CITY COUNCIL

Getting Ready for Hydro Electric--A Committee Named to Make Arrangements for the Duke of Connaught--The Lake Erie and Northern Route.

The City Council held their regular meeting in the Council Chamber last night, the Mayor and all the aldermen present. It was a very quiet meeting and a lot of business was transacted. The bill from the officers of the Dufferin Rifles for \$280 in connection with the recent riot was ordered to be paid, every alderman voting yes.

Mr. Pearce representing the Trades and Labor Council addressed the board for about twenty minutes during which time he explained the position the Labor Council took in municipal affairs. It was pointed out that a number of improvements in the city which he advocated are already under consideration by the different boards of the Council.

Board of Works.

The Board of Works made the following report:

1. That the city engineer be authorized to call for tenders for supplies required by the board during the year.

2. That the contract for cement for 1913 be awarded to the Ontario Portland Cement Co., at the rate of 5 cents less per barrel than their contract price of last year, and that the City Solicitor be instructed to draw the necessary contract and have the same executed.

3. That the sum of \$450 be paid to the Lock Joint Pipe company of 165 Broadway, New York, contractors for reinforced concrete pipe for the Rawdon Street sewer, in accordance with estimate No. 6 (final) of the City Engineer attached.

4. That the following communications be filed: W. H. Willis of Jan. 16; Bell Telephone Co., Dec. 20, 1912; Mrs. Augustine Hazelton of Dec. 27, 1912; T. J. Mines of Dec. 12, 1912; D. Subways.

Alderman Hollinrake said the Railway Board had the matter under consideration, but were not quite ready to report, but would probably be able to do so in the near future.

Lake Erie and Northern.

The petition from a number of ratepayers in the Holmedale was presented, requesting the Council to grant the Lake Erie and Northern the right of way through that part of the City, pointing out the much needed railway facilities for that district.

The Council then decided to hold a special meeting on Friday night for the purpose of considering the proposed route of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway. The Council will specially take up the matter re the right of way along Jubilee Terrace. The Council then adjourned.

MIGRATION CONFIRMED.

Egyptian Papyrus Corroborates Story of Forty Years' Wandering. An ancient Egyptian papyrus has been discovered which throws new light on the Exodus, the Bible story of the forty years' migration of the Hebrews from Egypt to the Promised Land.

The papyrus is a gazetteer of the principal places in the Eastern Delta of the Nile from which the migration took place. It has been translated by Prof. E. A. Wainwright, of Cairo, and the principal results of his translation are published in the last report of the Palestine Exploration Fund.

The papyrus mentions the places of the region in nearly the same order as they are given in the book of Exodus. The Israelites started from the delta of Goshen, which is proved to have been a district of the Eastern Delta called by the Egyptians "Goshen." Their march began at the town Ramesses, in Goshen, on the fifth day of the first month.

Their first halt was at Succoth, according to Exodus. The papyrus mentions this place with Pithon, a town mentioned in Exodus. The Egyptian expression is "Pe-Atum-ut," which may easily be identified with Pithon-Succoth.

The Israelites then proceeded south to Pi-hahiroth and encamped between Migdol and the Red Sea, over the waters of the Red Sea, as at this point the waters were dried. And the Children of Israel went in the midst of the sea upon the dry land, and the waters were a wall to them on their right hand and on their left.

And the Egyptians pursued and overtook them in the midst of the sea, and even all Pharaoh's horses, his chariots, and his horsemen. And the Lord said unto Moses, stretch out thine hand over the sea, and the waters shall come again upon the Egyptians, and upon their chariots and upon their horsemen.

And Moses stretched forth his hand over the sea, and the waters returned upon the Egyptians, and the Egyptians fled in front of them; and the Lord overthrew the Egyptians in the midst of the sea. And the waters returned and covered the chariots, and the horsemen, and all the host of Pharaoh that came into the sea after them; there remained not so much as one of them.
