton was invited to have a representative attend the Fire Chief's convention to be held July 7th at St. Stephen.

This matter was referred to the Fire Protection Committee with power to act. Chief O'Donnell brought the matter of the Fire Alarm System to the attention of the Council.

Mr. Farrer explained that the system needed new batteries and a switchboard. The present batteries were burned out. It would cost about \$185.00 to renew these, but it would take three months to get these repairs.

Coun. Devereaux moved that the recommendation of the Fire Protection Committee for a switchboard, new batteries and repairs be adopted and supplies ordered.—Carried.

The Clerk read letters from various towns in reference to relief of St. Quentin. Placed on file. Departmental accounts were read and ordered paid.

His Worship stated that His Honor Judge McLatchy had invited the Council to take part in the official laying of the corner stone of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital on July 1st. On motion of Coun. Devereaux the Council accepted the invitation of the committee of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital to participate in the ceremony of laying the corner stone of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital on July 1st.—Carried.

As His Worship was called away on an urgent case the Council adjourned.

CORNER STONE TO BE LAID ON JULY 1st

Board of Trustees Making Plans for Laying of S. M. Hospital Corner Stone.

On July 1st, 1920, at 2:30 p.m., the corner stone of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, Campbellton, will be laid by Lieut.-Col. Alexander McMillan, D.S.O., of St. John, N. B., formerly of the 26th Batt.

At the present writing the complete programme of the ceremonies has not yet been arranged for, but those in charge have the matter well in hand, and within a few days the complete programme will be available.

Address by Lieut.-Col. Alexander McMillan, D.S.O.

IMPROVED TRAIN ACCOMMODATION

Sleeping Car Service Between St. John and Campbellton Beginning Monday.

In connection with the summer change of time on the Canadian National Railways effective Sunday, June 27th a new feature will be the new through sleeping car service between St. John, Moncton and Campbellton. A standard sleeper will be run from St. John on No. 10 train leaving at 11:45 p.m. except on Sundays. This train will connect with a new train, No. 31, which will leave Moncton for Campbellton at 2:30 a.m. except on Sundays. The sleeper will leave St. John every week night but Saturday and will not be attached to Monday's train departing from Moncton.

This new sleeping car service will give great accommodation to those desiring to reach North Shore points early in the morning and afford quick connection for those who want to go to points in Gaspe. Train No. 32 leaving Campbellton at 8:35 p.m. will arrive at Moncton at 2:25 a.m. and carry the through sleeper, connecting with No. 9 train for St. John and connecting also with No. 10 for Halifax. The sleeper will not be attached to train leaving Campbellton Saturday evening.

Other Changes.
The Suburban train leaving Bathurst each morning and arriving here about noon has been taken off and this traffic is served by No. 31 which leaves Moncton at 3:20 a.m. as stated above, arriving at Campbellton at 9:30. This train or No. 32 leaves Campbellton each evening, except Sunday at 8:35. So far as we can learn a number of the sidings served by the Suburban will not now be stopped at, but a faster service will be given.

The Limited will run on the same time as formerly as will trains No. 25 and 26, between Moncton and Campbellton.

Western Service.
Trains No. 31 and 32 will run through to Mont Joli and will take the place of the West Local. No. 31 will leave here at 9:50 and No. 32 will arrive here at 8:25 so that through connections will be given both ways.

International Division.
On Monday, Tuesday, Friday and Saturday an express train will leave Campbellton at 7 o'clock for St. Leonard's, and will leave St. Leonard's for Campbellton at 1:30 arriving here at 6:20.

A mixed train will leave here daily except Sunday at 8:15 and will arrive at St. Leonard's at 5:05 and will leave St. Leonard's each morning, except Sunday at 7:00, arriving here at 8:45.

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

ORBAT HOMES.

Using the Material Already on the
Site.

The way to own a home at a mini-
mum of expense is to build it of
material already on the site. Harth
or instance.

The requisite earth may be had for
digging, and there is nothing to
pay for transportation. In England
this idea is being taken up, with the
expectation that the building of
framed-earth dwelling houses on an
extensive scale will help important-
ly to solve the housing problem,
breaks being scarce and expensive.

We have our own housing problem
in this country, and it is daily becom-
ing more serious. Why not use ram-
med earth for building?

A house of this material costs one-
fifth as much as a brick house of the
same size. It is quickly erected, and
being finished with plaster, is hand-
some. Furthermore, it is an endur-
ing structure, and is rat-proof and
mouse-proof.

There are in European countries
many such buildings that date actual-
ly from prehistoric times. In parts of
France and Spain this simplest of all
methods of house construction has
long been practiced, and recently it
has been adopted with great success
in South Africa and other British
dominions.

Planks are set up on edge to form
a mold, and the space between is al-
lled with earth, which is then rammed
as tight as possible. The ramming, of
course, can be done much more ad-
vantageously and cheaply by ma-
chine, likewise the digging.

If the subsoil be clay, the latter,
mixed with straw and "puddled," fur-
nishes a first-class material, utilis-
able in the same way. This is what
is called in England "cob building."

The birthplace of Sir Walter Raleigh
was a cob house, and it is in as good
condition as ever to-day.

Where Moles Beat Monkeys.
Have you ever noticed a gull drop-
ping on to the sea—how it spreads
its wings high so that the feathers
shall not be wetted? If a gull's wing-
feathers get wet it cannot rise until
they dry.

Throw a mouse into the water. It
can swim a little, but as soon as its
fur is soaked down it goes and
drowns. So too in the case of a rab-
bit. As soon as its fur is wet it is
done for.

A mole can swim like anything,
but a monkey is very helpless in the
water. Almost all land birds drown
very quickly, if unlucky enough to
fall into the water. They strike out
with their legs, move round and
round in a circle, but cannot get off
the water.

Lions and tigers are very good
swimmers and do not share the com-
mon cat's hatred for the water. But
of all the cat tribe the South Amer-
ican jaguar is the finest performer in
the water. It seems often to plunge
in for mere joy of a swim.

A rabbit, as we have said, drowns
as soon as its fur is soaked through,
yet curiously enough its near rela-
tive, the hare, swims quite well, and
will often cross a river when hunted.

Bears are good swimmers, even
those that usually live far from large
sheets of water, and the common rat
is no mean performer.

One of the best of animal swim-
mers is the horse. Horses have been
known to swim a river nearly a mile
wide simply to get back to their old
stables.

Deer, too, can also swim well.
There are cases of caribou having
swum across lakes ten miles wide
when escaping from forest fires.





along.

The summer is nearly half gone and

yet the water supply question has

hardly been discussed. Expensive

machinery was purchased last winter

which has been placed in storage and

will remain there indefinitely unless

our councillors show more interest.

The Electric Light system needs

extensive repairs and additions, yet

and no steps taken to plan for this

work before the fall overtake us.





BY AEROPLANE TO PARIS.

A distinctly novel attraction has now been provided in the G.P.E. office windows at Charing Cross, an attraction which has been much admired by the crowds who have gathered to make inspection. The fine windows usually devoted to the exhibition of things Canadian is being occupied by an excellent model aeroplane of the Aircraft Transport and Travel, Limited, at Hendon, together with scientifically accurate models of various types of aeroplanes and airships.

Such a display in a railway and shipping office may seem rather unusual at first sight, but is really a sign of the times, also marking much enterprise on the part of the Dominion Express Company of Canada. Realizing the importance of maintaining a really "Express" service, if its name is still to be justified, the Dominion Express Company, the premier Express Company in Canada, made arrangements to act as Passenger and Parcel Agents for the Aircraft Transport and Travel Limited on their London-Paris daily air service.

It is thus possible for either passengers or parcels to be booked for conveyance by aeroplane to or from London and Paris through any of the Dominion Express Company's offices in Europe, and these, in addition to London, are to be found in important cities such as Liverpool, Glasgow, Manchester, Birmingham, Bristol and Paris.

The advantages of this arrangement are many, for the Dominion Express, holding as it does the exclusive right of shipping Express parcels over the entire G.P.E. system, as agents for the Aeroplane Service can ensure that an Express package scheduled to catch a certain ship actually reached its destination in Canada in the shortest possible space of time. As time is money nowadays, more than ever it was, it is easy to realize what an important adjunct an Air Service is to an Express Company.

The time-table shows that only 24 hours is occupied on the journey as from London and Paris—current letters are carried at 2 shillings and 6 pence per ounce over the ordinary letter rate.

Parcels for delivery in Paris on the same day have to be handed in at the London office of the Dominion Express Company, 62-65 Charing Cross, London, S.W., before 10.30 a.m. The parcel rates range from 1s. 6d. to 2s. 6d. per lb. according to quantity, while special rates are quoted for large and regular consignments. The single fare for passengers is 10 guineas which includes a car to convey the passenger to Hounslow, the starting point. The Dominion Express Company's officials at Charing Cross have every reason to believe that a large proportion of Canadian goods to Europe this year will be shipped by the ease with which they are able to book seats for a car to take them to the Continent, and that the motor car can pick them up at the Champs Elysees.



HAUNTED PALACE

Spooky Appear in Famous British

With all the after-war interest in things supernatural the news that a "haunted palace" has recently been seen on three separate occasions surrounding the corridors of Windsor Castle need occasion no surprise. But it recalls a story told by a young officer, Carr Glyn of the Grenadier Guards, some twenty years ago, says Gordon Answers and goes on.

Mr. Glyn was reading a book in the side library when, glancing up, he saw the black veiled figure of a woman walk past him and disappear in the inner library. As she did not turn, he followed her; but found his amazement, that she had completely vanished, although there was no means of exit from the inner room.

When he told his uncanny story following morning it created a sensation in the palace, especially when it was discovered that three centuries ago the room had had an exit at the very place through which the black lady had passed. It was generally believed that the mysterious figure must have been that of Queen Elizabeth herself, of whose midnight appearances in her old haunts in the castle many stories are told.

But Queen Bess is only one of the several royal specters said to haunt the royal palaces. The Duchess de Mazarin, one of the merry monarch's many favorites, has been seen more than once in the rooms and corridors of St. James' Palace, which is also said to be a favorite haunt of Nelly Gwyn of the saucy tongue and merry laughter; and of that terranant beauty, the Duchess of Cleveland.

Hampton Court Palace, too, has the reputation of being visited by the shades of several great people who have once "walked in splendor" within its historic walls. Strange tales are told of spectral figures which vanish when approached; of mysterious noises, the uncanny opening of doors without visible agency, and of sounds of merriment and of snatches of song proceeding from empty rooms.

But the most frightening vision of all is that of a white-robed figure running down a corridor with her long hair streaming behind her, and disappearing into the chapel. This startling apparition is said to be that of the unhappy Catherine Howard, the second Queen whom Henry VIII sent to the executioner's block; and who, so long after her tragic death, repeats an incident in her troubled existence when, escaping from her guards, she rushed into the chapel to beg for her life from her tyrannical lord, who was staying there.

Catherine of Aragon is also said to haunt the palace of Hampton, many a time, clothed in black, and lighted taper in her hand, walking up certain staircases and disappearing through the beautiful archway known as Queen's Gate.

On the night before the death of Frederick III, father of the ex-kaiser, a sentry declared that he had seen the figure of an old woman, bowed with age and carrying a broom in her hand; and his story would certainly have been scoffed at as the creation of a disordered brain had not similar figure been seen on former occasions, notably on the death of the Emperor William I.

This grotesque old lady, whose visits bore so little good to the house of Hohenzollern, is disrespectfully spoken of as "The Sweeper."

Streets in white or even in black are perhaps intelligible; but what are to think of "The Old Man," who is said to haunt the Tuilleries and to have been seen by no less famous person than Catherine de Medici, and the great Napoleon, the latter of whom is said to have held a long conversation with him, on the eve of his ill-fated Russian campaign.

During the night before the late Emperor of Austria was treacherously assassinated, a sentry on guard in the castle of Schonbrunn was frightened "out of his wits" by the spectacle of a beautiful woman, robed in white and wearing a long, flowing veil, walking along the corridor where he was on duty.

Three he challenged the trespasser, and started in pursuit of her, when she vanished as suddenly and mysteriously as she had appeared.

This may be means the appearance of the "lady in white," for she was seen as long ago as 1867, just before the tragic death of Maximilian, the ill-fated archduke, who was made Emperor of Mexico; again, in 1889, on the very night when Rudolf, heir to the Austrian throne, was so strangely done to death in the forest of Mynster; and on other occasions when a member of the imperial family has died.

Britain's Roads.
Britain's 152,000 miles of roads are badly in need of repair as a result of heavy transport during the war and the insignificant amount of work done to maintain them at a high standard. Many of the main arteries of London show to what an extent of disrepair roads and thoroughfares of all sorts deteriorated during the war. Some of the principal west and streets, including the Strand, are in the worst condition ever remembered. A comprehensive scheme of rehabilitation is now in progress. In ordinary years it cost \$90,000,000 annually to keep the country's 152,000 miles of road in proper condition. Owing to the increased cost of labor and materials, the annual cost is now estimated at two hundred million dollars.

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WOMAN PROPOSES.

In Some Lands It is Always Leap Year.

Once again with 1929, women have a chance to take the initial step towards providing themselves with an introduction to the heavenly kingdom, a boon which marriage brings them, according to Mormon philosophy. The return of a year which leaps forward a day, bringing to them a privilege monopolized by men three years out of four, has no significance for women of many lands, since they enjoy that liberty all the time.

The women of no race possess more freedom in this matter than the Hopi Indians of Arizona. A maiden does not woo the man of her choice, but simply and forcibly states her proposition to his mother without any embarrassment of his part. Her only preliminary proceeding is to dress her hair in two gigantic whorls, one over each ear. This is her announcement that she is going a-courting. These peculiar knots are intended to represent the blossoms of a squash vine, symbol of virginity, but to those untutored in their meaning they resemble huge door knobs set at a rather violent angle. When some debilitated man announces that they are but the curls of his hair, he is regarded as a sex or eight of the eligible young men of the tribe literally take to the woods.

After this aggressive young lady has selected her victim and his mother has agreed that he shall be sacrificed, she serves in the house of her future mother-in-law for thirty days, grinding meal, very much after the fashion that Jacob of old served fourteen years for Rachel. The poor youth in the meantime does not sit idly by, but weaves her wedding garments.

Among the Batus of the Uganda Protectorate of Africa, if a girl is not fortunate enough to be asked in marriage in her home town, she goes to another village and offers herself to some man there. Though not honored in her own country, she at least receives consideration in that of her neighbor, for a woman is an agricultural laborer and a man is not likely to refuse such a business asset. The Galla woman of the eastern coast of Africa has the rare privilege among savage and half-civilized people of refusing to marry a man who is undesirable to her.

Little known of the marriage customs of the ancient Egyptians, but we can easily believe that women had at least the privilege of expressing a preference if they did not actually do the proposing, for, if we trust the historian, Diodorus, a man promised his wife to grant her complete control over him and to offer no objection to her commands.

Some survival of this liberty of Egyptian women must have permeated other portions of Africa, for princesses on the west coast of that continent whose children may become future rulers choose their own husbands. Nor is a princess limited in her choice to unmarried men. She may just as easily decide upon one who has already entered the marriage state, and the poor fellow has to put away his old wives and become her slave. Moreover, she has the power of life and death over him. He sometimes has only one consolation—he inherits all her property if he is fortunate enough to be spared until her death.

In the Tyrol a girl may express her preference for a man by presenting him with a bottle of spirits. If she is afraid that her procedure has not the endorsement of her parents she may contrive to lower the precious fluid at night from her chamber window.

In North Transylvania, a young peasant woman may give a particular wail a tune that he is the apple of her eye by going with him to his part at the time of the harvesting of the oats to help him carry in his crop.

It is said that at this season one sometimes sees a procession of gaily-decorated carts going a-field, a willing maid seated in each.

One of the obligations of a father in Roumania and Bosnia is to provide so well for his marriageable daughter that when she is presented with a list informing her of the means and qualifications of the eligible young men in the vicinity she will not be hampered by a lack of worldly goods on her own part in making her choice.

Among the Eskimos of the east coast of Greenland, a man captures the girl he wants, but from that time on the usual order of things is reversed. He has to exercise the greatest vigilance to prevent her from eloping with any other man whom she may prefer, as this seems to be her privilege.

In the Northern New Hebrides, a bride who is unhappy seeks the earliest opportunity of running away from her husband and seeking a home with some man she likes better. If her parents cannot induce her to return to the injured husband, they usually send him a pig to soothe his wounded feelings.

Japanese Picture Star.
Tsuri Aoki, the Japanese picture star, who has been commissioned to adapt and modernize the works of a number of great British and American dramatists to the requirements of the native Japanese theatres, is a niece of Mrs. Sadak Yacco, who was the first woman in Japan to be permitted to appear on the stage, women's roles during all the thousands of years previous having been assumed by men players. Miss Aoki's uncle was a Kawakami, reformer of the Japanese theatre. She emigrated to America in early girlhood with these relatives. Because of her thorough knowledge of both Japanese and English, and of the dramatic traditions of both countries, she was selected to make the translations of the English classics.



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

BOARD OF HEALTH ACT NOT ENFORCED

Contagious Diseases Not Closely Quarantined And Other Regulations Ignored.

There is much general criticism of the manner in which the New Brunswick Health Act is being enforced in the Town of Campbellton by the Restigouche Board of Health.

It is stated on good authority that the neglect of the proper officials in not properly quarantining a house in which diphtheria existed was the indirect cause of the death of a child from this disease here early this week.

It is a well known fact that many places in town are in a filthy state and breeders of typhoid, yet no steps are being taken to enforce proper sanitary conditions. Pigs are allowed to be kept within the town limits. It is also said that a slaughter house is conducted on a small scale on one of our best residential streets and on a vacant lot in close proximity to residences and stores fill and rubbish have been dumped, despite the fact that the Inspector's attention has been called to these matters.

After an epidemic has broken out it will be too late to remedy these matters and we sincerely trust that prompt steps will be taken to clean matters up.

It is the opinion of our citizens that the one organization for the county is not sufficient, but that the town should be permitted to look after matters as outlined above.
