Toronto, Jan. 31.-A strike of telephone operators was suddenly precipitated today at noon, when the company asked the girls to sign an agree ment accepting new terms, or hand in their resignation. At once 250 girls walked out, leaving only one operator in the room. While this dramatic action was in progress, Manager Dunston was discussing the situation with Deputy Minister of Labor McKenzie King and John Armstrong, secretary of the provincial labor bureau.

The strike was called for Friday morning, but this action on the part of the management precipitated a crisis. There is at present not a 'phone in the city working.



The Two-Cent-a-Mile Figure Under Discussion.

# BORDEN'S RESOLUTION DEBATED

Letter From Judge Killam Deprecating Forcing the Hands of the

Ottawa, Jan. 30.-In the House of Commons this afternoon Mr. R. L. Borden brought forward the motion of which he had given notice, as follows: "That it is expedient that the board of railway commissioners for Canada inquire, determine and report with the least possible delay, whether or not the tolls charged in standard passenger tariffs should be reduced, so as not to exceed 2 cents per mile upon all or any of the railways of Canada; that the Government, under the provisions of the railway act, and especially the 24th section thereof, should forthwith take such steps as are necessary for this

purpose. In support of the motion he referred to the fact that some United States railways operated also in Canada, and the G.T.R., operating in Michigan, carried passengers boarding cars in that state at 2 cents per mile, under state law, while passengers boarding cars in Canada who traveled in the same train paid 3 cents a mile, Mr. Borden quoted the statistics of passenger traffic in Canada and the United States to show the average receipts per passenger per mile on the various railways. From the figures given it would appear an inquiry was desirable into the whole question, in view of public opinion that the rates should be reduced be low the current scale. There appeared to be little doubt the commission was overworked, and Mr. Borden suggested that there be a reorganization of that body; that an additional member be appointed, if necessary, and that the method of procedure by the supreme court be adopted by the appointment of a registrar. Members could then be relieved of a great many matters of rou-

Maclean Objects

Mr. W. F. Maclean disagreed with the leader of the Opposition, and contended that this being a question of policy rather than of statistics, Parliament itself should deal with it. 



# **EXODUS FROM** STRICKEN CITY

Was Found Somewhat Frost Bit- Epidemic of Contagious Disease Has Overwhelmed Health and Police Authorities of Chicago.

> Chicago, Jan. 30.—Contagious cases reported this morning: Scarlet fever, 407; diphtheria, 29; measles, 27; miscellaneous. 9.

Scarlet fever has broken out anew in Chicago with a virulence that makes it almost a scourge. Today 407 cases of the dreaded disease had been reported at the health department before 9 a.m. The outbreak is unprecedented in any American city. Diphtheria and measles continued in

a lesser degree throughout the city, but with little indication of being controlled by the health department. That the diseases may follow the upward sweep of the more dreaded disease is feared by physicians. The health department, already de-

moralized by exposals of the incapacity and inefficiency of its efficials, gave evidence today of its inability to cope with the epidemc. The department already is at war with the building department, and the


