Disastrous Results of the Gale. London, Feb. 17 .- It is believed a number of vessels bound to or from England were lost in the storms yesterday and the night before last and that their loss will only become positively known when they are posted at the various maritime head-quaretrs. A quantity of wreckage has ceme ashore at Roundstone, Connemara, county Galway, Ireland. On some of these pieces of wreckage is the inscription, "Cavour, Greenock," and this is taken to indicate the loss of the British bark Cavour, Capt. McMurtrie, which sailed from Pensacola Dec. 5 for Greenock. There has also drifted ashore at Roundstone a box of books bearing the initials "S. F. H. Y."

TORNYO, Feb. 17.—In the Legislative Assembly to-day the Provincial Treasurer stated in reply to Mr. Clancy that the gross amounts paid alone into the license fund in 1890 was \$680,500 05 and in 1891—\$680.-298 68. The municipalities imposed by bylaw over and above the statutory duties in 1890, \$162,008, and in 1891, \$156,400. The gross amount-paid the municipalities was in 1890, \$297,353 46, and in 1891, \$294,968 26, while the Province received, in 1890, \$307,281 02, and in 1891, \$308.-200 17. The number of persons committed for drunkenness is 1891, as compared with 1890, shows a decrease of 959.

In consequence of the delay in printing the estimates, it was agreed to postpone the financial statement of Mr. Harcourt. 

THE STRIKING MOLDERS.

The London Free Press still pretends that the great strike of molders in Hamilton has nothing to do with the policy of igh taxation. It further tells its readers that only one stove foundry is affectedthat of the Gurneys. Why indulge in this misrepresentation. Let us again briefly state the situation, and challenge our con temporary to combat the facts brought

Prior to the establishment of the high tax policy in 1879 the molders of Hamilt had eleven months work in a year, and they got a little over \$2 a day for their work.

Since the N. P. came into force, with its high taxes on coal, on iron and other necessaries to the production of a stove, the price of stoves has been increased and the demand for new stoves has fallen off because of the inability of people

to pay for them.

The stove combine had something to do with this, while it lasted, but it broke down, and now the chief members of the organization, who reside in Toronto and Hamilton, are determined to unload a share of their losses on their men. A first-class lot of horses in all the principal breeds were on exhibition, and a number of saies at good prices were made during the fair.

Several handsome special prizes were offered in the dairy sections, and no doubt aided largely in making the exhibit in that department the largest and best ever shown in Canada. The new refrigerator added materially to the display of butter, and was favorably commented on by exhibitors and visitors for its adaptability to the purposes required. The process of manufacturing latter by the traveling dairy, under the direction of Professor Dean, of the Ontario Agricultural College, which was carried on daily in the dairy building, was of much interest and also highly instructive.

In the main building, the machinery in motion, the manufacturing of goods in view of the public, the displays of manufactured and raw materials, together with the vast

In the matter of seating accommodation we are now perhaps in advance of any other fair association in the Dominion. In this respect it has been the desire of your Board to comply with the demands of our visitors and exhibitors in every possible way.

It would perhaps be well for the incoming directors to consider if some improvements could not be made to the grounds, and looking to this end, the city engineer has been requested to make a complete plan for the laying out of drives and walks through the park. There are several places in the park where shade trees would be both useful and ornamental, and some of the superfluous trees on the city streets might be transplanted to fill these gaps. A request to the City Council to undertake this as their portion of the good work would no doubt meet with approval. A number of young trees might also be planted at small expense.

The payment on real estate for the past year was \$450, making the total amount now expended for the additional lands acquired \$6,087 50, leaving the balance due on mortgage \$2,812.

The additions to furniture and chattels account consists chiefly in the purchase of electric light wire and fittings, enabling us to string two separate circuits throughout the grounds and buildings, to guard against darkness should an accident occur to either of the dynames and also furnish a short line to the principal points for all night service.
