

The Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Grand Trunk Pacific project de-

rives an increasing interest from the discussions in the Railway Committee of the House of Commons. The west is interested only in getting its products to market and is not concerned whether these go over Canadian or American lines to the seaboard. The Maritime Provinces, however, claim that the new road will be of no benefit to them unless it discharges western traffic through Maritime Province ports. The city of Quebec is the proposed eastern terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and the Maritime Province members argue that if the line ends there the bulk of the export business will go to Portland, Me., the Atlantic port and eastern terminus of the Grand Trunk. Mr. Hays gives his word that St. Johns and Halifax will have the preference on traffic originating in the Grand Trunk Pacific system. The Maritime Province members demand an effective guarantee, which can be furnished apparently in two ways: by extending the Grand Trunk Pacific into the Maritime Provinces, or by an arrangement for delivering Grand Trunk Pacific business to the Intercolonial at Quebec. The Minister of Railways, who controls the Intercolonial, thinks he can make a satisfactory agreement with Mr. Have for the transfer of Grand Trunk Pacific traffic to the Government road; but failing this, he thinks the Grand Trunk Pacific line should be prolonged into the Maritime Provinces. The position of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia members is a reasonable one, and can be defended from a national standpoint. A new Canadian transcontinental railroad should build up Canadian, not American, ports. No Canadian will dissent from that as a general proposition. But with the Grand Trunk, the new line will be a business, not a patriotic undertaking, and no one can blame the company for looking exclusively after No. 1. Traffic, like water, follows the channel of least resistance, and if the Grand Trunk can carry goods to Portland more economically than to St. John or Halifax, something stronger than sentiment will be necessary to prevent the Canadian ports from being sidetracked. Mr. Hays assures the committee that goods can be shipped as cheaply to Halifax and St. John as to Portland, and that it is merely a matter of terminal facolities. Care must be taken to do justice to the whole Province, and there must be no favoritism. The member South Oxford had given his opinion that the Government might at least undertake the transmission of the power, but the Premier did not think that even this responsibility should be assumed. He referred humorously to the consequence to the Government of any serious break in the transmission line, and said it would involve the Administration in more trouble than even Mr. Davis' Veterans' Grant Bill. If, for instance, the factories of Toronto had to be shut down and worknen were idle for two or three days, the mass of invective leveled at the Government would be almost more than it could bear. 


