

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

EXERCISES FOR THE ABDOMINAL MUSCLES

By Dr. Emma E. Walker. (Copyright, 1905, by A. S. Barnes & Co.) (Copyright, 1905, by A. S. Barnes & Co.)

A FINE exercise for the abdominal muscles, and consequently for constitution, is as follows:

Bend the body forward at the waist; then move it to the left, back, and right, successively, before straightening it. Reverse the direction by moving first to the right, then back, and sideways to the left. Do not raise the trunk to the erect position till the end of each set. set.

Take all of these movements in a gen-Take all of these movements in a gentle manner. In this exerc se a straight line drawn through the body describes the figure of a cone with its apex at the angle of the spinal column.

Trunk rotation brings into play many of the muscles of the back and hips, the sloping muscles of the abdomen, and all of the muscles of the bowels.

Their circulation is stirred up, and consequently all of the abdominal organs are excited to do their work in a vigorous manner. In sluggishness of these parts, this exercise is effective in restoring the normal functions.

A good time to practice it is just before going to bed at night and on get-

ting up in the morning. In addition to this, the kneading exercise is excellent ting up in the morning. In addition to this, the kneading exercise is excellent for constipation.

"Liver squeezer": Take standing position, first stretch the right arm up as far as you can, reaching downward as far as you can, reaching downward as far as possible with the left hand. You will unconsciously sway toward the left; alternate the movements, using your arms like a windmill. This is excellent for the muscles of the side, and for a torpid liver it is most effective.

If you suffer from nervous dizziness, turn the trunk only on the hips, and describe a wide circle from left to right, then from right to left. This is somewhat similar to the exercise aircady given for circling the body about the hips. All of the muscles about the hips as well as those of the abdomen are exercised, and the whole digestive apparatus is stimulated.

Its practice is very beneficial when there is inactivity in these parts. If you are troubled by nervous dizziness this exercise will help you, for by it you will get use, to turning your head in a circle. If this is hard to do at first, begin by performing it in a sitting position; you will then grow used to it by degrees.

Exercise for indigestion: Combine the exercise of jumping and hewing; spring from standing position into position with feet wide apart; at the same time bring arms quickly overhead; now bend to the floor, bringing the arms between the knees; then with another spring bend the arms to the side and the feet together in first position. Mix thoroughly and apply two or three times a day until the stain is removed.

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





THOMAS A. EDISON

The World's Greatest Inventor The eight hundred or more patents credited to Thomas A. Edison means one for every three weeks of his fifty-eight years, and even this calculation is unjust to his mechanical genius, for it does not include his many inventions which never ventured into the publicity that patents demand.

This wizard of invention was a model of precocity. Born at Alva, Ohio, he had only one teacher-his mother; at seven he became a wage-earner; at eleven he was reading Newton's "Principia"; at twelve he was a newsboy on the Grand Trunk Railway, and in an improvised laboratory in the baggage car he began to dabble in chemistry. A broken bottle of sulphuric acid filled the air with an odor that was unspeakable, and the cruel hands of the conductor registered his disapproval by a brutal blow on the ear of the young

disciple of science, which made him deaf for life. He soon learned telegraphy and became so expert that the most rapid operators on the line could not rattle him by their fiercest speed, and all taken down in his small, clear, copper-plate writing. He showed then the remarkable ability to meet any situation instantly and perfectly. When he was in Canada, and the terrible storms cut off all telegraphic communication, and it was necessary to get word to Sarnier, an American town across the border, he mounted a locomotive and "tooted" a telegraphic message again and again

His first patent was for a machine for recording votes for the State Legislature. It worked perfectly, but it was the very thing the Legislature most cordially did not want. In the same year he went to New York friendless, penniless, in debt, hungry, footsore and heart-weary at times, but with eyes wide open for chances. The Laws Gold Reporting Co., that reported stock transactions, had an accident that put all its machinery out of commission. Wall Street patrons fretted, chafed, grew frenzied at the delay. Young Edison diagnosed the difficulty, treated it instantly, and was at once known and recognized. A short time later he had a \$40,000 check in his pocket for a stock ticker he invented. Then real life began for him.

To tell of his inventions in a few lines is like seeking to condense a library into an epigram; but mention must be made of multiplex telegraphy, incandescent electric lighting, the phonograph, moving pictures, the microphone, the tasimeter, the odoroscope, electric pen, his storage battery, the megaphone, which list faintly suggests a host of others. 

SERVE OVSTERS

Of the many different ways for serving the oyster none will find more favor with the male members of the family than an oyster pie. Pare and cut into dice one quart of potatoes. Boil until tender, but not mushy, in boiling salted water. Put a layer of these in the bottom of a porcelain dish, then a layer of oysters, a sprinkling of salt and pepper and half a tablespoonful of butter cut into bits. Continue these layers until the dish is filled, having the potatoes last, dotted with bits of butter. Pour over this half a cup of milk and oyster juice. Cover with light puff paste and bake in a quick oven for about twenty minutes. Serve in the dish in which it is cooked.


