## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The Council of the Dominion Rifle Association have the honor to submit the Fifteenth Annual Report of the proceedings of the Association.

1. A reference to the list of Contributors to the Prize Fund will show that the anticipations of the Council, expressed in their last report, have, in consequence of the continued interest evinced by His Excellency the Governor General in the welfare of the Association, been fully realized.
2. The Council tender their acknowledgements-

To the Government and Members of the House of Commons, for the Annual Grant voted in aid of the Association.

To His Excellency the Covernor General and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, for the continuance of their liberal prize of $\$ 500$.

To His Excellency the Governor General, for his gift of silver and bronze medals to the several Provincial Rifle Associations of the Dominion.

To the Minister of Militia and Defence, the Honourable A. P. Caron, M.P., for his donation of $\$ 200$, and for the support which he has given to the Association.

To the Managers and Officers of the Intercolonial, Grand Trunk, Great Western and Canadian Pacific Railways, for the facilities and advantages afforded to competitors attending the meeting.
3. The Canadian Team again occupied its ground on Wimbledon Common, under command of Major Tilton of the Governor General's Foot Guards, with Captain E. A. Macnachtan, Cobourg Garrison Artillery, as Adjutant.

The report of Major Tilton, with full details of expenses and proceedings of the Team, is appended.

The record of the Team cannot but afford gratification, for though the Council are unable to report a victory in the "Kolapore" Match, they have the satisfaction of stating that Canada for the second time secured the coveted distinction of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales Prize, an honor second only in importance to that of winning the "Queen's."

To Lieut. Mitchell, 32nd Battalion, the winner, this honor is due.
The Council desire to draw attention to the success attained by Major Tilton, whilst in England, (vide correspondence page xxvii.) in obtaining on behalf of the Association, from the British Government, the loan of 75 Martini-Henry rifles of the special class issued to competitors in the "Queens," and that the thanks of the Association are due to Major Tilton for his thoughtful act, which cannot but be to the future advantage of the Association.

The disposition of these rifles, excepting the 25 which by direction of the Executive Committee have been placed in the hands of the members who will, or may, form the Team for 1883, to enable them to enter upon practice early in the spring, the Council leave to their successors.

To the Canada Club of London, England, the Council tender their acknowledgement for the handsome cup presented by its members to the Wimbledon Team,

Lieut. Mitchell, of the 32nd Battalion, having made the highest aggregate score at Wimbledon became the winner.
4. The Annual Prize Meeting held as usual on the Rideau Ranges, was opened on Monday the 4th September, and continued until Saturday the 9th September.

From the funds provided by subscribers, from entrance fees, and from the balance $(\$ 2,715.30)$ of the grant received from the Government after payment of the cost of the Wimbledon Team, the Council were enabled to offer a cash prize list amounting to $\$ 4,889.60$.

They had anticipated and provided for an increased attendance of competitors, but the assembling of the Military Camps at the same time as thet fixed for the Annual Meeting, combined with the pressing demands of trade on those employed in the main centres of business, prevented many from attending and caused a small decrease as compared with 1881.

Tha general result of the shooting in the ordinary Matches, considering the occasiona' unfavorable weather under which the competitors shot, was on the whole satisfactory.

The programme for the Meeting drawn up on the principle adopted last year (see page xii of the Report 1881) contained in addition to the usual class of competitions a Match for Team shooting in Military order under conditions framed to assimilate as nearly as possible, practice at the target with the conditions of active service.

To the Military Matches objection has been taken-by some-because of their Military character-and by others--because the Prizes were given to Sections or Teams, and not to Individuals.

The Council believing that such Matches should find a place in the programme of the Association, and that the points on which objection has been raised are essential to the success of any effort that may be made for the improvement of rifie shooting in the general body of the Militia, deem it right to enter more fully into the grounds of their action than they otherwise would have done.

The "Gzowski Cup" was presented to the Association in the year 1881, as a Challenge Cup, to be competed for annually under regulations which would tend to promote rifle shooting in Military Order.

In 1881, time not admitting of such arrangements being made as would give effect to the wishes of the Donor, the Cup was set down as a prize for individual shooting.

For 1882, however, not only the maintenance of faith with Col. Gzowski, but the growing opinion that the system on which Rifle Prize

Meetings was ordinarily conducted might be further extended to develope such practical knowledge of the difficulties met with in shooting on service, urged the Council to give their attention to the question.

With Col. Gzowski's approval, it was decided that the conditions of the Military Matches to be established should be framed to meet the following requirements.

1st. That Military Shooting should not be allowed in the loose dress, and with the many artificial appliances in vogue at Rifle Meetings.

2nd. That competitors should shoot in Military Order, Position, Dress, and with that minimum amount of kit as would be carried in the field.

3rd. That, as in the field, only a small portion of an enemies body would ordinarily be exposed to view, the height of the target should be reduced to 2 feet 6 inches.

4th. That to accustom men to fire with less delay than the ordinary target practice had given rise to, the targets should only be exposed to view for 15 seconds, such time being considered the maximum time which an active enemy would take to rise from behind cover, fire, and disappear.

5 th. That the skill of competitors should be tested at both known and as far as possible unknown distances, at known distances, in Individual and Volley Firing, at unknown and varying distances, in Skirmishing Order.

On these main principles the conditions were framed.

## The Targets adopted were :-

For 3rd class distances 4 ft . wide by 2 ft .6 in . high.
For 2 nd class distances 6 ft . wide by 2 ft .6 in . high, each being divided into 3 parts or horizontal bands.

The lowest band 15 in . deep representing the body and shoulders of a man exposed when firing over a target, scoring 5.

The middle band 10 in . deep representing the head and scoring 3 ;

The upper band 5 in . scoring 2.

Eleven representative sections took part in the competition with the following results :-

68 body hits. 38 head hits,

Total 115 hits $=76.67$ per cent

Of the 115 hits made 92.17 per cent. were planted on the target within an elevation of 25 inches, and 7.83 per cent. outside the 25 inch Jine, but within an elevation of 30 inches.

In the Volley Firing Competition at 400 yards, nine sections, firing in all 225 shots, made-

Of the 96 hits made 92.70 per cent. were planted on the target within an elevation of 25 inches, and 7.30 per cent. outside the 25 inch line, but within an elevation of 30 inches,

Nine sections firing, in all 450 shots, made-
151 body hits.
55 head hits.
18 upper hits.
Total 224 hits $=49.78$ per cent. 226 misses $=50.22$ per cent.

Of the 224 hits made 91.96 per cent. were planted on the target within an elevation of 25 inches, and 8.04 per cent. outside the 25 inch line, but within an elevation of 30 inches.

In the Military Match better results than those which wereobtained would be shown were more attention given to Aiming and Position dill, and to Volley firing exercises in the Ranks.
5. The Council feel that though by the liberality of individuals and careful husbanding of the funds they were enabled to offer so large a prize list last year, it will be out of their power to maintain it if the grant from Government is not restored to its original amount.
6. The cost of placing the ranges in order for the Annual Meeting, was this year materially increased by the effects of the past winter.

It was deemed advisable to render the range more secure by the erection of earthen parapets to catch shots striking the hill belind the targets and ricochetting on the lands beyond.

The system as faras completed answered well, but there is still room for improvement, and it will be necessary to continue and complete the work next season.
7. The Council cannot close their report without giving expression to their deep regret at the death of Lieut. Col. Stuart, who for the long period of 14 years filled with so much satisfa tion the position of Secretary to the Association.

## FINANCE.

The Treasurer's Finance statement, duly audited, is submitted.
Receipts from all sources, including the balance $\$ 254.77$ brought forward from last year, amounted to $\$ 14,947.82$, and expenditure $\$ 14,728.04$, leaving a balance of $\$ 219.78$ to the credit of the Association.

The annual subscription for the past year amounted to $\$ 186$, as against $\$ 190$ in 1881.

A reduction of the affiliation fee was authorized in 1882. Provincial Rifle Associations from $\$ 40$ to $\$ 25$ each, and for County and other Rifle Associations, from $\$ 20$ to $\$ 12$ each. The receipts from this source under the reduced fee, for the past year, amounted to $\$ 629$, to which may be
added the sum of $\$ 265$ received from Associate Members to qualify them for competition at the Arnual Matches under the new rule, making a total of $\$ 884$, as against $\$ 770$ in 1881 , increase under this head of $\$ 114$.

being an increase of 12 Rifle Associations as compared with last year.
The receipts from "special donations," including $\$ 865$ from Banks and $\$ 815$ from Manufacturers, amounted to $\$ 2,455$, as against $\$ 2,090$ received in 1881 , increase $\$ 365$.

Although the number of competitors at the Annual Prize Meeting this year was less, than in 1881, the net receipts from entry fees, including sighting shots, blow off tickets, post eutry fees and fines, were only $\$ 69.05$ under the amount received in 1881 , viz: $\$ 2,526.52$ net, as against $\$ 2,595.57$ in 1881 .

A detailed account of expenditure made by Major Tilton, Commanding Wimbledon Team of 1882 , will be found in the appendix.

## REPORT OF MAJOR TILTON.

## WIMBIMEDON TEAM, 1882

Ottawa, 1882.
Sir,-Having been entrusted with the Command of the Canadian Wimbledon Team for 1882, I beg to submit my report.

I felt at the outset that my task would be much lightened by the appointment as Adjutant of that Veteran Rifleman, Captain E. A. Macnachtan of the Cobourg Garrison Artillery. To his skill and experience gained on previous visits to Wimbledon as a competitor, I owe much, and desire at once to place upon record my obligation to that Officer for his watchful care of the Team's interests from the moment of his appointment till our work at Wimbledon was done.

Of the fifty competitors whose scores in the "Governor General's" Match rendered them eligible for places on the Team, three were disqualified under the twice in five years rule, one was passed over and nine declined, thus exhausting the list to the thirty-third name before the Team of twenty was complete.

The Provinces were represented as follows: eight (8) from Quebec, ten (10) from Ontario, one (1) from New Brunswick and (1) from Prince Edward Island. Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia, were unrepresented.

As soon as rifle practice was possible in the spring, a Martini-Henry Rifle and 200 rounds of ammunition was forwarded to each member of the Team, requesting that regular practice should be at once entered upon, and a return with particulars incident thereto made weekly to the Adjutant.

The response to this circular was not as hearty and satisfactory as I could have wished, and I shall later on submit for the consideration of Council some suggestions having in view more practice for future Teams before they embark for Wimbledon.

As ordered, the members of the Team reported at the Brigade Office, Queber, on Friday morning, June 23rd, and after inspection and signing the usual agreement a considerable number were, through the kindness of Lieut. Col. Duchesnay, enabled to spend the remainder of the day in practice at the Levis Range.

The following morning, at nine o'clock, found the Team drawn up in line on board the good ship "Poly nesian," awaiting a previously arranged visit from His Excellency the Governor General, who, on arrival, in a speech replete with good advice and encouragement, wished the Team success and a safe return to their homes. The members were then in turn presented to his Excellency.

The voyage across the Atlantic was all that could be desired, and for the kindness of Capt Brown and his officers, the thanks of the Team ar heartily due.

Liverpool was reached on Tuesday, July 4th, and at 10 a.m., and after the customary delay in landing, the Team proceeded by the North Western Railway to Wormwood Scrubs, at which place through the kindness of Adjutant Bircham, St. George Rifles, practice had been arranged for during the remainder of the week. Owing, however, to the constant rain and the limited capacity of the range, there being no opportunity for practice beyond six hundred yards, the result was somewhat discouraging. Acting upon the suggestion of Lieut Col. Gibson, M.P.P., my immediate predecessor in command, I do not think it necessary to publish the practice scores.

The President of the Dominion Rifle Association being in England some weeks previous to the atrival of the Team, had, with that thoughtful consideration which has for so many years characterized his interest in the Association's welfare and success, completed most of the camp arrangements for the Team, so that on reaching Wimbledon from the Scrubs on Saturday p.m., the 8th July, we found the Canadian tents pitched and ready for occupancy, while the camp ground had once more, under the artistic hand
of Messrs. Thomson, been transformed into a garden of foliage and flowers. The Monday following, July 10ih, the work of the meeting commenced, and I shall briefly refer to those events of the following two weeks which seem incidental to this report.

The amount paid as entry fees, it will be observed by reference to the accounts, is considerably less than in some former years, and the reason for this is that while entries were made for all competitions in which the "Snider" Rifle was used, it was deemed inexpedient in view of the limited practice by members of the Team at short ranges, and in most cases none at the longer ones, to enter generally in "Martini-Henry" Matches ; and I may here state, that realizing keenly the disadvantage in this particular under which Canadians labored, and judging from opinions freely expressed by those in authority at Wimbledon, that the days of the Snider Rifle were numbered, I ventured in the hope of relieving future Teams from a similar disadvantage to address the Secretary of State for War, asking for the Dominion Association a loan of "Martini-Henry" Rifles of the most approved patron. The correspondence consequent upon my request, which was graciously complied with, is submitted herewith, and it now rests with the Council to say how the seventy-five rifles obtained, shall, with most advantage to the Association, be distributed.

I desire through the medium of the Annual Report to express the great obligation I am under to Colonel North, M.P., of Putney Hill, for his untiring interest in the success of my application to the War Department, and for personally placing in the hands of the Right Hon. Mr. Childers, my first letter having reference to the loan.

The scores of the Team in the several Matches in which they competed, are appended, and although the record shows no brilliant ones, it must not be assumed such results were exceptional to the Canadians, as low averages generally prevailed.

The following comparative table of winnings during the eleven years in which we have been represented at Wimbledon, shows the Team of 1882 to stand at the head of the list and to number among its prizes that of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, considered at Wimbledon second only to the Queen's, and which has but on one previons occasion come to Canada.


During the meeting the weather was most unfavorable to steady shooting or high scores, and its effect, not only on the averages of the Canadian Team, but of the whole body of the competitors, is shown in the appended comparative table of the scores in a few of the principal com. petitions of 1881-82.

Rifle shots well know that a bare comparison of winning, or even average scores, except under equal conditions of weather, heat, light and wind, is altogether misleading and useless.

Believing, however, that to Riflemen generally, a comparison of the shooting of each year's Team with that of its predecessor would be both interesting and instructive. I am, with the valued aid of the Secretary of the D. R. A., enabled to submit a method by which it appears that a figure representing the percentage due to the varying conditions of the weather for any two years, either in favor of or ayainst good shooting, can be obtained, and a reasonably accurate comparison rendered possible.

From a comparison of the lists of the first 100 winners in the principal competitions at Wirabledon it appears that year after year the majority of the prizes fall to the same men-hence any variation apparent in the averages they make one year with another-may fairly be set down to the varied state of the weather in which they shoot, an assumption it may here be stated, borne out by the carefully prepared meterological reoord pub. lished in each year's N. R. A. report.

On this assumption it is suggested that by calculating the averages of the first 100 winners in the same competitions for each year under comparison, and deducting the average of one year from the other, a figure will be obtained closely representing the difference, common to the whole body of riflemen engaged, and in the main due to weather.

Then by similarly calculating the averages of each Canadian Team in the same matches for its year, and adding or substracting as the case may be, the common difference noted in the shooting of the general body of the competitors at Wimbledon for the year, their relative averages would be obtained and comparison rendered possible.

Applying this proposition to the shooting at Wimbledon in the years 1881 and 1882.

1. To ascertain the common difference in the shooting of the general body of the competitors at Wimbledon, taking the following principal prizes as an example :-

2.-To compare the Shooting of the Canadian Teams of 1881 and 1882 in the same Prizes.


These views are submitted not solely to show that the Team of 1882 acquitted itself creditably, but rather to direct attention to a question replete with interest to Riflemen, and with the hope that others may carry out its solution.

More than usual interest was attached this year to the Kolapore contest, from the fact that for the first time there were four competing teams, viz. :-The Home, the Canadian, Jersey and Guernsey. For convenience of reference the scores and names of competitors are published, and it is not without regret that I am obliged to record the Canadian as havinc only won the second place. This match, as is usual, was shot on Wednesday of the second week of the meeing, and the weather, if possible, was more unfavorable than on the preceding days, the meteorological record shows the velocity of the wind to have been on that day twenty-two miles an hour, as against a velocity of two and three-quarter miles in 1881, while the average velocity during the meetıng in the last named year was seven miles an hour, against fifteen in 1882. The match was lost to our Team at the 200 yards range, and although they struggled gallantly on at the long ranges, and at 600 yards reduced the lead of the Home Team by eight points, they were beaten by sixteen points, the Jersey being third, and Guernsey fourth. At the conclusion of the match I congratulated Líut. Col. Wilson, the Captain of the Home eight on the well won victory

of his team. This officer gracefully acknowledged the congratulations extended him, and proposed three cheers for the Canadian, Jersey and Guernsey Teams.

On Tuesday the 8th July, their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales honored the Canadian Camp with a visit; the Team paraded to receive them, when his Royal Highness expressed the pleasure it gave him to see a representative team from Canada once more at Wimbledon, referring to the pleasant recollections he had of his visit to Canada, and expressed much satisfaction that his own prize should have been won by a Canadian. Lieut. Mitchell was then called to the front, when the Princess graciously pinned the Prince of Wales' Badge to that officer's breast.

The Duke of Cambridge, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and the Duke and Duchess of Alba' $y$, having signified their intention of visiting the Camp on the occasion of the Garden Party given by Col, Gzowski, A.D.C., on Thursday, July 20th, the Team was again paraded to receive the distinguished visitors. Both the Commander in Chief and the Duke of Connaught addressed the Team, after which each member was presented to the Commander in Chief.

The Canada Club of London having intimated its intention of presenting a Silver Cup to the member of the Canadian Team making the highest aggregate score at Wimbledon, advantage was taken of this occasion to make the presentation to the winner, Lieut Mitchell. In the absence of the President this was done in most felicitous terms by Mr. Gillespie on behalf of the Club. It being intimated to me that it was not improbable the Club would next year repeat its generous gift, I took the liberty of suggesting that it might be competed for in a special match by the Team at Wimbledon during the second week of the neeeting, when ample time and target accommodation would be available for the purpose. This suggestion was very favorably received by the Secretary of the Club, Mr. Molyneux, and I feel quite sure my successor in the command will find that it has taken practical form.

I cannot too strongly urge upon the Council the necessity that exists for providing more and systematic practice for future Teams before sailing for England. With it I see no reason why a Canadian should not be

carried in triumph to receive Her Majesty's prize ; without it I feel they never can hope to win this distinction, one which I am convinced would be hailed by all classes at Wimbledon with delight. It has been demonstrated that practice at Altcar is misleading, that at Wormwood Scrubs but partially satisfactory, individual practice before sailing not less so, and now that the want of proper Martini-Henry Rifles can no longer be pleaded in extenuation for neglect of practice, I would suggest that next year's Team meet either at Montreal or Ouebec, at whichever long range practice can be secured, at least a week before the date of sailing. Let this be considered as taking the place of Altcar. The cost to the Association need not exceed two hundred and fifty dollars, while the result would be beneficial to the meu, both in increased confidence and scores. I am strengthened in this opinion by the fact having come to my knowledge that but little, if any, practice is maintained by some Wimbledon men after winning their places on the Team in September till they reach England the following July.

The proceedings at Wimbledon were brought to a close on Saturday the 22nd of July ; the prizes being presented in the presence of a large and distinguished assemblage by Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Albany. As Lieut. Mitchell ascended the dais to receive the Prince of Wales Prize, and other members of the Team their respective winnings, they were loudly cheered.

On returning to the Team's Headquarters, my presence was requested in the President's Tent, where an address, a copy of which is transmitted herewith, was pre ented to me by Capt. Moore, signed by the members of the Team. The occasion afforded me an opportunity of expressing to the nembers of the Team what I had intended to convey to them in Camp Orders, and which it gives me infinite pleasure to record here my high sense of the zeal shown in the work they had to do, the unanimity and good feeling which on all sides prevailed; their ready and willing obedience to orders, which not alone has earned the thanks of the Dominion Rifle Association, but permits me to say Canada has a right to be proud of a Militia Force from which can be drawn, representing as it did every arm of our service, a Team of Riflemen such as that it was my good fortune to command.

The accounts and vouchers of the expenses in connection with the

Team have been placed in the hands of the Treasurer. It will be observed that the expenditure has been kept at the lowest possible point.

To the Commandant of the Camp and the Officers of the National Rifle Association on duty at Wimbledon I desire, both for myself and the Team, te acknowledge many courtesies during our sojourn there; and my best thanks are also due to .John Ennis, Esq., of Messrs. Allan Bros. \& Co., and John Dyke, Esq., Canadian Government Agent at Liverpool, as weil as to Jas. G. Colmer and F. J. Dore, Esquires, of the Canadian High Commissioner's Offices, London, for deeds of kindness not to be forgotten. To the London Correspondent of the Toronto Globe, I am also much indebted, for the very full reports of the Team's work communicated by cable daily to that Journal.

The whole Team remained cheerfully in camp during the meeting, and evinced an acquiesence in the regulations as to Uniform and Camp Orders, which were very commendable.

For the prominence which the Canadian Camp has attained on Wimbledon Common, the Dominion Rifle Association owe much to their President. His presence in camp this year was on all sides a source for congratulation, especially so to the members of the Team and myself.

It must not be supposed that the object of a Canadian representation at Wimbledon has no wider significance than that of competing at the great Rifle Tournament. From the Camp many pamphlets issued by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa and having reference to Immigration, were circulated, Maps of Manitoba and the North-West Territory were exhibited, and general information as to our country disseminated.

In conclusion, I desire to express the hope that each succeeding year, on the occasion of the National Rifle Association's Matches at Wimbledon, may find Canada represented, and the Dominion Flag waving over "The old Camp Ground.

Sir,-Having had the honor to command the "Canadian Team," which competed at the Wimbledon Meeting last month, I had the opportunity of closely watching the different contests, the results of which, coupled with previous observations, convince me that our Canadian Riflemen can never hope to win a first place at the meetings of the National Rifle Association unless provision is made for their practice with the "Martini-Henry," that being the Rifle used in the contest for the "Queen's" and other principal prizes at Wimbledon.

As you are, of course, aware the Militia of Canada is armed with the Snider Rifle, and as a proof that our riflemen have beeome efficient in its use, I beg to state that twice within the past six years they have won His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales' Prize.

My object in writing is to respectfully ask that a loan of fifty of the latest pattern " Martini-Henry" Rifles, with earefully adjusted sights, be granted to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, of which His Excellency the Governor General is the Patron.

I name fifty for the reason that this is the number of competitors in His Excellency's Match shot annually at Ottawa, from which each year's Wimbledon Team is selected.

Colonel Gzowski, A.D.C., President of the Dominion of Canada Riff ${ }_{e}$ Association is in London, and I am permitted to say holds himself in readiness to furnish any obligation that may be required in connection with this application.

In view of the large expenditure incurred annually in sending a Canadian Team to England, coupled with the unselfishness and patriotism of our men in coming so great a distance without remuneration, to take part in the Wimbledon contests, I venture to hope that you may be enabled to favorably consider my request and thus place within reach of our Riflemen, the honor of taking to a loyal colony, Her Majesty's Prize.

The second Annual General Meeting of the Association was held in the Drill Shed, Cartier Square, Ottawa, on Tuesday, 5th September, 1882.

There were also present about 100 members, competitors at the meeting.

Col. Kirkpatrick opened the proceedings by stating that the meeting was called in pursuance with the Constitution to enable members to submit suggestions.

Capt. Balfour suggested that the Council should endeavour to make arrangements so that the regular matches of the meet.ng should be carried on with less delay than had occurred during the present meeting. He stated that this year the shooting so far as it had proceeded had been concluded by 4.30 to 5 p.w. each afternoon.

Major Mudge wished that the meeting should commence on a Tuesday instead of Monday, and thought that it would save considerable expense to competitors coming from a distance.

Lieut. Flynn opposed the idea, and maintained that it was preferable that the matches should conemence on Monday, which would enable their being finished by Saturday. He also desired that firing should cease during exceptionally bad weather.

Col. Laurie favoured the commencement of the matches on Monday, and said he spoke for the Nova Scotians.

Capt. Costin spoke upon all the questions raised, and explained the reasons for the present course pursued.

Sevoral competitors favoured the ides of making some changes in the method of marking, which would enable a man to know with less delay than at present whether he had hit or not.

Capt. Balfour desired some alteration in the squadding, so that members would not have to wait for their turn to shoot.

Dr. McLaughlin asked that the Skirmishing Match should be opened to individual competitors.

Capt. Hartt moved, seconded by Lieut. Flynn-
That in the opinion of the meeting it was undesirable to continue the present custom of excluding from the Wimbledon teams members who had been over twice in five years, and the motion was carried by a large majority.

Lieut. Bruce desired that in future the Association should be guided in the positions adopted at the different ranges by that in vogue at Wimbledon for the time being.

Also, that when a competitor was interrupted in his firing by the Luncheon and Evening Guu fire, or from any cause resulting in the general stoppage of firing, he should be allowed a sighting shot before being called on to complete his score.

After a vote of thanks to Col. Kirkpatrick, the meeting dissolved.

## REGULATIONS

## DOMIINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION,

## FOR THE YEAR 1882:

The Prize Meeting of the Association will be conducted under the direction of five members of the Executive Committee specially appointed for the purpose, three of whom shall be a quorum ; and their decision will be final, conclusive and binding in all matters submitted to them for consideration, but they may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Committee shall be final.

## NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as also with the Conditions of any Match for which they have entered, as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.
2. They must refer to the Notice Board morning and afternoon to ascertain whether orders have been issued altering the original detail of the shooting, or affecting them personally.
3. When at the firing point they must comply with all orders given by the Executive Officer or the Range Officer in charge.

## 1.-GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I. No Active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than one corps.
II.-No Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or Private employed by the D.R.A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts, shall shoot either for a prize or for practice.
III.-In competitions restricted to Active Militiamen, or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn, via :-
a. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigue jacket.
b. Trousers.
c. Regimental head dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it. Cap covers or puggarees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and greatcoats or waterproofs over uniforms.

Officers of a corps must all appear dressed in the same order, as must also non-commissioned officers and privates. Where a duly authorized undress for officers exists, they (the officers) may appear in it, although the non-commisioned officers and privates may be in full dress. Waist or cross-belts need not be worn.
d. In "Military Match" competitions special details for dress will be issued.
$e$. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear either in complete uniform or wholly in plain clothes.

Any objection on the score of a conapetitor's dress must be raised before he takes up his position to shoot.
IV.-Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection whenever required.
V.-Hair triggers will not be allowed.
VI.-Fixed artificial rests will not be allowed, except in the Skirmishing Match.
VII.-Competitors shall only use the mats and sheets provided by the Association. Cork beds and elbow rests shall not be allowed.
VIII.-In compatitions open to "Any Rifles," the competitors may wipe out or clean their rifles during a competition, provided they do not delay the squad by so doing. In ordinary competitions, restricted to "Military breach-loaders," this will not be allowed except between the distances in the competition.
IX.-When a breach-loader is used, the competitor must not load until he has taken his position at the firing point, and the Register Keeper has given the word "All clear."
X.-Competitors may " blow off" in the pits at the firing points only before firing, and after the presentation of a "blow-nff" ticket to the Register Keeper.
XI.-Slings may be used in all Matches, but when the competition is restricted to military breech-loaders the slings must be of the Government length and pattern, white, brown or black, and attached to the rifles as in Government arms.
XII.-In Individual Competitions. A competitor nay use a binocular or telescope, not mounted on any kind of stand, provided bis doing so causes no delay in the shooting.
XIII.-After a competitor has taken his place at the firing point, no person except the Register Keeper or an Officer on duty, will be permitted to speak to him.
XIV.-No coaching of any kind will be permitted in any match where both team and individual prizes are being competed for.
XV.--In Team Matches.--The members of a team shooting together will be permitted to "coach" or "spot" for each other, and to use binoculars or telescopes for that purpose, provided their doing so does not delay or impede the shooting. The duly recognized Captain or Adjutant of a team, although not himself shooting, will be permitted to assist his team in like manner, and to appoint a spotter to assist him. With the above exceptions no other persons will be allowed within the ropes.
XVI.-Any violation of these rules, or any part of them, must be at once reported by the Register Keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and on any repetition of the offence shall report the same to the Executive Officer, to be dealt with by the Executive Committee as laid down under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.

## 2.-PENALTIES-DISQUALIFICATION.

XVII.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fire in a name other than his own; or
(b) Who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so ; or
(c) Who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target; or
(d) Who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind, to an employee of the Asscciation, under any pretence whatever; or
(e) Who being cognizant of any attempt to defraud the Association shall fail to report the same with due diligence to the Council or Executive Committee ; or
$(f)$ Who shall be guilty of any conduct which the Executive Committee may consider discreditable ; or
(g) Who shall be reported to the Council or Executive Committee as having been elsewhere guilty of such conduct or the aforesaid offences ; or
(h) Who shall directly or indirectly make any arrangements with any other competitor for pooling or dividing any prize,
Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Council or Executive Committee, or on the receipt of such report from any affiliated or duly recognized Association, forfeit all his entrance fees and prizes, and be disqualitied from conpeting at any Prize Meeting of the Association, until reinstated.

## EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE meeting.

## XVIII.-Any Competitor-

(a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up; or
(b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range except in accordance with the regulations for shooting ; or
(c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle, except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing; or
(d) Who from a proper want of care discharges his rifle accidently. [If such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given]; or
(e) Who shall fire a pool shot before delivering his ticket to the Register Keeper ; or
$(f)$ Who shall alter or make any erasure on his firing ticket; or
(g) Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous, Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the Meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fees.

## DISALLOWANCE OF SCORES.

XIX.-Any competitor-
(a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize ; or
(b) Who shall infringe on any of the instructions and regulations for the conduct of the Meeting while shooting for any particular
prize ; or
(c) Who, when competing for the Grand Aggregate shall fail to fill up the aggregate score ticket, or shall enter his scores incorrectly, or shall fail to deliver the same to the Statistical Officer within one hour after the conclusion of his firing in the last
match,

Shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, have lis score for that particular pize dissallowed, and if such disallowance refer to the Grand Aggregate, he shall also forfeit all claim to shoot in the Governor General's Match.

> XX.-FINES.

## Any competitor-

Who in "blowing off" shall fail to go close up to and point his rifle into the pit provided for that purpose ; or who shall "blow off" when the danger signal is up ; or who shall accidentaly fire at the wrong target, shall be fined one dollar, to be paid forthwith to the Range Officer.

In cases where a competitor is "excluded from further competition," or where his "score is disallowed," for any particular prize, the circumstances only under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the Name of the individual implicated.

In cases of "disqualification" the name of the offender as well as the particulars of the case shall be posted on the notice board.

## XXI.-MITIGATION OF PENALTIES.

The Executive Committee shall have power to mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

## XXII.-PRIZE WINNERS.

Unless otherwise specified, no one will be allowed to take more than one prize in any competition.

XXIII,-Winners of prizes must apply for their certificates at the Statistical Office, and on signing the receipt attached thereto will receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the D. R. A.
XXIV.-If a formal presentation takes place, winners, being Active Militiamen, must parade in the full dress uniform of their corps.

## XXV.-DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

## XXVI.-MARKING.

1. The marking will be as follows :-
a. Bull's Eye
b. Inner.

White disc.
c. Magpie

Red disc.
d. Outer.

Black and White disc.
e. Ricochet... . Black disc.
Black bar.
f. Misses will not be signalled; but if a target is lowered under the impression that it has been hit, and if no hit is found on it, after raising it the marker will wave a black dise, which will signify a miss.
2. When tro shots strike a target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be marked with the marking disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with that shot, provided he has fired. Both hits will, however, be shown by
spotting dises.
3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, and its value, will be shown by the spotting dise when the target is again raised.
4. The marking when signalled shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the Officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable doubt exists as to whether the shot may not have struck the target, he may ask the Officer in charge at the butt to examine the target, and the result of such examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of fifty cents with the Officer in charge at the firing point, which shall be forfei ed in case no hit is found on the target.
5. All alterations of the registers must be initialed by the Officer $m$ iking them, but no alterations, except in the case of a clerical error, shall be made without his having $f$ st signalled to the butt.
6. No person will be permitted to go to and examine a target during the meating except the Executive Officer or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

## In Skirmishing.

When the number of hits counted on the targets exceeds the number of shots allowed in the competition, three marks shall be deducted for
every such hit in excess of the number of such shots, unless it be proved that such hits on the targets in excess of the number of shots allowed could only have been made by competitors in the squad firing more than the authorized number of rounds, in which case the squad shall be disqualified.

## XXVII.-RIFLES.

The rifles shall be classed as follows :-

## CLASS I.

## Military Breech-Loaders.

Snider, (Long and Short) rifles and Martini-Henry rifles, either of Government issue or of bona fide Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

1. Weight of Snider not to exceed, without bayonet, 9 lbs .12 oz . Weight of Martini-Henry, without bayonet, not to exceed 8 lbs . 12oz.
2. No pad or shoe for the heel plate of the butt will be allowed.
3. Minimum pull of trigger 6 lbs .
4. Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Goverment issue. Filed sights will not be allowed.
(a) All sights may be temporarily blackened or whitened, but no application of a permanent nature will be allowed. No shading of sights will be permitted.
(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at any angle by any extemporized means.
(c) The sliding bar may be reversed, and used on either side of the uprights. One permament centre line for the Snider, and three for the Martini-Henry will be allowed, and temporary marks or lines of any kind removable at pleasure may be used.

## CLASS II.

## Any Rifles.

1. Weight-Maximum, 10 lbs .
2. Pull of Trigger-Minimum, 3 lbs .
3. A pad or shoe for the heel plate may be used.
4. Any description of sight, except telescopial and magnifying, may be used.

> XXVIII.-AMMUNITION.

## 1.-In Competitions Restricted to "Military Breech-loaders."

(a) None but the ammunition issued by the D. R. A. on the ground shall be used or allowed. Price for Snider, 17 cents per package of 10 rounds, or 3 packages for 50 cents. Price for Martini, 25 cents per package of 10 rounds.
2.-In Competitions open to "Any Rifles"-

Any ammunition may be used. Competitors will be required to bring their own supply.

No restrictions will be made as to the arrangement or composition of the charges or cartridges, provided that, in the case of Breech-loading Rifles being used;
(a) No part of the charge is inserted at the muzzle.
(b) That the rifle is not loaded until the word "all clear" is given.
(c) That no time is lost.
(d) That no dangerous practice is resorted to.
XXIX.-POSITION.

Unless otherwise specified the shooting at all ranges shall be from the firing points, and may be in any position, with the head to the target.

## XXX.-ORDER OF SHOOTING.

1. Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time detailed on their their tickets, otherwise they will not be allowed to shoot ; the time to be regulated by the clock in the Secretary's office.

In all ordinary competitions competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by files, and fire shot and shot alternately.

Where but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots without undue delay; but the Officer in charge of the firing point, or some person named by him, must witness the shooting, and countersign the register. Failing such verification the score will be invalidated. Any person present whom the competitor may name will watch the score recorded, and if need be raise objection before the next shot is fired.

In competitions restricterl to "Any Rifles," the competitors shall be formed in a squad, and fire shot for shot in the order in which their names are called.
5. No one will be allowed to join the squad, after the commencement of the second competitive round.
6. When once a competitor has joined a squad, he shall not leave it before he has either retired from the competition or has completed his firing, but leave may be given by the Officer in charge to any competitor who, when firing with a muzzle loader, may find it necessary through a mistake in loading to fall out for the purpose of "blowing off."
7. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle; nor shall a competitor change his rifle at any range during a competition, unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by the Officer in charge.
8. The competitor must, after delivering each shot, pay attention to the score called out by the Register Keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the register, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the next shot is fired.
9. In the case of nnreasonable delay in firing on the part of any competitor, or of such delay as the Range Officer may consider likely to prolong the firing beyond the time allowed, the Range Officer shall have the right to caution and time the competitor by a sand glass, purporting to run one minute, more or less, and if after such caution the competitor does not fire before the sand glass has run out, the Range Officer shall declare the shot forfeited and call on the next competitor to proceed with his firing.
XXXI.-TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows:-

## A. In Individual Competition for a Series of Prizes.

1. If at more than one distance, by the range totals in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest nagpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the value of each shot in inverse order.
6. For Money Prizes, by division.
7. For Prizes in Kind, by shooting off; as in Clause B.
8. In the case of a Prize Part in Kind and Part in Money, by shooting off for the Prize in Kind, and dividing the Money.
N.B.-In all competitions the order of the winners shall be decided by the foregoing rules if possible, but in the case of absolute ties the names shall be arranged alphabetically and bracketted.
B. In Individual Competitions for a single Prize.
9. By the aggregate score in three rounds at the longest distance.
10. By firing single shots until decided.

Absentees shall forfeit their claim to shoot.

## C. In Team Competitions.

1. If at more than one distance, by the aggregate range totals in inverse order.
2. By the fewest outers.
3. By the fewest magpies.
4. By the fewest inners.
5. By the highest scorers in each team shooting off, as in Clause B.
D.-Grand Aggregate.

Ties for the first place to be shot off, as in Clause B.
For other places :-

1. By the total score in each match in inverse order.
2. By the tctal scores at 600 yards.
3. By the total scores at 500 yards.
4. By the total scores at 400 yards.
5. By the totail scores at 200 yards.
6. By shooting off as in Clause B.

Ties for places on the Wimbledon Team shall be decided by the rules for the Grand Aggregate. In the Governor General's Match ties for the first three places and for the tenth place shall be shot off.
E.-In Cases not Met by the Foregoing.

1. By any special rules attached to the conditions.
2. By the fiat of the Executive.

## XXXII.-ENTRIES.

The Executive Committee reserve to themselves the power of refusing any Entry for any Match, or for cancelling at any moment any entry that may have been previously accepted.

The right of Entry is restricted to members and Associate members of the Association, who either, have paid or pay their subscription of $\$ 1$ at the time of entry.

1. Entries for the several competitions shall close on days to be named by the Council.
2. Every competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and not oftener than once for any prize, unless specially allowed by the terms of the competition.
3. No entry shall be accepted after the hour fixed for the commencement of the competition to which admission is sought.
4. Entries shall be classified :-
(a) Ordinary (at the published rate of entrance fee). To include those made and received by the Secretary of the D.R.A on or before 4 p.m., Wednesday, the 30th August.
(b) Post (at an increased charge of 20 per cent. on the published rate of entrance fee). To include those made or received after 4 p.m., Wednesday, 30th August.
N.B.-The acceptance of Post Entries will be entirely governed by circumstances. As a rule the privilege will be withdrawn as soon as the target accommodation alloted for each competition is absorbed, and whenever the Special Executive Committee may determine.
5. To meet the case where difficulty may be experienced in selecting the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries by the 30th August, Officers commanding Corps and Secretaries of Provincial or Local Associations will be permitted to send in their application for (state No.) competitors, accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fee ; and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make their entries until the selection of the competitors is definitely made. In such cases the Register Tickets shall not be issued before the nominal return is handed to the Secretary. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated of Entrance Fees."
6. Entrance fees must be paid at the time when the entries are made. The Register Tickets will be issued on application at the Secretary's Office on the Range.

## XXXIII.-RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

1. Entrance fees in full will be returned to those-
(a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting; or
(b) Who attend the meeting but are incapacitated from iliness or accident ; or
(c) Whose entries the Executive Committee may have cancelled.
2. Claims based on other considerations than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penallty of half forfeit.

## XXXIV.-SQUADDING.

1. In the case of competitors classified as Ordinary Entries, arrangements will be made and detail published of the day, hour and target at which each competitor will be required to attend to fulfil his engagements.
2. In the case of Post Entries, the hour of shooting cannot be predetermined or announced, and competitors so classified must await the orders that the progress of the meeting may render practicable.

## XXXV.-ALTERATION OF SQUADDING.

1. Any alterations which the Executive Officer may find it necessar, to make will be duly notified on the notice board, and such notice will be
a sufficient authority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the target for which they were originally issued, and any erasure or alteration will cancel the ticket, unless verified by the initials of the Executive Officer.
2. The place for publication of all notices affecting the detail of shooting shall be the board fixed without the tent of the Executive Officer, and the posting of a notice on such board shall be taken as a good service on all affected thereby.

## XXXVI.-REGISTER TICKETS.

1. Should a competitor lose his ticket or onait to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket, and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity of competing for the prize for which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit his claim on the Association in regard to such competition, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him except under special circumstances.
2. Any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall invalidate the ticket.

## XXXVII.-SIGHTING AND FOULING.

Tickets for sighting shots, 10 cents, and for blow off shots, 2 cents, can be obtained at the Secretary's Office. They must be delivered up to the Register Keeper-two of the former and one of the latter allowed at each range-before a shot is fired. Such tickets to hold good in any match during the meeting.

The Council reserves the right to alter, amend or rescind any of the foregoing regulations as circumstances may require.

## CONSTITUTION,

## ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

1.-That this Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association."
2.-Any person being a subscriber of $\$ 2.00$, and paying the same before the 1st day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year ; and any member may continue his neembership by the annual payment of $\$ 2.00$.

Any person may become an Associate Member of the Association for the current year upon payment of the sum of $\$ 1.00$, and shall have the privilege of taking part in the annual matches, but shall not be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Association.
3.-Donors of $\$ 40.00$ at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to be published in the Annual Reports.
4.-Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than $\$ 25.00$ annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$12.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it. Each Affiliating Association shall be entitled to receive a Silver Medal for competition by its bona fide members. The winner of such medal, being an efficient member of the Active Militia, or an Officer retired retaining rank, to be entitled to compete free of entrance fee in the "Do-
minion of Canada" and "Affiliated Association" matches at the First Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at which he is present after he wins the medal ; provided always that the name of the winner and details of the match at which it is won shall be communicated to the Secretary of the D. C. Rifle Association not later than the first day of such Prize Meeting.
5.-There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, to be named by the Council.

The Governor General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become " Patron."
6.-There shall be a President, to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.
7.-There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.
8.-There shall be a Consul composed of Ffty members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions :-

one half in each case to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Dominion Association, the other half by the Provincial Association of the respective Provinces at their annual meetings ; the names of those elected by the Provincial Associations to be notified to the Secretary of the Dominion of CanadaRifle Association on or before the day of the annual business meeting each year. Six memiers of the Council shall form the quorum.
9.-The Council shall at its first meeting choose from its own members the Chairman of the Council.
10.-The Council shall annually elect at its first meeting an Executive Committee, consisting of fifteen (15) of its members. Five (5) to be a
quorum. The President of the Association and Chairman of the Council shall be ex officio members of the Executive Committee.
11.-The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Deputy Adjutants General commanding districts, being members of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be ex officio Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
12.-There shall be a Treasurer and a Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.
13.-The Council shall have the management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendency of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
14.-The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order, yespecting the management of the affairs of the Association.
15.-The Council may from time to time make such rules for their guidance as they deem necessary.
16.--The Annual Prize meeting shall be held at Ottawa, at such time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Committee, as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council.
17.-An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Finances, shall be dizwn up by the Secretary under the direction of the Council, and shall be publishe 1 and sent to members of the Association at least one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting.
18.-The Annual Business Meeting of the Members of the Association for the Election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the Assembling of the general session of the Parliament of the Dominion. At the close of such Annual Meeting or any adjournment thereof the Association year will terminate.
19.-A General meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any member or competitor attending the matches, but no changes in the constitution shall be made except at the Annual Business Meeting.
20.-No alterations in the constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all membersof the Association of such proposed amendments.
21.-The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the members of the Association.

## gENERAL BV-LAWS 0F THE ASSOCIATION.

## ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

Meetings of Council.

Extraordinary Meetings.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second, on the firsi day of the annual Prize Meeting.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by the Chairman or by any four of the members of the Council, at such place as the Chairman may direct -notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such Meeting-and the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meetings.


Finance Committee.

Treasurer to deposit sums received in Savings Bank.

The Council shall keep Minutes of its proceediogs at all Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary,-and open to the inspection of any member of the Council.

There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at the first meeting.

The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered Bank as the Finance Committe may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

Expenditure of All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may
sums for current expenses. be required by the Secretary mist be authorized by the signature of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, or in his absence by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Expenditures of a general nature.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association,

Annual Accounts.

A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer, made up to and closed on the 30th November.
