LONDON, June 19. - In the debate in the House of Commons to day on the Factory Bill the amendment of Sydney Buxton (Liberal) to prohibit children under 11 years of age from working was adopted by vote of 202 to 136. The Government was thus defeated. The majority included a few Conservative members. Buxton's amendment will affect 150,000 to 200,000 children in the kingdom now employed in the manufacturing district as half-timers. It is a humanitarian reform, and was opposed by the bulk of the operatives, who benefit by the labor of their offspring. The Liberals argued that the abolishing of child-labor would provide more work for

adults.

Sir J. E. Corst explained that the proposal had been agreed to at the Berlin Labor Conference in order to bring England into harmony with other nations on the only point on which she was behindhand, but it was distinctly understood that the signing of the conference protocol did not bind England to legislative action on the subject.

He once thought them cranks, but since he had seen the evil of the traffic he was ready for any measure that would put an end to it. He had no patience with such a traffic. Mr. E. L. Bond supported Mr. Ker. In the Diocese of Montreal the Church of England was not behind in temperance work, and the remarks recently made in the Toronto Synod respecting the Dominion Alliance were not deserved. ITS PERIL THE COUNTRY'S SAL VATION.

Hon, Mr. Abbott confessed to his fellow

members of the Dominion Senate last night that his selection as Conservative leader was a compromise. "I am here," he said, because I am not particularly obnoxious to anybody." That is at least candid. But Mr. Abbott is not obnoxious to some men high in authority in his party because he has agreed to their demands, and he is not obnoxious to others because they are at present in a hopeful mood. They look for favors to come as the price of their allegiance. That his permanent success is more than doubtful, even the Montreal Star, strong Conservative journal though it is, doubts. It says:

"We are not alarmed for the future of the Dominion. We have too much con-fidence in the country and its people for that; but we recognize that the Conserva-tive party is in a perilous position, from which we do not believe the Hon. J. J. C. Abbott is able to extricate it."

This is an admission that a change cannot be long delayed. The sooner it is brought about, and a staple Government formed that will work to promote the welfare of the whole people, the better. The present system, whereby we have a Governmen controlled by the combines, yet holding power through the pretense of being favor-able to securing free trade relations, is most hurtful to the country.

IMPERIAL FEDERATIONISTS MUST SHOW THEIR HAND.

Lord Salisbury, replying to a deputation of Imperial Federationists yesterday, refused to summon a conference of colonial statesmen until a definite scheme of imperial federation had been prepared. No one can take exception to this ruling.

So far the imperial federationists have

What is needed is a time limit to the sittings of the House. Why should sittings be pro-longed beyond a certain hour in the night? The whole of this session was occupied in discussing the scheme for the consolidation of the church, which has been already reterred to. It served to bring out some of the best debating talent in the Synod.

Charles Jenkins, of Petrolea, explained the origin and object of the scheme under consideration. If the proposed General Synod had full power, as it undoubtedly would have, it must necessarily lessen the authority of the Provincial Synod. Taking up the constitution clause by clause, he commented upon each. In reference to the clause empowering the General Synod to regulate the transfer of clergy from one diocese to another, he pointed out its importance inasmuch as it could enable, if expedient, a clergyman to remove to another diocese and take with him the accrued benefits of his residence in that diocese. The church in Canada should nave all the advantages of national indorsement; it would give the church elasticity to lengthen the cause so that they would be much more in touch with the people of this country. He did not see much difference between Methodism and Episcopalianism except the prominence given by the former to lay work. He was persuaded that in due time the office of the bishop in all its native power and lay work would be so brought out that the barriers between the Methodists and Episcopalians would be broken down and they would be a united Protestant church. (Applause.) He moved the adoption of the scheme as submitted. W. J. Imlach seconded the motion.

Judge Ermatinger, of St. Thomas, asked if the constitution was to be absolutely rejected or accepted, or if it was subject to amendment or suggestion.

Wm. Jenkins said desired action could be taken. It would be sent to the Provincial Synod.

M. Wilson, Q.C., of Chatham, maintained that if the submissions of the different Synods came before the Provincial Synod.




