TEHERAN, May 17 .- Great destitution prevails in Sheeraz, capital of the Province of Fars, and the famishing inhabitants are making a riotous demand for bread, accus-ing the authorities of securing the grain beforehand in order to sell it at a high price and profit from the miseries of the people. Presented at the Congress in Chicago,

Fifteen Different Sections in Session at Once.

Social Revolution, Politics and Masonry Discussed by the Ladies-The Show to be Cpen on Sunday.

CHICAGO, May 16.—The delegates to the Women's Congress started in early this morning for a hard day's work. The programme for the week comprises a four-hour morning session each day, a visit to the World's Fair each afternoon and a three-hour session in the evening. Mrs. Charlotte Emerson Brown presided this morning over an audience of 1,500 in the Hall of Washington, and after devotional exercises a number of foreign representatives were introduced by Mrs. Potter Palmer and Mrs. Charles Henrotin. The paper on "The Civil and Social Evolution of Women" was read by Elizabeth Cady Stanton of New York, and in the discussion which followed Margaret Parker, of Scotland; Louis E. Thomas, of the Woman's Centenary Association; Dr. Emily Howard Stowe, president of the Woman's Enfranchisement Association of Canada, and Dr. Jennie Lozier, president of Scotland; Louis Ed. Canada, and Dr. Jennie Lozier, president

of Sorosis, took prominent part.

After this subject had been disposed of Mario Stromberg, of Russia, who was given a cordial welcome, presented a paper upon the evolution of woman. Politics was the theme of the gathering in the big Hall of Columbus, where the audience numbered about 2,000. Jane Cobden Unwin, representative of the Women's Franchise League of England, began with a paper by Miss Brown, of London, upon "Women in the Municipal Government," which gave a succinctreview of the struggle of women of England

Government," which gave a succinetreview of the struggle of women of England for their political rights and the measures of success that had surrounded their eflorts. Ida A. Harper, of Indiana, told something about the political influence of women in American municipalities.

The conference then branched off to a consideration of women as an actual force in politics, and the Countess of Aberdeen spoke at length upon the subject. She was followed by Lillie Deveraux Blake, of New York, and a short address by Martha Strickland, of Michigan, upon the position and influence of women in city law brought the session to a close.

THE LAST LETTER.

Rev. Joseph Philp Concludes His Tour.

Expected Home This Week-Interesting and Bayrout.

Rev. Joseph Philp, the pepular pastor of the Centennial Methodist Church, who has been touring in the Holy Land, is expected bome this week after his three months' absence. The appended letter dated at Marseilles, France, April 27, is therefore the last of a very interesting series of pen-sketches, which he has sent his congrega-tion:

"My last letter was written from Damaseus shortly after our arrival at that city. We found Damaseus a quaint old city, more finely ornamented than any other city that we have visited. It claims to be the oldest city in the world, and they go so far as to show the red earth from which Adam was made. They also show the toinh of Cain on the top of one of the hills to the west and the tomb of Abei about fifteen miles away. The city does not exhibit any beauty in style of architecture or any plan in the arrangement of the streets. It is a real old curiosity shop. The old looking people, the gaudy costumes that they wear and the queer habits of everybody make one eternal show on the streets. The rivers Abana and Pharparhave turned a desert into a fruitfal field, and the city is surrounded by beautiful gardens stretching out to the east, north and south of the city. It is said that when Mahomet looked down on the city from the neighboring hills he turned away exclaiming: 'As God has promised us but one paradise I will not endanger my chances for the heavenly by entering this one.'

"Our greatest interest in the city gathered around the names of Naaman and St. Paul. A hospital for lepers stands on the spot where Naaman's louse is supposed to have stood. I saw the place where Paul is said to have been smitten to the earth. We were form in the street called "Straight," saw the house of Ananias and the place where Paul was let down over the wall in a basket. Our journey from Damaseus to Beyrout was very enjoyable. The scenery along the mountains was of Alpine splendor. The ruins at Baalbic are of great proportions and far beyond our expectations. We found in the Valley of Baca, between Lebanon and Anti-Lebanon Mountains, a very rich and beautiful valley. In it we were shown Seth's tomb, Noah's tomb and the place where Eve wept over the murder of Abel.

"We reached Beyrout on the evening of the I5th, according to our 'Itinerary.' You should have seen our baggage, jammed out of recognition, hats no longer in the shape of ha

A good deal of discussion has taken place regarding the Ontario Voters' Lists Amendment Bill, introduced into the Legislature by the Attorney-General. The measure is opposed by the city councils of London and Toronto, on the ground that it adds to the duties of the civic assessors. "After the voters' list has been finally revised, corrected and cartified, under the Ontario Voters' List Act, 1889, as varied by any of the preceding sections of this act, and before the nomination day at any election, the judge shall have power to strike from the list the names of any persons who have died since the list was revised, corrected and cartified, and for the purpose of striking off the same the cartificate or testimony of the division registrar as to deaths shall be sufficient prima facie evidence of the death, with an evidence of identity, which may be reasonably necessary, in case the identity of the person said to be dead and the person of the same name on the voters' list is disputed or open to reasonable doubt."

Our experience of some county judges moves us to suggest that the Attorney-General should make this provision im-perative. The judge should be required to cut off the names of all men who are proved to be dead by the returns of the registrar.

While Sir Oliver's amendments improve the act and make it greatly to be preferre to the Dominion Franchise Act, with its inquisition, its foreign vote, its countless opportunities for personation, and its un-warranted powers to judges to steal seats for their personal friends when candidates, it still does not come up to our idea of what a simple, complete and inexpensive law should be.

The one object to be aimed at is to have complete list of voters on polling day. This list, even compiled as Sir Oliver's bill provides, will not be complete, because it will be made up, as a rule, many months before an election is held. The trouble and expense to the political parties, or to individuals, or to both, will have to be shouldered every year, whether there is to be a Provincial election or not. Why should this be necessary? Why should the needed labor and expense not be concentrated into an election campaign! This could be done if, just before every election, qualified if, just before every election, qualined voters were permitted to register, say one month before polling day. Then the list would be as complete as it could be made. But there would be inducements to personation, say opponents of the radical reform. Under a carefully-prepared law, with stringent penalties in the case of fraudulent registration, there would be force concentrating for personation than fewer opportunities for personation than now. Moreover, if there were suspicions that any names on the list were not those of genuine voters there would be vigorous inquiry before election day and effectual means taken to prevent the completion of

the fraud. There is no necessity for the people of any city going to the trouble and expense of making up a voters' list for either Provincial or Dominion elections every year. We hope that the Ontario Government will set the Ottawa authorities a good example, and provide that the lists shall be put in shape only a reasonable time before the holding of an election.

RINGING THE CURFEW.

Some amusing though absolutely misa hievous and unfair criticisms of Hon. Mr. G ibson's measure for the better protection of children in the Province have been indulged in by various Conservative newspapers. It would almost be charity to believe that the critics write in total ignorance of the provisions of the measure. The Ottawa Citizen, for example, says:

But it is alleged that many unworthy persons have squeezed their names on the lists, and are treated with as great liberality as those who fought and bled for their country. The bill of expense may be considerably reduced when the unworthy are cut off, but in any case it is acknowledged that no nation has ever treated its defenders or their widows and offspring with as much consideration as the United

What is of special importance to outsiders, and practically to us Canadians, Ilving alongside the United States, is the fact brought out that but for the annual payments necessitated to pay off the principal and the interest on this large war expenditure and to provide liberal pensions, the taxation of the people of the United States would be a mere nothing.
