Berlin, Sept. 14.—The Fremdenblatt has a dispatch from Monace giving an account of a sensational tragedy at that place. Prince Albert of Monace and his wife, the Princess Alice, on returning from their recent tour, were received with great enthusiasm by the people of the principality, the attaches of the Casino turning out especially in strong force to greet them. The little army of members was drawn up at the landing as a guard of honor, and the Governor and Council were present to deliver addresses. The cannon thundered a greeting, and the scene was of a most joyous and festal character, when suddenly a young man burst through the throng and rushed toward Prince Albert and the Princess, He was well dressed, but his wild and disordered appearance at once caused dismay among the group which surrounded the sovereign. In his hand he grasped a weapon, and before anybody could interfere he raised the pistol, for such it was, and putting it close to his head, fired and fell dead at the feet of the Princess Alice.

The princess, who had a moment before been all smiles, nearly fainted. She gave a cry of alarm and sank back in the arms of her husband. A dozen officers sprang forward and seized the prostrate body, only to find that life was extinct. The lifeblood which cozed from the wound almost stained the garments of the princess. On searching the body not even a centime was found, but there was a ticket to the Casino, which told the story of his fate. He had evidently been overcome by despair, after losing all he had in the great gambling establishment, which supplies a revenue to support the Prince of Monaco in luxury, and had determined to end his life at the feet of the Prince.

CANADIAN QUARANTINE MEASURES.

QUEBEC, Sept. 13.—Dr. Montizambert and officers of Quarantine may take the best of precautions against cholera-stricken immigrants passing Gross Isle, but it does not deter the Government and railway officers from assuring the country that they will not pass Quebec without a second cleansing from head to foot, baggage and all. The emigrants by the steamer Labrador were compelled to take a bath, and their baggage was disinfected in a temperature reaching over 250 degrees. This operation was conducted in a car on the embankment and in a steam laundry at Levis. An unfortunate trouble has arisen on the other side with the passengers bound for the States, and they are still at the emigration sheds awaiting orders from the Grand Trunk Railway authorities before proceeding on their journey. It appears that although they may have a clean bill of health from Quarantine here it is not sufficient, and emigrants have to undergo another ten days' quarantine on the border before entering the States.

THE Cleveland and Hill forces in New THE Cleveland and Hill forces in New York State may now be looked upon as united against the "enemy." Senator Hill, who has said nothing since the Chicago convention, will deliver his first address in this campaign in Brocklyn on Monday next. 

The following is a copy of a letter sent by Mr. V. Cronyn, president of the London Street Railway Company, to City Clerk Kingston:

The London Street Railway Cospany,
London, Sent. 13, 1892.

C. A. Kingston, Eq., City Clerk:
Dear Sir,—Referring to the statement to the City Council recently furnished by the city engineer, purporting to give the cost of material, etc., furnished by the city to the street railway during the past four years, I cannot conceive where he has obtained his figures from. In justice to the street railway company, I must ask for the details upon which the statement is based, giving dates and the streets upon which supplied, and the parts of such streets where furnished; for I don't hesitate to say that not one-tenth the amount as stated has ever been supplied to the street railway or ever required by them from the city. On the contrary, if given the opportunity, I am sure that I can satisfy the council that valuable permanent improvements have been made in the streets by the street railway at their own expense and in excess of any costs to the city by the street railway.

Such a statement as has been furnished can only have one object, viz, to prejudice the minds of the council and public against the present street railway company.

I therefore ask that, in fair play to the street railway company, the city accounts be placed in the hands of the auditor, Mr. Jewell, to report on the matter, to whom I will also refer our street railway books, and if the result does not justify what I say I will be responsible for the costs of the investigation. 




