## Legislatipr Councell Chamber, Twertiy-sixth day of March, 1835.

" ${ }^{\circ}$ "Resolved-That. His kate Majesty King George theThird laving been graciously pleased by message to both Houses of Parliament to express His Royal desire to be enạbled to make a permanent appropriation of lands in this province for the support and maintenance of a protestatat elergy within the same, provision was made for that purpose by $\mathbf{P a r}$ fiament in the statute passed in the thirty-first year of His Majesty's reign, Chap. 31. by dirccting a reservation of linds to be made and set apart in the proportion of all the lands that should be granted by Itis Majesty in the said province, and by declaring that all and every the rents, profits, cmoluments which might at any time arise from sucti lands so allutted and appropriated as aforesaid should be applied solely to the maintenance and support of a protestant clergy within the province, and to no other use or purpose whatever.

Resolved-That such allotments and appropriations as the act directs having been made from time to time, and conti:uing to be set apart under the designazion of Clergy Reserves, a claim was advanced in the year 1821 on behalf of the Church of Scotland, to be allowed to share in those reserves, or in the rents, profits orembluments to be derived frein tiem; which claim was inade and has been urged, upon the footing of a legal claim, grounded on the construction of the statute, and on the rights of the Church of Ecothind, its a dueth es. abliehed in one part of the Unitu Kindom.

## 2 Resoletions on the subject of the

Re:olved-That it has been advanced by other portions of the people of this proviace that all protestant denomiations have a right, in common with the Church of England, to have their clergy supported from the reserves in question, and that no exclusive right can be vindicated under the act, in favor of any ore or more protestant churches.

Resolod - That offorts have also been made to procure a total abolition of this provision for the suppert of religion, by obtaining ain act of the Provincial Leglslature, directing the saip of tie rescrves, and the appropriation of the proceects to purposes of general dincation.

Resoived-That by these confititag claims and opposing. riews, in regard to a snbiect of so great interest and impertance, the minds of His Majesty's subjects in this province hiave for a long period been rendered anxious and unsettled, and, in the opinion of the Legislative Council, it is for many reasons much to be desired, that a speedy and final settiement should take place of the questions which have arisen upon the effect of the enactments referred to, and that it should be phainly, cortainly and firmly established to what specifc objects the Clergy Reserves shall be permanently applied.

Resobued-That the Legislative Comeil, confiling in the wisdoim and jusicce of Ris Miajesty and the Imperial Parliamont, think it expodient and proper humbly to address His Majesty abd both Mouses of Parliament, representing that the Lezislatare of this Province has been unable to concar in any measures respecting the Clergy Reserves; and earnestly requesting that the Imperial Parliament will, with as little delay. as possible, make such an enactment on the subject as camos: appen to leavo any ronnt for doubt or question in regard to: tie objects to which the proceeds of the Clergy Reserves arg to be applied ; and that having rogatd to the present conditiow and futurs welfare of this colony, and maturely considering. whatever has been urged or may be wred in regard to these reseryes, they will, by some measure which shall be final and unecurocal, make such an appropriation of them as shall appear to be cuosi censistont with a due regard to religion, to the principles of our constitution, and to the permanent welface and tranquillity of the province.

Bivsounow of the Ifunse of Assembiy growing out of the
foregoing.
Resolver. - That this flouse fas ropeatedly expressed the oriwion that the lands appropiated for the support and main--
temace of a Protestant Clergy within this Province, censmonly called the Chrgy peserves, ought, for various reasons, to be sold; that it would be unjust to apply the monies arising from the salc of the same, to the beneft- of one or more favared religious denominations, \& that it would be impracticable, and from many coasiderations inexpedient, to distribute the nonies arising therefrom among all denominations, and that this Liouse has been unemitting ia its endeavors to procure the sale of these lands; and the application of the funds produced by such sale to objects of great impertance and interest to the prople of this Province; that with this vien, the House has heretofore repeatedly passed bills providingsor tie sale of the Clevgy lieserves, and the aprropriation of the monies atising therefrom to the support of edication, which bills have been rejected without amendment by the Legislative Counri!; that with the same view this House has repeatedly made known, by humblo and datifui axidress to His Majesty, their wishes and opinions, and the wishes and opinions of His Majesty's 'aitiful subjects in this Province on this highly important subject ; and this House take this opportunity of declaring that these wishes and opinions, both on the pari of this llesse and of their constiteents remain entirely un-changrd-that during the second session of the last Parliament, His Sxaclloncy the Licutenant Governor, hy message, informed this He:sce, that he had received inis Majesty's instructiens to declare that the representations whici had at different times been made to His Majesty and His Royal predecessors, of the prejudice sustamed by His Majcsty's faithful subjects of this Province from the appropriation of the Clerey Reserves had engaged His Majesty's mostattentive consideration, and His Majesty has most graciously beco pleased to invite the House of Assembly to cousider how the powers given to the Provincial Legisiature by the constitutional Act to vary or repeal the provisions which it comaine for the allotment and appropriation of the Cleagy Reserves couid be must adivantageously cxercised for the spiritial and temporal intercsts of his faithful subjects in this Proviace. That this House, in compliance with His Majosty's vishes thas graciously expressed. and with the strong and well known desires of His Miajesty's faithful subjects in this Province, has passed a bill during the present session to provide for the sale of the Cleorg Reserves, and to apply the monies arising from such sale to the support of education-that the Legishative Conacil stas rot passed the said hill-lias not amended $i$-and has not passed uny other bill on that subject. That under theso circunatances, this House cannot bet express the ext:eare astoniatment with which it bas received the represcmations of

Uhe Legislative Council-that the Legislature of the Province tras been unable to concur in any measure respecting the Clergy Resorves, and altho' this House has little expectation that the Legislative Council, as now constituted, will comply with the wishes of the people of the Province, yet it feels tound to declare that this IIouse is, and always has been, ready and anxious to concur in any just and reasonable measure whatever by which the Clergy Reserves' could lie applied to suche uscful purposes as would be most advantageons to His Majesty's faithful people in this Province, and most conformable towheir well known avishos-that this House cannot but express its confident hope, that. His Majesty will not be inidaced by any representation, whether secret or open, to dofart from the gracious intentions which he has been pleased to intipnate; of complying with the carnest and repeated solicitations of In is Majesty's faithful subjecta in this Proviace tun that subject-that this resolution be laial licfore His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and that His Excelloney be requested-to transmit the same to the Secretary for the Culonics, and call the carly attention of His Majesty's gov-rrnment to the importance of the same, to the interest, reace, welfare ${ }_{*}$ prosperity and happiness of His Najesty's faitluful perple of this Province.

## 13eport of Silect Committee on the Executive and Legisian tive Councils uf this Province.

## To the Hon. the Coinmons Howse of Assembly. :

The Select Committee appointed to enquire relative to the tenure on which the advisers of the Executive Government hold their offices, and the expediency of introducing the same practice in the administration of the Government of this Province as that acted upon in England, and also relative to the composition of the Legislative Council, have considered the same, and have agreed to the following report:-

- Your Committee have examined the Journals of the House of $\lambda$ ssembly for eleven years back, and find that, for scveral successive sesions, a bill passed through the House of Assembly, by-overwhelming majorities, repealing an act passed in: the 4 the year of the reign of His late Majesty-King George. the Tiir , entitled, "An Act for the better securing this Province amanst all seditions attempts or designs to disturb the tranq uillity thereef," by which law, any of His. Majesty's British b orn subjects, whether born in England, Ireland, or. Scotland: and not having essided in the provilure a cortain

length of time, might be ordered to leave the Province by any singlo Justice of the Peace, without trial; by Judge Jury-and in case such British suhject should neglect or refuse to obey his worship's Aespotic order was suthject and linble to be banishod for a term of seven years, for no other offence or crime charged or proved against him than disobeying the Magistrate's order.

Under this Jaw Robert Gourlay, Escq. a British korn subfect, was banished from this Province, on account of which the said law created an excitement and became obnoxious to the people of the Province; yet His Majesty's then Attorney General having a scat in the House of Assembly, was found standing alone, voling against the repeal of the said law, from the year 1824 until the year 1829, both inclusive, and even after Sir John Colborne, in lis speeeh iat the opening of the first session of the tenth Pa:liament, recommended to both Houses of the Legislature the repeal of the said laws the said Attorncy General voted againt fle repeal of the same, as if in defiance of the recommendation of His Majesty's Representative, and still continued to hold his office, and enjoyed his salary, until he was appointed Chicf.Justice and Speaker of the Hon. the Legislative Council, which took place in less than twolve months afterwards. Then again the measure for disposing of the Clergy Reserves for the purposes of education has, for the last eleven years, been loudly called for by the great body of the people, from one end of the province to the other, and for that purpose the representatives of the people have resorted to various measures, somerimes the passing of bills, and sometimes by a hamble address to the King, and even in the last farliament not more than one in ten of its members could be found to oppose sucil a disposition, yet, notwithstandiag the anxious wishes of the people, and notwithstanding the said disposition is fully authorised by the 31st Geo. 3rd., and notwithstanding His Najesty was most graciously pleased by Fis despatch transmitted to the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, and by him transmitted to this House, on the 2Jth Janaury, 1832, inviting the House of Assembly to consider how the powers given to the provincial Legislature by the said 31st of the King, can be called into exercise most advantageously for the spiritual and temporal interests of His Majesty's faitliful subjects in this Province, His Majesty's present Sol. General has been constantly most violently opposed to the said measure, and, that too, in a very small minority-as also in the like precicament, dur:ng the present session, on almost every important question-and which measures he has been pleased to denounce as most unconstintional and destructive of our form of goneriment,

Ahrolly shewing lis utine contempt, not only of the wishes Wf the people, but of Hi, Majesty's express wish and desire.

We camot but nutice aloo the very extraordinaty manner the said Solicitor General spoke of. and treated by his vote, the gespatch of Laod Goderich, Mis Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colenice, of the Sth November, 1832, recommending to the Government of this Province, varioces neeasures of reform which had been long sought fur by His Majesty's faithful poople in the Province: :- Vur Commitiee would not be linderstond as whing by any means to deny the. right of the advisers of the Provincial Government, or any viher persons who may have seats in the Holse of Assembly, to express their opimons fully and independenty, or to vote on any question as they may think proper and expedient; bat Your Committee submit that in the op inion it is नitogether incompatiblo with the spirit of our constitution that sach advisers of zoverament shonld continue to hold their ofisces and enjoy their salatics any longer than their views should be fornd to correspond witha majority of the representatives of the penple, in great leading and constitutimal nuestions, or that they should put thenselves in a factions opperition to the just wishes of the poople, and the advice of His Majesty'* Government.
Your Committee have also examined the Journals of this Hoase as well as thoso of the Honorable the Legislative Council, for the purpose of comparizg the proceeding with the proceodings of the Legislative Council relative to various important measures londly called for by the people, and calculated to advance their welfare and happinces. Your Committee woud observe that this llonse who have latored incessaitly during the present session fer the accomplishment of yrinus imporiant measures, many of which bave long been songht for by a laren majority of the people; some of which have recived His híajesty's gracious consideration and sanctoon, have passed and sent to the Hon. the Legislative Council, among others, the following hills:-To protect the agricultural interests of this Erovince from a ruibous foreign comperi-tion-to provide for the just and equal distribution of the ;ounerty of persons dying intestate-to sectre an impartial thial, by Jury, and to take foom the Shorin's, who hold their ofioes durng pleasme, the power which they now possess of paeking Juries-to rolicec an excellent and meritorious closs of His Majesty's subjects from burthens and penaties which are imposed by the Militia Laws of the Province, and which are oppressive on tiom, and which, in time of peace, are altogeher uaneessary-to improve the system of our Common ind Disxict Schools, and to increase the public lunds for heire

support-to amend the Charter of King's College, in conformity with His Mansty's gracious recnamentatiun, and with the wishes which bere at different times been strongly expressead by the people of this Province, so as to puthat instiation into operation on just and liberal principles-io provide fir the sale of the Clorgy Rescreve, and the appliation of the monies arising thesefrom to objects of common benefit and great utility to Ifis Majestys subjects in this Province, in accordance with His Majesty's rracious inviations, and with the well known and often expressed wishes of His Mamesty sub jects-to promote the peace, frecdum, and independenes of elections of mombers of Parlamont, by adopting the :avie , if voting by ballot-graiting \& $\mathbf{1 0 0}$ per annum to the Crantham and Bath Academies; institutions "s edseation cstablished hy the voluntary contribution of the peopls, and on liberal priaciples,-which bills have not been passed, wad hare not been amended by the LIon. the Leepiskitive Council, and, theraly the wishes and expentations of the great body of Itis Majesty's faithful pooplo have been disappoinud atal their confidence weakencd in the jasice or wisdom of His Majesty's Government, ne of the proper compurition of that bedy whose interests and feolings do not correspond and accord with the interests aud fecliors of the great majority of His. Majesty's sulyects, and, therefore, stand in the way of the wishes of the people.

Your Committoc beg to remark that it is :mpossible tosuppose that such a state of things can much lomerer exist ; that various important measures, long songht for by a vast majurity of His Majesty's fathful people of this Province, and weit calculated to adrance their peace, wolize and properily and some of which have obtaned the smetion and revinimendation of His Majesty's Government, and hat have been passed year after, by the representatives of the pophe, at a vast expense, shall be obstructed by the Legimative Comicil, which, athong some of its nembers possess the comfidonco of the comatry and are entisterl to their best thans, for the most part is composed of bishops. priess andother ocolerias-tics-ithe Chiof Justice, and various oher persons who, from the offee they hoid, are supposed to bo alogother under the control ard influence of the Execntive Government, and a few advisers of the Exerntive (dovernment, who have long lost the confidence of, and becore most obnowious to the people on account of thoir political opinions and sentiments, being opposed to the great body of His Majesty's subject: mad who do not follow the practice of Eughand under the circumstancesby resigning their situations as such adisers.

Your Comimittee log lave to report an address to His Mafesty on those important matters which they recommend to the favorable consiticration of Your Honorable House.

## Most Gracious Sovereign:

'Lhat in epply toan $\AA$ dhoss of his Bhise to His Lixollency the Lioutonant Govmper, we ane aformed that no answer bas boen received to our said
 Wats so dosumin a chas of Yoar Majesty's Snbjecte, and so inmons to the bist interests of the Colony, still cxist.

What in a luter adhosed wo Mis Exedliney Sir John Culmorn, by the How. George II. Marthand, Inopector Genempl of :his Pmpimen, dated Torono, May 15th, 1834 , publishod troment tho Prowne, and during the prexent Scssion trans-
 "ist tha order of May, 1852 , existed wihout being conhamel of and hownbe last, it then became noturiour, that Wha chins of the U. E. Loy lists were an article of trafici in the pullic marke". It dros not occur to us how it chit has wherwise tian lants should become "an asticle of tr. ficion the phbie markne" whon they are subject to swoll restrictions arcranty comel those to wham they are gramod, to dispose of then; conditans imposed on hem beiag so ramons as to wake thom utterly wahehess to any bul danlers in land. The records of the Combil and the recoris of the Surverar fianoml's office shew that free grants of hand wot located hato lame, siten tac frst sethement of the Province, an article of twe in the publig morkot, and that the Executive Councit of this Prothere beve not ouly recervitad the sate from aite original nominees, but have actually ondered the dreds to isSre in the name of assigneos or purclesare, and aniong the very naty testanes in whet this has bectodone, seme on tha


And your faithful Commons dempy regret, that the Inoperetor General of this Province shouht not have fully intermed himself of the fact, before giving publicity to his said! letter. By an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of your late Royal Father of glorious memory, entitled "An Act to afford relief to persons claiming lands in this Province under assignments from heirs, devisees or assignees of the original nominees of the Crown, in cases where no patent had issued, and for other purposes thercin mentioned." The Conmmissionars being the Chief Justice, the Justices of the Court of King's Bench, and the Members of the Excoutive Council, have not only conlirmed the sales, but the deeds from the Crown have in consequence 'issued to the purchaser or assignee:'
The Council lave uniformly recognized the assignments of grants of land and the deeds have issued in the name of assignees, it never having been considered improper to buy lands milocated any more than those located, until the Exccutive Council of this Colony first made the discovery-notwithstanding some of their predecessors in office have made large purchases in the same way, all of which were confirmed.

That although there may be instances where the original nominees have sold their grants at reduced prices to dealers in land-it has been altogether owing to the, restrictions attached to the bounty of your Royal Pather, of Glorious memory, by the Exocutive Council of Upper Canada-restrictions that it was impossible for them to comply with, conscquently they were reduced to the nocessity of solling while valuable lands were yet to be had, or, keeping their rigits, to so distant a period when the lands thon to be had were of little or no value.

That it is the opinion of your fuithful Commons the rights of dealers in land ('ill very lately recognized by the Executive Government, and the law of the land,) are and ought to be held as sacred as those of any other class of your Majesty's subjects.

Your faithful Commons therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be pleased to direct that an anower will be given to their said address, and that your Majesty will further direct, that copies of all communications from and with the Executive Government of the Colony, together with the opinoin of the Crown Officers on the subject of the aforesaid rishts be laid before this House at its next session.
