Cattle Suffering Much Hardship at Winnipeg.

P. where cattle to be shipped east are suffering severely, and shippers are complaining bitterly of the tremendous loss occasioned by the shrinkage in weight when the cattle cannot be watered or fed for as much as 30 hours at a stretch. Receipts at the stockyards yesterday were exceptionally heavy, totalling nearly 2,000 head. There were 119 carloads due to arrive pefore midnight, most of which will have to stand on side tracks until room can be made for them. Mr. W. Cummings, shipper, from Yorkton, states that he lost \$2,000 on a shipment of 611 head from shrinkage due to the fact that they were in the cars from Wednesday to Saturday with food and water for only 24 hours, the usual time for the trip to Winnipeg. Mr. J. Lyons, of Minto, Man., declares that his cattle had to go 30 hours without water or food.

#### NINE CASES MONDAY FOR JUSTICE MULOCK

#### List of Varied Suits To Be Decided at the Non-Jury Sittings.

Ten cases were entered for the November session of the non-jury high court, commencing Monday, in the office of Mr. R. K. Cowan yesterday afternoon, but as the action of Whelihan vs. Kohoe has been settled out of court, but nine remain to be decided by Justice Mulock, of Toronto, when court opens.

The list includes two actions for damages, one to break a will, one for commission on the sale of patents, four for the recovery of money alleged to be due, and one for the transfer of money on deposit in banks to the son

of the dead depositor.

The settled action was one in which Charles E. Whelihan, of St. Marys, sued Judge J. J. the building as dangerous. PAVING PURPOSES The building is not sanitary," said Dr. Hutchinson. "I made a thorough inspection of the place today, and I found it unhealthy. There is not enough air space, and the ventilation is bad, I am making out my report on the building. I hope to have some radical changes made at an early date. When these are made there will be more fresh air, and a consequent improvement in conditions.

> Need More Fresh Air. "The court room is not a very pleasant smelling place at any time," said Chief Williams. "We need more fresh air. As a rule the class of people we get are quite odoriferous. It is not a sanitary building."



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#### FINGER PRINTS **CONVICT SLAYER**

Chicago Negro Is First To Be Found Guilty Solely on Such Lvidence.

Chicago, Nov. 10 .- Marking the first

conviction on finger print evidence in the history of this country, Thomas Jennings, a negro, Thursday was found guilty by a jury of killing Clarence A. Hiller on the night of Sept. 9. The jurors felt so confident of the guilt of Jennings that the first ballot resulted in a unanimous vote of conviction. with eleven of the jurers demanding the death penalty and one life imprisonment. On the third ballot the death sentence was made unanimous. Counsel for Jennings asked for a new trial on the grounds that the finger print evidence should not be allowed. As a result, it is probable that the supreme court will be asked to rule on the use of such evidence in criminal cases. Judge Kavanagh, who presided at the Jennings trial. declared when objection was first made to the evidence, that in

The Canadian Senate, by the letter of the constitution, has every power that the House of Commons possesses. except that of originating money bills, but the Senate has never blocked any important measures when the popular chamber has been determined to pass them. When an upper chamber insists on equality with a lower chamber in practice, as well as in theory, there is a constant risk of deadlock. The bicameral system can work smoothly only when one chamber has the ascendency. The second chamber must either be denied the absolute veto power, or it must be exceedingly cautious in its exercise, as e House of Lords has found to its sorrow. Because the Canadian Senate has been wary of crossing the House of Commons, it is facetiously described as a rubber stamp, merely registering the decrees of the popular chamber. But the Canadian Senate is in the nature of a contract between the provinces. It is doubtful whether Confederation would have been achieved without it. It cannot be abolished or radically amended without the consent of all the provinces. 



If there is one thing that an automo-ilist likes it is to have a car that can illimb hills. It doesn't seem to make so climb hilis. It doesn't seem to make so much difference to a man if his machine can speed it on the level. In fact, almost any car can do that. But what tickles the owner of an automobile is to have it go bang up a hill without hesitation and even to pick up in the middle of it and keep on getting faster. It stands to reason that a demonstrator who can tackle stiff hills and get away with them is going to sell more automobiles than one who merely shows what the machine can do on the flat. Economy tests, slight wear on tires and the other sort of talk don't make the hit with the intending purchaser that the ability to go zipping up a grade does. And if the demonstrator has the luck to catch some bigger car on a hill and get by it's a sold car for sure.

It may be said, though, that some persons aren't quite as careful as may be in the statements they make about the cars they are demonstrating. It's just as well for the intending buyer to be sure that "nigh gear means that, and not the highest gear there is in the car. Sometimes the highest gear means a pretty low one. A reputable concern doesn't do things like that. It couldn't stay reputable very long if it did. Anymeans that, and stay reputable very long if it did. 

#### SOCIALIST VOTE MAY TOTAL OVER 60,000

Hopper, the gubernatorial candidate of the Independence League, polled 39,839 votes in New York City, but as it is conceded that 80 per cent of the strength of the League is in this city, it is not be-lieved the total Independence vote will run much over 47,000.

While the Independence League vote shows a falling off, the Socialists claim that their vote in the state has doubled and that the increase in Connecticut will be 60 per cent.

From all parts of the country came reports of increased Socialist votes. and the local leaders believe their vote throughout the country will show an average increase of 60 per cent.
